Well, October is gone but know that your FVRS Board was busy already getting things set up next year...can you believe it? We will have the election of officers and proposed themes for the 2024 Rose Show at our November 9 General Membership meeting.

There was also a clean-up at the Esther Short Park Rose Garden held October 24. We concentrated on getting the crowns ready for a fresh mulch layer on the November 10. A representative of Vancouver Parks informed us that the large

trellis on the north side of the garden will be removed for further City work there. One of the roses on that trellis is *Iceberg*. In the past it's been a difficult pruning job, requiring an 8ft. ladder to remove it from the vents of the former restroom facility.

We did it! The rose crowns at the Esther Short Park Rose Garden are looking much better and are ready for a layer of mulch. We finished right as Mother Nature started to sprinkle. Yeah, no one got wet.

I say a big *thank you* to those who came to help on the morning of Oct 24. We got a lot done in a short time. My pickup was loaded to the brim with rose debris.

Our next adventure will be Friday, November 10, at 9 a.m. when we'll put the rose garden to bed for the winter. This involves cutting the roses back to about waist high and covering the crowns with mulch.


Please bring your pruners and buckets for cutting the roses back. The City will have a container stationed for us to dump our debris. Also bring a shovel and wheelbarrow to load with mulch and cover the crowns. We will also need to blow the leaves off the crown and rake them up.

Sorry we did not have donuts and water on Oct 24. We would have needed to eat them in the rain. We'll get some for November 10.

Horizon Roses Publication



Wendy Tilley recently shared with the FVRS Board that she has been the regional editor of the Horizon Roses publication for the last two years.


The publication, now 41 years old, is a review of America's newest roses for their exhibition potential and contains reports by exhibitors (local exhibitors to highly experienced master rosarian exhibitors) from all over the United States who provide comments on growing these new rose varieties in their state.

This year, the publication offers opinions on hardiness, winter survival, fragrance and more of over 300 varieties. It also includes color photographs of most of the varieties of roses on which reports are received. The reports are presented alphabetically and

include information on where the roses may be obtained. The comments are helpful for rosarians, hobbyists and exhibitors, to have knowledge of the newest roses.

To introduce the publication to the FVRS members and encourage them to participate as reporters in future editions, the 2021 Horizon Roses edition (pictured on the right) will be displayed at the next General Membership meeting. The current 2023 edition is available on Amazon in the paperback format, a pdf electronic format and in Kindle format.



Weather Word



Ryan's Rose Favorites

St. Tropez - This is one super-duper floribunda! My first year in Vancouver I took a tour of the local rose market stopping at Yard 'N Garden Land, Shorty's (now Dennis' 7 Dees as of last year), and Portland Nursery. While at Portland Nursery, I came across a floribunda rose that I was not familiar with, St. Tropez. The description sounded intriguing, so I purchased it in a 2-gallon pot.

I planted it in my long floribunda garden in front of a brick

wall and very close to the street in the subdivision. In less than a month, I was impressed with the vigor of the bush. The first fully double blooms were a beautiful blend of golden orange and apricot that measured nearly 5 inches across with a petal count between 26-40 petals, making it perfect for my Pacific Northwest rose garden. And, there was a heady fragrance that did not disappoint my nose.

The rose started out sporting hybrid-like blooms with petals that were a bit ruffled as they opened, lasting over a week on the plant and in the vase. Stem length is a bit on the short side but that is not terrible for a floribunda that wants to be a hybrid tea. The bush has dark green glossy foliage and has been quite disease resistant for me.

I do not know if it will be available locally but check out your local nurseries first to see what they will be carrying in 2024. And, it will likely be available from some of the mail order companies as well. It has recently been sold by Regan Nursery as well as Heirloom Roses.


