Opening the Saturday session, PNW District Director Michael Humphrey gave his report on happenings around the district as well as updates on the American Rose Society.

Of concern were Michael's remarks on the current, difficult financial status of the American Rose Society. However, Michael explained there are plans in place to address the problem that include selling ARS property; namely, The American Rose Center in Shreveport, Louisiana. The financial gain from the sale of this property will put greatly needed revenue back into the ARS.

Should the property sale successfully go through, those of us who are members of the American Rose Society will again start receiving the bimonthly ARS magazine <u>American Rose</u>. I know FVRS members all love the ARS magazine, which provides a wealth of rose-growing knowledge as well as information about webinars and forums -- invaluable to rose experts and rose enthusiasts, alike.

In the meantime, what can you do? If you have are not currently a member of the ARS, then join (an ARS membership form is on page 13). If you are up for renewal, then re-up. If you can make a donation, do it. Your support of the ARS will make a difference and help the rose-centered institution turn the corner toward increased membership and a financially healthy 2026. 
2025 PNW District-ARS Conference

Sixteen members of the Fort Vancouver Rose Society attended the 2025 Pacific Northwest District-ARS Fall Conference on Saturday, October 25. The conference, held at The Heathman Lodge in Vancouver, drew members from at least 10 rose societies around the district.

PNW District Director Michael Humphrey chaired the conference, which included the Keynote Speaker Kristin Ohlson, author of Sweet in Tooth and Claw and The Soil Will Save Us. Kristin shared her insights from both her books, explaining her findings that there exist mutually beneficial relationships among living things which shape and sustain the natural world. Through regenerative agriculture, scientists, farmers and "foodies" are healing the soil to save the planet.

The second speaker in the morning session was Robin Jennings, manager of Strategic Partnerships at Heirloom Roses in St. Paul, Oregon. Robin proudly shared that Heirloom Roses, which recently celebrated 50 years of selling own-root, virus free roses, is family-owned and operated. Robin spoke of the ever-expanding floral business and other products now sold by Heirloom Roses. Her love of roses and passion to educate growers was infectious.

Delighting everyone with her humor and energetic delivery, our own Fort Vancouver Rose Society member Kim Erion spoke in the afternoon. She told the "Rehoming Margaret's Roses" story with delightful good humor and candid explanations of how she obtained the myriad materials to

This insurance must be purchased when the annual membership is renewed. The cost of insurance is based on the number of members in the society, and a roster of names has to be provided. FVRS purchases this insurance each year.

Current members of FVRS should pay their dues for the coming year by the end of December 2025. When they do this, they are included in the insurance coverage.

Weather Word by Ryan Tilley, Meteorologist Supreme

Now that summer is gone, how the NWS do on their long-range forecasts. Well, sort of okay, but not great. Sumner was supposed to be very hot and very dry. But the really hot spells were infrequent and short-lived, only a few days at a time. We topped 100 degrees only once and their might have been a dozen or so 90-degree days. Rainfall was scarce as has been the case the last 5 years.

So how will the rest of the year shake out. Well, October begins the cool rainy season and that is what is being forecasted. A La Nina event is being forecasted by most of the statistical computer models to develop and continue through the winter. As we have seen in the past, this has resulted in a wet winter that is colder than normal. Our recent heavy snowfall events have all occurred with a La Nina in progress. Given this, that is exactly what the NWS is forecasting, and I tend to agree with it.

Also, given all the hype for the current hurricane season, it has been disappointing from a meteorologist viewpoint. But October is still a month that can produce a lot of hurricanes, so there is still time for more strong hurricanes to develop.
