



PROPOSED APPROACH

The project scope for the Town of Holden Beach is tailored to address barriers systematically, providing clear guidance and cost estimates for barrier removal efforts. By prioritizing actionable items and leveraging innovative technologies, ACP will pave the way for transformative change and lasting accessibility for the Town of Holden Beach.

Within the project scope there are 3 main tasks, and 2 optional tasks comprised of the following:

- 1. Initiation/Grievance Procedure
- 2. Facilities Survey/Inventory
- 3. Transition Plan/Public Outreach
- 4. Review of Town Policies, Programs, and Practices (Optional)
- 5. Website Assessment (Optional)

Initiation/Grievance Procedure

ACP will engage with the Town to understand and clarify project expectations, survey methodology, goals, priorities, and ADA compliance challenges. These meetings will also serve as an opportunity to introduce the ACP staff and familiarize the Town with the team's roles and expertise. Together, we will establish a structured schedule for project deliverables, ensuring a focused and efficient approach to enhancing community accessibility and meeting project objectives.

ACP will provide the town with an approved Grievance Procedure template for the town to use in updating its current grievance procedure. During the project, ACP will be available to provide guidance on any grievances the town receives by providing helpful guidance on what the ADA does and does not require from a title II entity. Members of the ACP Team have successfully guided ADA coordinators across the country to successfully obtain their ADA Coordinator Certificate (ADAC) and would like to provide our guidance for the ADA coordinator to do so as well. Gaining this certification will ensure that the town's ADA coordinator will be prepared to handle future grievances once the project has been completed further ensuring future ADA compliance and fostering a deeper appreciation and understanding of disability barriers.



A Journey Beyond Infrastructure

Facilities Survey/Inventory

In September of 2010, the Department of Justice (DOJ) adopted the new 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design. ACP bases its data collection on these sets of standards. For outdoor facilities, such as beach access, ACP utilizes Outdoor Developed Areas Guidelines as best practices, as they have not yet been fully incorporated into the ADA standards. Our team has a nuanced understanding of these standards and best practices, which allows us to provide the Town with a well-rounded and comprehensive approach.

Part of our audit process of Town facilities encompasses a strategic method for facility prioritization, including looking into non-structural alternatives. Prioritizing accessibility across buildings and facilities entails a nuanced approach which considers multiple factors. After this assessment, ACP will categorize barriers into a well-defined ranked list.

ACP's approach to data collection has been refined over many years. We utilize smart levels, tape measures, door pressure gauges, GNSS receivers (for precise geolocations of exterior sites) and our in-house-developed data collection software. At ACP, we take a forensic approach to data collection. The ADA standards contain specific requirements for covered elements and spaces and any measurement that does not comply can significantly impact individuals with disabilities. For example, a door has 14 different attributes that are required to comply with specific measurements. ACP measures and assesses all 14 of those requirements and will provide the town with a list of any attributes that do not comply with the requirements. We provide this data in a Microsoft Excel database which we have named the Transition Plan Database (TPD). We have a specific format and columns that we believe to be beneficial but can easily insert or delete columns to produce a TPD which works best for the town. Please look below for a redacted and condensed sample version of our TPD.

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It is important to note that while several columns are hidden in this example for readability, the full dataset includes additional information crucial to the project, such as Compliance Details, Program Access, Citation References, and Resolution Progress. These columns provide a deeper dive into the findings, linking non-compliant elements to their specific attributes and detailing the steps necessary for remediation.

ID links each element to a unique identifier, ensuring that all attributes related to a deficiency are accurately recorded. The Compliance Info For instance, the Program Access Factor indicates the level of public or employee access associated with a specific element, and the Element and Priority Info sections help guide which areas need immediate attention based on usage patterns and the complexity of the required fixes. If the town requires a hard copy of the complete, unabridged version of this data table for further review, Accessibility Consulting Partners, Inc. (ACP) would be happy to provide it, including all hidden columns and additional supporting data. This full version would include a more comprehensive view of the specific elements identified, compliance standards referenced, and the proposed solutions, ensuring a clear roadmap for accessibility improvements.

Location Info: Displays the Facility Name, Area, Room/Space, and Room Space Description.

Element Info: This section outlines the accessible elements under review, including Element Descriptions and Attributes, which provide detailed information about the specific accessibility barriers identified Priority Info: Lists priority rankings focusing on high-traffic areas or locations with a higher public impact. These rankings are based on factors such as mitigation difficulty, public access, and severity of non-compliance.

Cost Info: Includes estimates calculated based on RSMeans costing for reference, providing a financial framework for remediation.

Transition Plan/Public Outreach

ACP will develop a comprehensive draft of the Self-Evaluation which thoroughly analyzes the Town's ADA compliance. As this is a draft report it will change and be updated overtime. This evolving report will identify areas of non-compliance, detailing specific barriers and obstacles that hinder accessibility. Each identified issue will be prioritized based on its impact on accessibility, allowing for the most critical obstacles to be addressed first. ACP will prioritize barriers based on a variety of factors including volume of public presence and program activity, as well as feedback received from the community. By providing detailed findings and actionable recommendations, ACP aims to facilitate Holden Beach's goal of achieving full ADA compliance. This report will serve as a vital tool for the Town, guiding its efforts to enhance accessibility in a structured and efficient manner.

ACP will create a detailed Transition Plan draft, as this is a living and breathing document which will be altered over time, outlining the necessary steps to address identified accessibility barriers. This plan will include clear timelines, delineating when each action should be completed, and identifying responsible parties to ensure accountability. The draft report will serve as a clear roadmap for the Town to achieve ADA compliance, ensuring a systematic and practical approach to improving accessibility. This structured plan will help the Town prioritize resources and actions, leading to more efficient and impactful accessibility enhancements.



We encourage starting and ending projects off by inviting community members to share insights on barriers, guiding our team's initial and concluding efforts. As outlined in <u>DOJ's part 35.105</u>, a public entity shall provide an opportunity to interested persons, including individuals with disabilities or organizations representing individuals with disabilities, to participate in the self-evaluation process by submitting comments.

As part of ACP's consulting process, we will work with the ADA coordinator to meet and engage with the community and stakeholders in the form of public outreach events and a statistically valid needs assessment survey. This approach ensures that the community's recommendations and voice are accurately represented. The plan will be tailored to integrate Holden Beach residents' specific concerns and needs in a format that is most comfortable and relaxed for the community. ACP proposes doing at least one (but up to four) public outreach events at one of Holden Beach's planned community events, for example, Holden Beach's Veterans Luncheon or Turkey Trot. Community events such as these would provide Holden Beach residents with a comfortable space to communicate their accessibility needs or wants. ACP will collaborate with the Town to determine the most appropriate events and their frequency. This public involvement process enhances the relevance of our recommendations and fosters greater community involvement and support. We prioritize gathering feedback from the public, including those with disabilities and advocacy groups, as a crucial step. This inclusive approach serves as a risk management measure and an integral aspect of fulfilling the ADA's commitment to inclusion and integration. Throughout the SETP process, ACP will facilitate these public outreach events, create and distribute surveys that are in alignment with the Town of Holden Beach's requirements, and document the residents' concerns. ACP will work with the Town to determine the contents of the survey, typically this is a 10-question document. The survey will be available in a printed format at the outreach events as well as utilizing a QR code and may also be made available on the Town's website. The survey will be available in a multitude of languages to best accommodate the Town's residents' diverse language needs. This public engagement will continue through the SE/TP completion, adjusting the transition plan as needed in partnership with the town.


- 1. Ensuring websites adhere to the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines 2.0 and
- Involving people with disabilities to test the accessibility and usability of their websites.



As mentioned above, past DOJ settlement agreements have emphasized WCAG 2.0 as the recommended web design guidelines to ensure website accessibility for people with disabilities. Currently, WCAG 2.1 is recognized as the updated best practice, offering improved guidelines to make websites accessible and user-friendly for individuals with disabilities. Significantly, WCAG 2.1 includes testing for various aspects of website interfaces on mobile devices.

We will comprehensively assess a randomly selected set of the Town's web pages as described in the RFP, evaluating the structures, features, and elements based on WCAG 2.1 success criteria. The resulting report will detail each object's pass or fail status for the relevant success criterion.

The report will include hyperlinks to World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) guidance for each success criterion, providing insights into potential causes of failure and suggesting various correction methods. Many failures can be efficiently addressed through global edits to website templates or cascading style sheets, while some issues may require manual, individual fixes.



A good example, contrast deficiencies often necessitate changes to color templates across the entire website. On the other hand, when an image lacks alternative text, or the provided text doesn't offer a meaningful description, human intervention is needed.

It is essential to involve individuals with disabilities to evaluate the accessibility of public entity's websites and digital communications. Our team includes people with diverse disabilities—such as blindness, low vision, deafness, and limited manual mobility/dexterity—to interact with client websites and provide detailed reports based on their experiences. Understanding that digital barriers affecting one person may not impact another, this inclusive approach offers a nuanced perspective.

By integrating findings from the WCAG technical audit and the tester reports, our reviewer collaborates with the technical auditor to create a final report which aligns user experiences with specific success criterion failures. This comprehensive synthesis thoroughly evaluates accessibility aspects from both technical and user-centric viewpoints.
