

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Annual Report from Patricia Lull: Bishop, Saint Paul Area Synod

"Protect me, O God, for I take refuge in you: I have said to the Lord, 'You are my Lord, my good above all other." Psalm 16:1 (ELW translation)

As we come to the close of 2024, these are complicated days in our world. I think most congregations in this synod are faring better than many other organizations and institutions when it comes to focusing on a core mission, living out their values, and being financially stable. Yet, anxiety is widespread and lots of people are angry and disappointed, fearful and disenchanted. All these dynamics create a perfect context for witnessing to the good news from God. We have much work to do but we know that we work best when we act as church together in this synod.

This past year the synod staff and the Synod Council adopted this mission statement and core values:

As followers of Jesus, we are called to accompany faith communities and equip leaders for God's mission in the world.

Our core values are - authenticity, connection, compassion, and curiosity.

This understanding of our mission allows us to focus staff time and budget dollars to create the most lasting impact in our common work. The core values thread through the way we interact as synod staff and the way we show up in conversations with congregations and the wider public.

In summer 2024, I hosted five Listening Sessions to hear directly from Lutherans like you where you find hope in your congregation and also the worries that weigh on you. Over 100 persons participated and 50 people joined a Zoom presentation to hear what I had learned.

Here are two strategic steps we are taking as a synod to respond to all that I heard: In 2025 we will inaugurate a year and a half emphasis on worship renewal in congregations. This will be funded in part by an ELCA Churchwide grant with an emphasis on inviting our neighbors to join us in worship experiences. Secondly, as a synod, we will encourage and support efforts to make respectful conversations a hallmark of congregational life. You'll hear more about both initiatives in early 2025.

During 2024, the synod staff over saw call processes and transitions with more than 30 congregations. Several of those included the calling of multiple rostered ministers. This means that nearly a third of the congregations in the synod were in a time of transition this past year. I am grateful for all who have served on a call committee, for our interim pastors, and for faithful members who trust that we are always being called forward into God's mission for us as the church.

I was privileged to ordain four persons in 2024, including Pastor Wesley Kimball, serving as associate pastor at All Saints in Cottage Grove; Pastor Pepe Demarest, serving as pastor for the Recovery Church in St. Paul with the United Methodist Church (a full communion partner); Pastor Ruthie Mhanga, serving as associate pastor at Gustavus Adolphus in St. Paul; and Pastor Nathan Lyke, serving as associate pastor at St. John's in Lakeville.

Three of these candidates were from the Saint Paul Area Synod where we currently have 24 persons in the candidacy process to serve as pastors or deacons in the ELCA. I am grateful for those who serve on the Candidacy Committee, for those who mentor and encourage our candidates, for our seminaries and intern sites, and all who support persons as they discern how God is calling them to live out their vocation in the church and world. This is work we all share, knowing that for many the seeds of wondering about becoming a pastor or deacon begin during the elementary school years.

A highlight in 2024 was welcoming Eternal Flame Lutheran Church to recognized congregational status during the Synod Assembly in May. This vibrant congregation, rooted in the growing Hmong community in the East Metro, began as a mission start many years before. The financial support and prayers of many have accompanied this process, as well as our shared work with the ELCA, led by our Director of Evangelical Mission, Pastor Justin Grimm. Also in 2024, St. Mark Lutheran in St. Paul marked its holy closure as a congregation, after more than 100 years of witness on West 7th Street in St. Paul. There are now 106 congregations in the Saint Paul Area Synod with just over 100,000 baptized members.

The Planting Hope Campaign, a synod-wide initiative to support congregational vitality, youth development, and outreach efforts in the synod, continued to bear fruit. With our partners at Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota, we celebrated the opening of the Early Learning Center-East Side in August, thanks to a \$1 million investment from the campaign. \$100,000 was shared with congregational vitality efforts this year; over \$50,000 was used to fund paid summer internship for nine young adults. To date over \$1.7 million dollars has been raised for The Planting Hope Campaign. I want to thank all who have donated to the campaign while continuing significant mission support, which allows us to do so much together.

God continues to bless our congregations with people and financial resources. The gifts of time, talent, and treasure enable us to live into God's mission in ways no one congregation could do in isolation. This includes support of our mission starts and redevelopment congregations. In 2024 these included Shobi's Table, Foundation of Life, Eternal Flame, Cristo Rey, St. Paul – Wyoming, Lutheran Church of Peace – Maplewood, and Christ the Servant – Vadnais Heights. An exploration of a possible mission start in Rosemount began in 2024.

Finally, I know you join me in thanking those who serve on the staff of this synod. They include Rachel Holsten, Mary Smith, David Roinas, Kirsten Levorson, Rolf Lowenberg-DeBoer, Justin Grimm, Kirsta Lind, Leslie Ortiz and Patricia Lull. Together with Synod Council members, deans, committee members, congregational leaders, and all of you, we have been able to do much to share God's good news to a world, so eager for hope and direction.

I am grateful to serve as the bishop in this time and place, knowing that God alone is our hope and refuge, as the Psalmist proclaims. May we live out that deep truth with joy and confidence in the year to come.

Dear Members of St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

How do you measure a year in the life of a church congregation? In some ways, this is simple. Churches track attendance, giving, expenses, baptisms, weddings, and funerals. For example, with the continued strong leadership of Pastor David, Deacon Kate, and Music Director Tom Paulson, the positive momentum from 2023 carried over into 2024. Our weekly attendance increased by 15% from 2023, we celebrated a record five (5) baptisms on just one Sunday this year, and welcomed 40 youth from within the congregation and from around the community to our summer Vacation Bible School programming (a fourfold increase from 2023).

But as encouraging as these numbers are, no statistic or accounting can wholly capture the impact that the mission, ministries, and congregation of St. Mark's has had over the past twelve months:

In April, St. Mark's produced our inaugural presentation of the Living Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, inviting us to engage with a familiar story in a new and powerful way.

Thanks to your generosity, in July St. Mark's sent 10 youth and 3 adults to the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. They returned strengthened in their faith and in themselves, with memories that will last a lifetime.

Through the guidance of our new Mental Health Ministry, St. Mark's joined Mental Health Connect, a church coalition helping congregations and congregants navigate access to mental health resources and care.

St. Mark's negotiated an updated lease with the Head Start program to include renting out our former music room, allowing Head Start to serve more local pre-K students with full-day programming.

New chairs for Rees Hall were purchased using funds from the Lowe estate. New ovens were also installed in the kitchen, further strengthening a vibrant and dedicated Wednesday night food ministry that serves both food and fellowship.

All of this is in addition to our growing music ministry, our global outreach ministry (ongoing partnerships with Kihesa and Mtwivila in Tanzania, and the Hope orphanage in India), community events such as God's Work Our Hands, donations to the North St. Paul Food Shelf and the North High backpack program, participation in the Quilter's ministry, and many, many more; too many to fit in the one page I am allowed, but each with its unique glory to God.

These missions and ministries – the life of the church – is possible because of you. You have selflessly volunteered your time, talents, and treasure in service to God and our neighbors through St. Mark's, and I cannot possibly measure my gratitude for that.

Reports from the Ministry Staff

The Rev. David Bjorklund: Lead Pastor

Dear Friends,

I give thanks to God for calling us together as the people of St. Mark's. Every one of you is a gift and a blessing to our congregation. I give thanks to God for the ways you support the ministry of our church. We've had an incredible year together and I am optimistic about the direction of our congregation.

As we all know, consistency in leadership is key for the vitality of a congregation. After several years of pastoral transition, 2024 was the first time since 2019 that we did not experience turnover in our core ministry staff. Between our Director of Worship and Music Tom Paulson, Deacon Kate Bentley, and myself as Lead Pastor we have our key people in place and I daresay we're not going anywhere but forward together as a church! Together with the gifts of our amazing support staff, and all of yours, we are well positioned to sustain and build upon the growth we've experienced these past few years.

Under Tom's leadership we've seen a dramatic transformation of our music ministry. We made the right call in affirming the need for a full time music director and we see the wisdom of that decision every Sunday. Tom brings his considerable talents to the table and one of this gifts is affirming and raising up the talents of others. As a result our Music Ministry is stronger than it has been in years.

Children, Youth, and Family (CYF) ministry continues to grow under the leadership of Deacon Kate. Her first full year of ordained ministry was marked by several successes, especially our trip to the ELCA's National Youth Gathering in New Orleans as well as our fall Kids Fest. Deacon Kate is an amazing minister and colleague and I'm excited to see our CYF ministry continue to thrive under her leadership.

Heading into 2025 we are not the same congregation we were when I was called as your associate pastor in 2021. When I started at St. Mark's in August of that year we were still very much in the grasp of the COVID pandemic. Our assumptions about post-pandemic church life, that things would automatically go back to how things were before, turned out to be just that, assumptions. What we all came to realize is that renewing the life of the church takes work. We've been doing that work together, and the seeds we've planted are beginning to bear fruit.

We've seen our average worship attendance steadily increase. Our Sunday worship continues to attract new people and is drawing in those who have fallen away in years past. The word is getting out there that St. Mark's is the place to be, that our worship, our music, and our messages are worth showing up for and coming back for. Look around on any given Sunday and you'll see new faces as well as the faces of old friends who have found their way back to their church home.

Our financial position continues to improve. We put forth a negative budget of \$125,000 in 2024. Because of your generosity and good stewardship of our resources, we whittled that negative \$125,000 to a negative \$60,000. We are fortunate enough to have reserves that enable us to sustain our ministry while we close that gap but ultimately that gap can only be closed by continued growth in financial support. I am confident we will continue to close the gap in our budget over the next several years.

None of the growth we've experienced these past few year has happened by accident. It's the result of thoughtful and intentional work. It's the result of our shared commitment to the Gospel and our life together. Together we will sustain and build upon the work we've done. Together we will plant new seeds and tend to those that are sprouting. Together we are renewing the life of our congregation. May God continue to bless our ministry and life together!

Community of St. Mark's,

We have officially had one full year together with me serving as Deacon. What a year it has been! At the start of 2024 we kicked off the year fundraising for the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans. We had the opportunity to take ten youth and 3 adults, Pastor David, myself, and a parent chaperone, Nikki Horning. Each month leading up to the Gathering we gathered together as a group to engage in team building activities, Gathering curriculum, and logistic planning for a trip of that caliber. Fundraising looked like many different things this year: buying a "brick" in Rees Hall, selling Heggies Pizza, pancake breakfast, Bingo nights! We are so fortunate to have a congregation that is willing to show up and support their youth. We are also grateful to the Foundation who covered all of the transportation costs of this trip, allowing us to safely travel to and from New Orleans by plane. We had the most incredible week in New Orleans, worshipping, serving, and engaging in time of fellowship with one another. I am so grateful for how brave our youth were in taking on this new adventure, opening themselves up to the journey, and allowing themselves to be fully present in such a transformative experience. We are already looking forward to 2027 where Minneapolis will be the host city for the Youth Gathering.

In March we opened registration for our full-day full-week Vacation Bible School. Our theme this year was Loving Your Neighbor. The week consisted of traditional VBS style mornings with more summer camp activities and games in the afternoon. I am so thankful for the many volunteers who contributed to this program, from teachers and group leaders, to the snack and lunch crew who kept the 48 children we had in attendance fed and happy during the week. It was truly incredible!

Using the momentum that we had from VBS with all of our neighborhood kids, we applied for a grant from the Foundation to host a community event in the fall. KidsFest took place on October 11 from 4-6pm. With the help of the Foundation we were able to hire a balloon artist, bubble artist, and face painting! We also secured a bounce house and our very own Pastor David took on the concession stand, whipping up cotton candy and popcorn to order. We had volunteers running games around the parking lot and manning the different stations. This FREE community event brought in more than 100 parents and children on this Friday evening.

In the fall we also kicked off another year of education! We have Vicki Smith teaching our littlest members, (3, 4, and 5 year olds) on Wednesday night. Hannelie Slabber a high school youth, who also works in the St. Mark's nursery on Sunday mornings, has been the fearless leader for our elementary school students. Our confirmation students are in the trusted hands of Pastor David, and I have had the pleasure of spending Wednesdays with our high school students. Our friends in Pre-K and Elementary have been following a new model where they are focusing on one Bible story for the month and then each week looking at and learning about real world applications of that story's theme. On Sunday morning we've been offering Sunday School for ages 3 through grade 6 with Hannah Besmer. Hannah is truly one of those teachers who goes above and beyond and we are so grateful for her and her care for our children. Alongside Hannelie, we were excited to welcome Gracie Papenguth to the nursery team. We appreciate all the support from these two young ladies. Being able to offer our families a safe place to bring their kiddos on Sunday is such a gift.

This Advent season we were able to give our Wednesday night teachers a break from their classrooms and instead did a mentor program for those three weeks. Our high school and confirmation students would group together to help lead a small group of Pre-K and Elementary students in their story and activity. This was an amazing thing to witness, to see our older youth step up and take on these leadership roles with the little ones—we truly have an amazing group of young people that we get to love and nurture here.

2024 was an incredible year, I can't wait to see where our faith will take our children and youth in 2025.

Tom Paulson: Director of Music & Worship

John Ferguson is the retired professor of church music at St. Olaf College in Northfield. He is famous (or infamous, I'm not sure which) for saying, with great regularity, "If you sing well, sing to praise the giver. If you don't sing so well, sing to get even!" I know he says this mostly tongue in cheek but, in the words of the immortal Karen Walker, "It's funny 'cause it's true!"

Think about all the scripture that commands us to worship. We read, "Sing to the Lord a new song," "Come before God with singing," "Praise God with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs." Notice the commands, the imperatives – Sing, Come, and Praise. Notice also what scripture does not say: "Sing only if you sing really well." "Sing only if you are reasonably competent." It doesn't even say, "Sing only if you like the song." It just says sing! This is one of the most basic things I want us to learn together, to put away our Minnesota, Scandinavian reserve, and make a joyful noise to the glory of God, together. We may not be perfect, but God will be praised.

2024 was a busy and wonderful year to be in Music Ministry at St. Mark's Lutheran. Congratulations and kudos to the Choir of St. Mark's, the Jubilee Handbell Choir, and the Worship Band. When I began working with the Choir in the fall of 2023, long-time leader Dorothea Jirsa and I discussed using music for 3 part choir, SAB (soprano, alto, bass.) Now we have 5 five sopranos, 9 altos, 6 tenors and 6 basses. We easily sing the more standard SATB music. Kudos to The Choir of St. Mark's for their dedication, hard work, excellent worship leadership, and commitment to music as ministry.

I hope you know, that from my perspective, the community of St. Mark's sings splendidly in worship, whether the song is an old chestnut, or new learning opportunity. We sing with gusto when a familiar song is on the screen, and we're always willing to pull out the red hymnal in front of us and follow the little black dots up and down for a new one. Sometimes we can only learn the words, but next time we'll learn the notes, too. In so doing, God is worshipped, we grow in grace and faith, and John Ferguson sports a wry smile.

May God bless us in 2025, that St. Mark's Music Ministry may continue to thrive and grow, and may we always be true to our calling to love God, and love others.

The Caring Ministry team visits those members who are unable to attend worship and events in person, who otherwise may feel disconnected from their faith family, by bringing St. Mark's Church to them. Caring Ministry allows us to have meaningful visits with the many wonderfully diverse folks—whether homebound in their own homes or in facilities, we talk with them and learn about them and their lives. And, what interesting lives they have had! We often share Holy Communion, brought to them after it has been blessed here at St. Mark's during a church service. Those we visit love to hear about what's new at St. Mark's and several of them watch the services on YouTube or livestream. When we visit people in memory care, it is remarkable that the words and music they learned as a child are still there. If we sing a familiar song, they join us; as we say the Lord's Prayer, they will join as best they can. And, even if they are nonverbal, the smiles on their faces as we greet them makes the visit worthwhile.

In addition to those visits, the Caring Ministries group leads a worship service at Polar Ridge where once a month all residents are welcome to attend. We give thanks to Bob and Sue Engwer for their faithfulness to the Polar Ridge service, as well as to Bonnie Pottratz who has been making our singing sound a lot better by supporting this service as well. It is always a treat to have Dorothea Jirsa with us as our musician, she brings a smile to the familiar faces we see there!

In times of need, we have also helped deliver meals along with other groups from St. Mark's.

The team hosts a "Homecoming Luncheon" in the spring and invite our homebound people and their caregivers to a worship service and luncheon. We also include folks from church who know them so there are familiar faces. This year the luncheon took place on Thursday, May 9th. We had 12 committee members, 2 staff members, 5 volunteers and 32 guests present! We are grateful for Bonnie Pottratz and Liz Elicerio-Nelson who planned, purchased and prepared the delicious tater tot casserole, broccoli, pear/cottage cheese salad and bread.

Volunteer kitchen help by Jim Allen. Rhonda Blattner provided assorted bars for dessert. Linda and Terry Kapaun set up tables the evening prior with help from Liz and Steve Nelson. Nancy Helm and Barb Michel bought fresh flowering plants for centerpieces. The flowers went home with people attending. Myrna Meek prepared lovely name tags for everyone; committee members along with volunteers Wanda and Carl Hurtgen and Carolyn and Dick Newell greeted folks, handed out bulletins and helped escort people in and out of the sanctuary. Serving and clean up: everyone involved helped serve and clean up! Dishwashers were Jim Allen and Joe Hofacker. Pastor David facilitated the church service. Tom Paulson led the hymns. Holy Communion was brought to the guests who remained sitting. This event took a lot of planning and consideration for our guests and was well worth it - we are so grateful for the committee and all of their love and dedication to this group.

Congregation of St. Marks,

This past year we achieved our financial operational goals. The ongoing journey of financially supporting the ministries here at St. Mark's is challenging and our staff and committees have been diligent in efficiently keeping expenses favorable to the 2024 expense plan. As a reminder, our operational plan for 2024 was to end the year with a net negative (\$126k). The actual 2024 year end was a net negative (\$9.7k). This outcome was possible in part to some one time income received and one time expense conservation.

Our congregation's ability to sustain our operational plan into future years is dependent on continuing to increase our overall contributions and other income to achieve a balanced operational plan within the next few years.

Gifts & Memorials

The Gifts & Memorials committee oversees the funds from the undesignated gifts and the interest earned in the Gifts and Memorials fund. These funds are distributed on a request basis. They are reviewed by the committee to assure the use is appropriate and that there is not a different source for the funding.

Global Ministries: Tanzania & India

2024 Annual Report

Below is a summary of the Mission Committee's activities and accomplishments of 2024:

Tanzania

Tanzania Secondary Student Sponsorships – In 2025, St. Mark's individuals or families will sponsor 20 Kihesa and 11 Mtwivila secondary students at a rate of \$450 per year for room, board and tuition. \$13,050 in new funds and \$800 in existing funds were donated in late 2024 for these secondary school sponsorships. Included in these funds was \$1,350 from the St. Mark's Foundation.

Other Kihesa and Mtwivila Project Support – In addition to the student sponsorship support, St. Mark's will donate around \$4,000 for other general projects yet to be named by Kihesa and Mtwivila. These funds will come from the Craft Fair that was held in December 2024, which raised \$1,826, and Soup Sunday/Bake Sale proceeds from the January 2024 and 2025 Annual Meetings. In 2024, Mtwivila used these general support funds to buy materials to help construct a Sunday School building and a new church building. Kihesa used these funds for general support of the church.

Life Skills Center – Funds from the Inez Oehlke Endowment Fund provided a net amount of \$12,729 for the Kihesa Life Skills Center in 2024. The Kihesa pastors and partnership committee have developed a plan to strengthen existing and develop new programs at the Life Skills Center. The first sewing classes and computer classes were completed in mid-2024 and a second round of classes was started later in 2024. In the future, they plan to conduct car driving classes for the youth. This skill is needed more and more for employment in Tanzania. Kihesa spent around \$14,000 from the Inez Oehlke Endowment Funds to renovate the Life Skills Center. Computer classroom renovation - purchase of 10 computers, projector, salaries for teacher and manager; Sewing Class - salaries for teacher and tables; External Washroom Construction – wall plastering, electricity and floor tile installation, iron sheets; Life Skills Center Renovations – blankets, sheets, curtains, mosquito netting, mattresses, washing machine; Rain Water Harvesting – water tank; Life Skills Center electrical renovation for the whole center

Other Funding Sources – In addition to the donations from members and friends for Tanzania, our Tanzania Mission received \$1,000 from St. Mark's general budget funds in 2024.

Travel to Tanzania – Mark McKenzie traveled again to Tanzania in November 2024 with a group composed of members from several local churches.

India Mission Update from Pete Mogren

St. Mark's helps support Hope Orphanage in India. This is a fairly new partnership that started in 2024 out of the closing of Reach Orphanage. During the visit, money was provided to make necessary repairs and meet other needs for the well-being of the children. Thirty children live at Hope Orphanage and school is provided for an additional 50 children. Communication is ongoing with Mary. We are able to provide videos with updates to sponsors from holidays and special events. St. Mark's currently has 12 sponsors and we would like to increase the number of sponsorships this year. - **Police/Fire Hospitality.** St. Mark's continues to provide space and hospitality for the North St. Paul and Maplewood Police and Fire Departments to take a break. We invite them to use our space in Fellowship Hall to enjoy a beverage, grab a snack or have a meal while they are on duty. Many people have contributed to this project and it is much appreciated by our local first responders.
- The Annual Progressive Dinner was a fun way to kick off the holiday season with appetizers at homes followed by dinner and entertainment at church with Bend in the River Big Band. This was a great chance to mingle and celebrate the holidays with our new members and new/longtime friends. Over 70 people attended. Mental Health Ministry

2024 Annual Report

The St. Mark's Mental Health Ministry (MHM) seeks to encourage mental health wellness within our church and greater community; to help end mental health stigma; and to support mental health education. We gratefully acknowledge and thank St. Mark's Foundation for its ongoing generous support of this important ministry. As you know, Americans are experiencing high rates of mental illness, with an estimated 23.1 percent of Americans living with mental illness in 2022, according to the National Institute of Mental Illness.

In 2024, with help from Foundation grants, MHH team members were able to:

- 1) Promote understanding within our congregation of the connection between physical and mental wellness through the National Alliance on Mental Illness Hearts + Minds program.
- 2) Provide young children and their families with age-appropriate books (via a new book cart in the Narthex), promoting mental health wellness; developing good communications and coping skills; and recognizing healthy ways to deal with "big" emotions.
- 3) Strive to help end stigma associated with mental illness by speaking openly about mental health and working to provide a welcoming environment. Information is shared via different channels including posters, the newsletter, and bulletin boards.
- 4) Maintain and grow the Mental Health Book Club and its list of recommended selections of books on topics such as managing anxiety or bridging gaps with loved ones experiencing addiction or mental illness. Copies of Book Club books are available in the church library.
- 5) Recognize the need for a caregivers' support group and work to identify ways to help members at risk for feelings of isolation and loneliness.
- 6) Begin exploring new ways to cooperate with others beyond our church community for education and resource sharing.
- 7) Evaluate and solidify a relationship with Mental Health Connect, a coalition of about 40 churches, which helps members access mental health professionals and resources as well as network on programming and education. Foundation grant money went directly to fund St. Mark's membership fees, offsetting the nonprofit's costs of providing services to our members. Mental Health Connect has shared information directly with church members through a Temple Talk, information table and handout.

Looking ahead to 2025, the St. Mark's MHM will devote Foundation grant resources to carrying out our mission in ways that also reflect the Foundation's mission to convey the Christian message through education and the building of relationships.

We plan to use our relationship with Mental Health Connect to build capacity so that we will be better able to serve members of the church and greater community. Three members of St. Mark's MHM have volunteered to become Mental Health Connect Ambassadors attending regular meetings to learn more about available opportunities; Pastor David is attending quarterly clergy meetings; and MHC will host a training for the MHM team soon. The book club will focus its new study on ways to help prevent anxiety in children and young adults with the possibility of launching a church-wide book read of *The Anxious Generation*.

St. Mark's Mental Health Ministry team includes: Amy Reddy, Julie Urban, Judy Larkins, Kathy Hanon, Liz Elicerio-Nelson, Anne Williston, Rod Larkins (Foundation liaison), and co-chairs Bonnie Meyers and Shari Hamilton, as well as Pastor David and Deacon Kate.

Property Committee

The Property Committee has a commitment to provide a safe, welcoming and functional environment for our congregation. This report outlines a few of the updates and improvements that have been completed over the last year, helping us to keep our promise to the congregation.

Project highlights from 2024:

- This past year, we replaced the furnaces and the air conditioning unit in Rees Hall.
- The patio at the west entrance of the sanctuary has been rebuilt due to settling. It was a great location for the large Christmas tree this year! Furthermore, we removed a large pine tree from the garden area outside Rees Hall.
- The choir moved to Rooms 102-103 from the lower level hallway, allowing Head Start to add an additional classroom for their program. In the new choir room, the old room divider was removed to free up more space for our music ministry.
- Crucial repairs were made to boiler steam pipes and fittings in Fellowship Hall. Additionally, we repaired the sink and toilet plumbing in the Rees Hall bathrooms.
- The light sensors in the outdoor fixtures in the alley have been repaired.
- We repaired the exhaust fans in the Rees Hall kitchen and bathrooms. Additionally, we also purchased 3 new stoves, which have been a big improvement for our many Wednesday night dinners and other events.
- We recognize the importance of safety and have continued to improve our security by installing cameras and door alarms throughout the building. This project will continue into 2025.
- We purchased new chairs for both Rees Hall and Fellowship Hall. In the spirit of giving, the old Rees Hall chairs and several folding chairs have been donated to Head Start, a local theater, a college in southern MN and a startup church in Plymouth.

Potential Projects in 2025:

- Assess the areas of the church where the carpeting has experienced significant wear and tear over the years.
- Paint the railings around the exterior of the building as well as a few doors. This project could also include the railings in Rees Hall.
- Transition to more efficient lighting in certain areas of our building. This technology is constantly changing, and can reduce our energy consumption and lead to savings over time.
- To create a warm and inviting atmosphere for our meetings and Bible studies, we will be purchasing and installing a new fireplace in the Fireside Room.
- We would like to invite all members of our congregation to join the monthly group of volunteers called Saturday Stewards. This group meets on the first Saturday of every month and offers tasks/projects suitable for all skill levels. It is a wonderful opportunity to contribute to the upkeep of our church and strengthen the sense of community.

We are so grateful for the dedication and hard work of our volunteers and the support of our congregation. Together, we have accomplished significant milestones in improving our church facilities and grounds.

Social Ministry

As a congregation, the center of our life together is worship, where the Word of God is preached and the Sacraments are shared. From that center we are sent out to serve, and St. Mark's has a long history of service in our church and community. Here are some highlights of the past year:

- Caring Hands volunteers serve families at a time of grief and loss by setting up a comfortable space and serving a meal at the time of a funeral or memorial service. In 2024 we hosted 18 funeral luncheons at church. The team of volunteers is led by Kathy Mewis. Additional volunteers are often needed to make cookies or bars. If you would like to be on this "as-needed" list, please contact the church office.
- Wednesday Night Community Meal. Meals are provided on Wednesday evenings during the school year. All are invited. Freewill offering is gladly accepted but not required. Thanks to Julie Urban for heading up the team of dedicated volunteers who make this possible. The team welcomes anyone to come and help on Wednesday nights. Contact Julie Urban if you are interested. Our average attendance is 85. In the first half of the 2024-25 school year (Sept Dec), 1,433 people have been served!
- St. Mark's partnered again with **Interfaith Action's School Supply Drive** (serving 10 programs in the Greater St. Paul area) to provide students from low-income families with the essential school tools they need. Backpacks, supplies and cash donations were collected. Many children benefitted from your generosity. Special thanks to Sherry Berry for coordinating the collection.

Partnership with North High School

- **The Polar Pantry** this partnership provides North High with monetary donations and some food/ hygiene products (a list is available in Rees Hall) to the district-wide pantry located in the District Center across the street. Monetary donations are used to buy food directly from Second Harvest. Students and families can "shop" at the pantry to obtain the items they need. The staff at North are very thankful that we continue to help them provide this support for families experiencing food insecurity. Monetary donations can be made to St. Mark's, noting they are for the Polar Pantry.
- **Polar Packs** Backpacks containing food were made up for 20 families at North High and were given out during holiday break.
- **Thanksgiving Meal baskets** St. Mark's worked with North High to help District 622 families with meals at Thanksgiving. With your generous donations we were able to provide 45 families with a complete Thanksgiving meal 10-12 lb. turkey, sides and dessert. Thank you for supporting St. Mark's partnership with North High School, its students, and their families.
- **Christmas Food Gift Cards** were distributed to North High families, as well as St. Mark's families thanks to a grant from the St. Mark's Foundation.
- Free Produce Events. We continued our partnership with Second Harvest and the NSP Food Shelf to host three free produce events (July, August, and September.) This has been a powerful way to both serve and connect with our neighbors. Over the 3 dates, we helped approximately 600 families get fresh produce at no cost. We could not have done that without the time of so many of you—Thank you! Special thanks to Julie Urban and Suzanne Ericson for coordinating the event. Also, thanks to our partners at the North St. Paul Food Shelf and Second Harvest for providing the food.
- **Gift Goes On Christmas Giving Program.** As a community, we purchased and wrapped gifts and donated food gift cards for 25 children and their siblings from the Head Start program within our church home. You have truly made a difference to these families this Christmas. Special thanks to Liz Elicerio-Nelson for organizing this program from beginning to end.

Stewardship for All Seasons

This year's theme for our Stewardship Campaign was A *Place at the Table*. The campaign was inspired by our strengths as a welcoming congregation and our desire for members, friends, and guests of St. Mark's to share in the life of the church by claiming their place at the table.

The work of the Stewardship for All Seasons (SAS) committee reflects the belief that stewardship is a broad and encompassing term. We seek to encourage generous financial support of the congregation's budget. We also seek to support the congregation's mission and ministry by encouraging individuals to participate in the daily life of the church.



To that end the A Place at the Table campaign sought to invite members, friends, and guests of St. Mark's to participate in the daily life of the church, share in leadership through service, and increase their financial support.

SAS is pleased to report that we continue to see positive movement in all these areas. We are also pleased to report a positive movement with regards to pledged financial support for 2025.

As of January 15, 2025, we have received 136 pledges for 2025 and the amount of those pledges are 4% higher than in 2024.

- 47 units increased their 2025 pledges compared to 2024
- 23 units pledging in 2025 that did not pledge in 2024
- 54 units pledged to sustain their support at current levels
- 12 units decreasing their 2025 pledge compared to 2024
- 16 units who pledged in 2024 but have not yet submitted a pledge for 2025

The SAS committee would like to thank all those who have pledged their intent to sustain our ministry in 2025. We would like to invite those who have not yet pledged their intent to do so. We also want to thank everyone for their generous support of our life together in 2024. The financial support the congregation received in 2024 and the commitments we've received for 2025 are helping us to close the gap in our budget and our putting us on the path to long-term sustainability.

The St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church Foundation continues its mission of conveying the Christian message to people through excellence in worship, education and the building of relationships, both within the church and out into the community.

The Foundation board members had a busy year during 2024 finding new ways to serve the church and community with proactive grants, developing a new informational brochure to mail to the St. Mark's congregation, and continued work on making sure our financial status remains stable.



The Foundation Grants Committee partnered with church committees and staff to develop grants to support the focus areas of mental health ministry, music ministry, and children, youth and family ministries. These ministries put to work the grants given to them in various ways. The beautiful music from the brass group at Easter and string quartet for Christmas was possible because of its grant. The mental health group used its money to encourage mental health wellness within our church and greater community, to help end mental health stigma, and to support mental health education. The youth group used two grants to fund their transportation to New Orleans for the ELCA Youth Convention, one a traditional grant and the other a "proactive" grant for CYF ministries.

The Foundation continued to carry its mission forward by endowing grants for more than \$22,000 during 2024:

- KidsFest 2024 hosted in September invited everyone at no cost to attendees.
- The North High School band program will be helped to continue one-to-one or small group lessons at North on specified instruments with highly qualified professional teachers and musicians.
- Hope for The Brave, housing assistance for victims of domestic violence, received help for rental needs for families.
- Helping North High School families, a grant was given for food gift cards during the recent holidays.
- St. Mark's youth were recipients of a grant to fund their transportation to the ELCA Youth Convention.
- The North St. Paul Area Food Shelf received help for the overwhelming food needs of the community.
- The Foundation helped fund the entertainment and pay for new members to attend the annual Progressive Dinner.
- Continued support was given for the Tanzania Secondary School Student sponsorship during 2025.
- Restocking supplies will be available for the first responders who use space in Fellowship Hall for muchneeded breaks for a meal or respite.

The Foundation continues to work with church staff, the congregation and stake holders in the community to find ways to help those in need.

The Foundation was blessed in 2024 with financial gifts of more than \$15,500 through legacy gifts, donations, memorials, Thrivent Choice Dollars, and employee matching gifts from US Bank. The Foundation's assets are invested to continue to support the community through grants in 2024. The finance committee works to maximize the return on investments through engagement with professional financial advisors, creates the budget for the Foundation, and monitors the financial health of the assets of the Foundation.

The Foundation continued its commitment to keep the congregation informed about the Foundation's progress and activities. The Foundation website, announcements in the church weekly updates and Foundation Week continue to be good resources of information about the Foundation. In addition, a new colorful brochure was developed and mailed to the congregation this year.
