

Weekly Update May 19, 2022

Friends in Christ,

One of our readings for this coming Sunday is from the book of Revelation. I must admit Revelation is the most troublesome book of the Bible for me. It is perhaps the most complex, the most symbolic, and the most misunderstood book of the Bible. It is very difficult to interpret. When folks think of Revelation it seems the things that come to mind are images of death, destruction, and the vengeance of an angry God being unleashed on a ugly and sinful world. There is a whole segment of the larger church that believes they will be among the few who are spared and who take delight in the rest of us being left behind. Such thinking comes from a corrupted interpretation of Revelation.

Revelation is not intended to a book of doom and gloom but one of hopeful promise for a church that looks toward the day when God will restore the whole of the earth and all of creation. The author of Revelation uses symbolism, often confusing symbolism, to draw people away from sin and the things that defy God and towards God and the Lamb of God, Jesus Christ.

Our reading for this Sunday comes from chapters 21 and 22 of Revelation in which the author John invites readers to imagine a bright and glorious future. We the people of St. Mark's are being invited to do the same. The Church Council will be gathering Saturday morning for a time of discernment and conversation about the path before us.

On Sunday morning our Stewardship for All Seasons team will lead a conversation around imagining and building the future we want to see for ourselves. Our congregation has also been invited to participating in St. Olaf's Nourishing Vocation Project which seeks to help individuals and congregations discover and grow their understanding of how their lives can reflect God's purposes for themselves and the world. In her final sermon Pastor Mary raised up these words from the prophet Isaiah: Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of the past. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

Opportunity to participate in The Nourishing Vocation Project

Vocation comes from the Latin word *vocare* which means "to call." Hence, vocation literally means "calling." To embrace vocation is to recognize that what one does in life is not merely by one's personal choice or for one's personal fulfillment or gain. Instead, God daily calls people to be a part of God's purposes in this world for the sake of the common good. Leaning into the call of God is to live attentive to vocation.

St. Mark's has been invited to participate in *The Nourishing Vocation Project* (NVP) through St. Olaf College. The NVP invites individual participants and whole congregations to deepen their understanding of God's call upon their life and work so that they might live life on purpose and engage in ministry on purpose for the common good. Attentive to this unique time and their particular place, the Nourishing Vocation Project equips participants to more fully be who they are called and created to be and do what they are called and created to do.

Pastor David is looking for 5-6 individuals to participate as Congregational Vocation Ministers (CVM). This team of CVMs will work first to nourish vocation in their lives and later be invited to lead the congregation in the same *work*. As part of this project, **St. Olaf has offered to pay for 3 of our CVMs to attend the Conference on Worship, Theology and Arts at St. Olaf, July 25th-28th.**

This opportunity could not come as a better time in the life of St. Mark's. As we enter a new chapter in the life of our congregation now is a great time to explore and nourish our individual and shared sense of vocation. Thanks to the generous support of our congregation and the St. Mark's Foundation, the Youth Group raised \$1,705.55! These funds will be used to purchase: 5 chicks, 5 goats, 5 piglets, 1 cow, 1 fish farm, 10 bee colonies, and 1 herd of goats (in addition to the 5 goats).

Opportunity to Help a Sick Child in Kihesa

Greetings from Kihesa Lutheran Church, our sister congregation in Iringa, Tanzania. Brayan Mwilonga, age 15, needs our help. Brayan is the fourth of eight children. His family is a member of Kihesa and he was confirmed there. He has been sick for many years, but doctors have finally been able to diagnose his problems as failed kidneys. His parents sold many things in the house and property to provide medical help and dialysis. In a poor country, like Tanzania, they have now become one of the very poor. Unfortunately, Brayan's father has abandoned the family, leaving his mother to deal with everything. Relatives and neighbors have helped, but it is not enough. Brayan will need a kidney transplant; his mother is a candidate. Brayan has missed much schooling due to his illness. Currently he is in standard 7 (seventh grade) with his younger sister.

Please look into your heart and help Brayan. St. Mark's has set up a fund to help Brayan. Checks may be made to St. Mark's with the memo line: Brayan's medical expenses.
