Vague or Incomplete Contracts	Lack of detailed scope, materials, timelines, or payment schedules [1].	Leads to costly change orders and disputes over expectations.
Lack of Verifiable Credentials	Inability to provide proof of current licensing, insurance, or a solid track record [1].	Exposes you to liability, poor workmanship, and legal issues.
Discouraging Permits or Cash-Only Payments	Suggesting work without permits or demanding cash payments [1].	Indicates an attempt to evade regulations, taxes, or accountability.
Poor Communication	Unresponsive, evasive, or unwilling to provide information in writing [1].	Foretells project delays, misunderstandings, and lack of transparency.
Unusually Low Bids	A bid significantly lower than others, often due to omitted work or inferior materials [1].	Likely to result in hidden costs, compromised quality, or unfinished work.

“Be wary of a contract that is devoid of details—or the language is vague at best—regarding the scope of work for the project, responsibilities, payment schedules, and start and stop times.” [1]

Critical Questions to Ask Before Hiring

Thorough vetting through direct questioning is your best defense. Use these questions to assess potential professionals:

For All Professionals (Architects, Engineers, Contractors)

1. **“Can you provide proof of your current license and insurance (general liability and worker’s compensation)?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Verifies legitimacy and protects you from liability [1].
2. **“Can you provide at least three references from recent projects similar to mine?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Allows you to assess their past performance and client satisfaction [1].
3. **“What is your communication protocol, and who will be my primary point of contact?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Establishes clear expectations for updates and issue resolution [1].
4. **“What is your process for handling change orders or unforeseen issues?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Ensures a transparent and fair approach to project modifications [1].

Specific Questions for Architects and Engineers

1. **“How do you ensure your designs align with my budget and local building codes?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Addresses potential cost overruns and regulatory compliance from the design phase.
2. **“How do you coordinate with other professionals (e.g., structural engineer with architect) to ensure a cohesive and buildable design?”**
 - *Why it matters:* Highlights their collaborative approach and ability to integrate various design elements.

Specific Questions for Contractors

1. **“Who will be responsible for obtaining all necessary permits, and will you provide lien waivers?”**

- *Why it matters:* Confirms they handle permits correctly and protects you from subcontractor liens [1].

2. **“What is your proposed payment schedule, tied to specific project milestones?”**

- *Why it matters:* Ensures payments are released upon verifiable progress, not just arbitrary dates [1].

3. **“What is your policy on site cleanliness and debris removal?”**

- *Why it matters:* Clarifies expectations for maintaining a safe and tidy work environment.
