

Tyrone Power's

Series 62 Heart Throb



Tyrone Power was one of Hollywood's great male sex symbols from the 1930s through the 1950s, staring in over 50 films. Power's first big break came in 1936 when Darryl F. Zanuck cast

Power as the leading man in "Lloyds of London". The picture was a huge success and Tyrone Power was catapulted to stardom. In 1940 Hollywood's heart-throb gained action-hero status with his signature role in "The Mark of Zorro". In 1959 Power was filming an intense dueling scene for the movie "Solomon and Sheba" when he suffered a fatal heart attack. He was only 45 years old. Power's spiffy Cadillac is a 1948 model 6267-X, body number 1253. There were 5450 of these cars built that year. This car was shipped to Don Lee at Hillcrest Motors in Hollywood on April 30, 1948. Power paid

\$2994.92 for the car. Features include Hydra-Matic transmission, Hydro-Lectric window lifts, radio, under-seat heaters, auxiliary fog lights, and dual back-up lights. The original color of the car was Cypress Green with tan leather interior. A recent ground-up restoration re-painted the car using British racing green with black undertones. The interior has been re-upholstered in Gucci tan leather. Tyrone Power's car is currently in the care of CLC members Dave and Jaime Callens of California.

One of the easiest ways to distinguish a 1948 model is by looking at the instrument panel. The horseshoe design is unmistakable. Don't you love how it accentuates the curve of the wheel? Another unique aspect of the 1948 62 series are the distinctive three chrome stripes below the rear tail lights.
