FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

March 19, 2023

My dear sisters and brothers,

We rejoice in the salvation the Lord is giving us as we continue entering into the discipline of Lent. Today is named for the entrance antiphon which sings: "Rejoice, Jerusalem!" (Laetare means "rejoice.") Just as in last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus relieved the woman's thirst with living water, today he gives the man born blind his sight—and the light of faith. In these stories (and also in next week's story), God works through Jesus to transform the human condition, bringing healing for body and spirit. Many witness his works—the crowds and the religious leaders—but not all come to faith.

There are many kinds of blindness. We can be blind to the gifts in our own lives, blind to the hurt we unintentionally cause others, and blind to the injustice all around us. We see in today's Gospel that vision can come with a price: the man born blind is expelled from the synagogue because he speaks, without fear, the truth he knows in his heart: that Jesus has healed his eyes, and that only through God could this have come to be.

Lent is a time to open our eyes to the injustices of the world. We must ask ourselves how we can bring the healing and Light of Jesus to one another.

Mis queridas hermanas y hermanos,

Nos regocijamos en la salvación que el Señor nos está dando mientras continuamos entrando en la disciplina de la Cuaresma. Hoy lleva el nombre de la antífona de entrada que canta: "¡Alégrate, Jerusalén!" (Laetare significa "regocijarse").

Así como en el Evangelio del domingo pasado, Jesús alivió la sed de la mujer con agua viva, hoy le da la vista al ciego de nacimiento y la luz de la fe. En estas historias (y también en la historia de la próxima semana), Dios trabaja a través de Jesús para transformar la condición humana, trayendo sanidad para el cuerpo y el espíritu. Muchos son testigos de sus obras, las multitudes y los líderes religiosos, pero no todos llegan a la fe.

Hay muchos tipos de ceguera. Podemos estar ciegos a los regalos en nuestras propias vidas, ciegos al daño que sin querer causamos a otros, y ciegos a la injusticia que nos rodea. Vemos en el Evangelio de hoy que la visión puede tener un precio: el ciego de nacimiento es expulsado de la sinagoga porque habla, sin miedo, la verdad que conoce en su corazón: que Jesús ha sanado sus ojos, y que sólo a través de Dios puede esto haber llegado a ser.

La Cuaresma es un tiempo para abrir los ojos a las injusticias del mundo. Debemos preguntarnos cómo podemos llevar la sanación y la Luz de Jesús unos a otros.

STEWARDSHIP



Stewardship and the Power to be Transformed

The Lenten season is a perfect time to reflect on how you were first introduced to stewardship as a way of life. When did this spirituality first begin to shape the way you live, the decisions you make, and the way in which your faith directs your daily life? I have been thinking about this quite often of late, as I have reflected on the potential each of us has to touch others with the stewardship message. Many years ago, now, a friend who worked in publishing and I were talking about parish life. I was fumbling around, trying to explain the impact that stewardship was having on our parishioners and on the parish. My friend suddenly stopped me and said, “Well of course this is happening! Stewardship can really change our lives, can it not?” His comment broke through my stumbling thoughts, as his remark echoed the U.S. bishops’ insight in Stewardship: A Disciple’s Response. At the very beginning of the bishops’ pastoral letter, they write: “Stewardship is an expression of discipleship that has the power to change how we understand and live out our lives.” What stunned me about my friend’s comment was how passionately he expressed his understanding and how clearly, he saw this. I realized that my experience of him as a giving and generous person was a result of his growth as a steward. His witness in the course of an everyday conversation between friends has remained with me for over ten years, and has urged me on in times when my own “disciple’s response” has seemed weak or lagging. It seems to me that if we are to lead others along the stewardship journey, we must ourselves live, grow and allow ourselves to be transformed by the power of stewardship. We must be prepared to witness to the ways in which stewardship has changed how we “understand and live out our lives.” We may never know the impact our personal sharing or ministerial coordination will have on others, but I can tell you from my own experience of being touched by my friend that the potential is there for us to truly make a difference. What is your story? With whom might you share it during this Lenten season?

La mayordomía y el poder de ser transformados

La temporada de Cuaresma es un momento perfecto para reflexionar sobre cómo fue introducido por primera vez a la corresponsabilidad como una forma de vida. ¿Cuándo comenzó esta espiritualidad a moldear la forma en que vives, las decisiones que tomas y la forma en que tu fe dirige tu vida diaria? He estado pensando en esto muy a menudo últimamente, ya que he reflexionado sobre el potencial que cada uno de nosotros tiene para tocar a otros con el mensaje de mayordomía. Hace muchos años, ahora, un amigo que trabajaba en la publicación y yo hablábamos de la vida parroquial. Estaba buscando a tientas, tratando de explicar el impacto que la corresponsabilidad estaba teniendo en nuestros feligreses y en la parroquia. Mi amigo de repente me detuvo y dijo: “¡Bueno, por supuesto que esto está sucediendo! La mayordomía realmente puede cambiar nuestras vidas, ¿no es así?” Su comentario rompió mis pensamientos tambaleantes, ya que su comentario se hizo eco de la perspectiva de los obispos de EE. UU. en Stewardship: A Disciple’s Response. Al comienzo de la carta pastoral de los obispos, escriben: “La corresponsabilidad es una expresión de discipulado que tiene el poder de cambiar la forma en que entendemos y vivimos nuestras vidas”. Lo que me sorprendió del comentario de mi amigo fue la pasión con la que expresó su comprensión y la claridad con la que vio esto. Me di cuenta de que mi experiencia de él como una persona generosa y generosa era el resultado de su crecimiento como mayordomo. Su testimonio en el curso de una conversación diaria entre amigos ha permanecido conmigo durante más de diez años, y me ha animado en momentos en que mi propia “respuesta de discípulo” parecía débil o rezagada. Me parece que si vamos a guiar a otros a lo largo del camino de la corresponsabilidad, debemos vivir, crecer y permitirnos ser transformados por el poder de la corresponsabilidad. Debemos estar preparados para dar testimonio de las formas en que la mayordomía ha cambiado la forma en que “entendemos y vivimos nuestras vidas”. Es posible que nunca sepamos el impacto que nuestro compartir personal o coordinación ministerial tendrá en los demás, pero puedo decirles por mi propia experiencia de ser tocado por mi amigo que existe el potencial para que nosotros realmente marquemos una diferencia. ¿Cual es tu historia? ¿Con quién podrías compartirlo durante esta temporada de Cuaresma?
