Adult Protective Services (APS) investigates reports of suspected abuse and neglect, including self-neglect of an elder (65+) and dependent adults (18-64). Types of abuse investigated include: Physical, Financial, Emotional, Psychological, Isolation, Abandonment, Abduction, Neglect, and Deprivation of Good/Services. *To report call the toll-free hotline at (844) 751 – 6729. ALPHA RESOURCE CENTER OF SANTA BARBARA

Adult Day Services provides day services for adults (22+ years of age) with intellectual and developmental disabilities. In the Oaks Day Program and Slingshot/Alpha Art Studio, participants receive individualized services tailored to achieve their individualized goals. Lifespan Support Services helps caregivers navigate systems for individuals with intellectual, developmental disabilities, or other special needs. The Help Me *Grow* program, is a network of community partners designed to be a single contact point for parents, doctors, and educators. The Family Resource Center (FRC) supports families through parent-to-parent support groups, system navigation, referrals, advocacy services, and more. The Family Empowerment Center (FEC) helps families navigate the school system by helping parents better understand their child's educational and developmental needs, the IEP process, promote alternative dispute resolution, and support positive relationships between parents and schools. HACSB's creates safe, affordable, and quality housing opportunities for families and individuals, while promoting self-sufficiency and neighborhood revitalization. Workforce Housing assists community members caught between skyrocketing rents and ineligibility for other assistance. All units are located within the City of Santa Barbara. Priority is given to Santa Barbara residents. For more information, visit www.hacsb.org/workforce.

Supportive Housing is designed for individuals in need of supportive services. Services vary depending on the property, but can include case management, job placement assistance, mental health counseling, and independent living skills. Housing Choice Voucher Program is the federal government's program for assisting eligible very low-income families, elderly, and disabled individuals afford decent and safe, housing in the private market. HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE COUNTY OF SANTA BARBARA (HASBARCO)

HASBARCO provides affordable housing opportunities for veterans, seniors, youth transitioning out of Foster Care, individuals experiencing homelessness, persons with disabilities and low-income working families/individuals. Operating through a central administrative office in Lompoc and housing management and maintenance offices in Goleta, Lompoc, and Santa Maria, the Housing Authority provides direct services to applicants, tenants, and private property owners throughout Santa Barbara County, with the exception of the City of Santa Barbara. They own and manage nearly 1,600 affordable rental units, including permanent supportive housing, and administers the federal Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8). HASBARCO's Permanent Supportive Housing is designed for individuals who are homeless or formerly homeless and in need of permanent supportive services. The Resident & Supportive Services Department provides housing retention support to residents, including case management, rental assistance, and referrals to community resources. They focus on building community and fostering collaboration between housing and external partners to ensure residents' needs are met. HOUSING TRUST FUND OF SANTA BARBARA (HTF)

HTF's mission is to expand affordable housing opportunities for low-to-middle income residents and workers of the entire county. HTF finances affordable rental and home ownership for working families, single parents, minimum wage earners to upper moderate income workforce employees, farm workers, senior citizens, homeless persons, and other persons with special needs. South Coast Workforce Homebuyer Program is for qualified first-time homebuyers purchasing resale restricted homes located in South County (Gaviota to Carpinteria and the Buellton, Solvang and Santa Ynez). Under this program HTF will provide 15-year term loans up to 16.5% of the home purchase price or a maximum loan of \$100,000 home purchase price

price or a maximum loan of \$100,000 to first-time homebuyers along with the borrowers required 3% minimum own funds. The loans are currently at 6.25% fixed rate, interest-only. Eleanor Apartments are a small, affordable complex for families in which one or more adults has been diagnosed with a mental illness. Both complexes have waitlists.
