
#### GAELIC PROGRAM FUNDRAISER UNC-CHAPEL HILL

The Gaelic Lectureship at UNC is now in its 2nd year and efforts are underway to obtain permanent funding for this unique program in American higher education. Programs exist in Scotland and Canada but not in U.S. higher education. Tiber Falzett, PhD, has established highly popular courses in Gaelic culture and mythology and has made many public appearances on a variety of Gaelic topics. He is a fluent Gaelic speaker and singer as well as a piper.

In October a fundraising event to bring attention to the lectureship was held on the UNC campus. Representatives from several Scottish related groups, including the SASNC, heard from Dr. Douglas Kelly, President of Scottish Heritage USA, William Caudill, Director of the Scottish Heritage Center at St. Andrews University in Laurinburg and from Dr. Falzett. Robert Dunbar, PhD, Professor of Celtic Studies at the University of Edinburgh discussed academic efforts in Scotland and Kate Forbes, member of the Scottish National Parliament representing Isle of Skye, highlighted government efforts to promote Gaelic culture and language. Everyone enjoyed fine Scottish treats at the reception.
