OCPL Promotes California State Library Career Online High School Program

OC Public Libraries will offer qualified community members the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and credentialed career certificate through Career Online High School, part of the world's first accredited, private online school district. Career Online High School is specifically designed to reengage adults into the education system and prepare them for entry into post-secondary career education or the workforce.

OC Public Libraries will award up to 10 scholarships for Career Online High School to qualified learners looking to earn a high school diploma and advance their careers.

To be considered for the program, applicants must:

- Be an adult aged 19 or over
- Be a resident of Orange County
- **Have a library account in good standing.** If you do not have a library card, simply fill out the <u>online Library Card application form</u> or visit your <u>local library</u> to get one!

Once enrolled, COHS pairs each student with an Academic Coach, who assists with developing an individual career plan, offers ongoing guidance and encouragement, evaluates performance, and connects the learner with the resources needed to demonstrate mastery of the course material.

Classes are supported by board-certified instructors and students have 24/7 access to the online learning platform. Coursework begins in one of eight high-growth, high-demand career fields, before progressing to the core academic subjects. Many students are able to graduate in as few as 4 to 6 months by transferring in previously earned high school credits.



Nothing is Cancelled Virtual Book Tour

Novelist Caroline Leavitt saw her friends' book tours being canceled because of the coronavirus and decided she had to do something about it besides wash her hands. So recently, she launched the Nothing is Cancelled Virtual Book Tour. She's encouraging authors to submit short blog posts in which they talk about their new book, promote somebody else's book and recommend an indie bookstore. Leavitt is posting the authors' contributions on her <u>blog</u>.

"It's just meant to let writers and the literary community know that they're not alone," she told Ron Charles of the Washington Post. "We're all swimming in the same ocean. So we might as well lift each other up so nobody drowns."

She says the response has been overwhelming —almost 80 writers have promised to submit video clips, including Lily King, Ann Hood, Scott Simon and Roxana Robinson. "Authors are such solitary people anyway," Leavitt says, "and it's difficult for indie bookstores even in the best of times, so why not make people feel they're more connected even though they can't shake hands or hug?"

Congratulations to the winners of the FOL 2020 Scholarships


Recently the seven recipients of our Friends of the Los Alamitos Rossmoor Library 2020 student scholarships received their awards. This is a truly a gifted and delightful group of deserving students.

Brian Rogers is an active member of the Boy Scouts earning the rank of Eagle Scout. His scout project involved the Garden Grove Chapman Library where he set up hands-on interactive Lego tables and built an outdoor space to house the growing children's programs.

Running is also a passion for Brian. He says that running tract on the Los Alamitos Cross Country track team taught him patience, diligence and determination.

He created the Outdoor Adventure Club that welcomes all comers to enjoy the great outdoors. An avid Java coder, Brian wishes to become an electrical engineer and eventually work for Google. The ambitious time line Brian has set out for himself charting his academic and vocational career goals for the next 20 years was very impressive. He will begin his college studies next semester at Cal Poly San Louis Obispo.
