SPAE is having a stellar year of workshops for students. In July 2024 poet Gregory Maurice guided students at Camp Flourish in writing poetry and at St. Gabriel the Archangel in January 2025. Greg will be at Yeatman Middle School (St. Louis Public Schools) in February 2025. Student poetry is always published as part of the workshop experience. October 2024 saw the return of Scots Fiddle workshops with Brian McNeill. In 2024

the virtual workshops took place at five schools: The STEAM Academy High School (Ferguson/Florissant School District), Ritenour High School, Gateway Science Academy, and two middle schools in the Pattonville School District – Pattonville Heights and Holman Middle Schools. Students performed their Scottish music in subsequent concerts.

Thank you so much for your steadfast support of SPAE. Today, I'm reaching out personally about an important issue that will impact not only SPAE, but the entire Missouri arts landscape: Will you please sign up for action alerts with <u>Missouri Citizens for the Arts</u> and follow them on <u>social media?</u>

For more than 40 years, Missouri Citizens for the Arts has provided a presence for Missouri's arts industry, including SPAE at the state Capitol. When funding for the arts is presented as a "discretionary" choice, MCA is there to remind 197 state legislators that for every one dollar invested in the arts, more than eight dollars are returned to the Missouri economy. MCA has successfully saved MAC from being zeroed out of the state budget to securing over \$10 million in the FY25 state budget to support over 500 arts organizations and events statewide.

Meanwhile, MCA has no paid staff, only volunteers. So advocating for arts dollars is tough work and they need help for full amplification.
