


Drive throughs not omnipresent in St. Paul

- Minority of coffee shops, restaurants, and pharmacies have drive throughs
 - o 2 of 49 coffee shops
 - 36 of 640 restaurants
 - 8 of 17 pharmacies
 - None of the 5 local pharmacies (non-national chain)
- Banks are the one land use type that mostly has drive throughs
 - o 31 of 40













Proposed amendments

- Eliminate drive throughs as a permitted use in the B4 Central Business District, OS, and B1 districts.
- 2. Limit drive throughs in the T2 Traditional Neighborhood District to those associated with a bank or pharmacy.
- 3. Require additional stacking for drive throughs (6, 12, or 14 minimum).
- 4. Require direct pedestrian access to businesses with drive throughs that does not require pedestrians to cross drive-through lanes or other vehicular circulation.
- 5. Delete "coffee kiosk" from the Zoning Code.
- 6. Introduce definition and standards for "walk up service window"
- Prohibit drive through lanes or their primary driveways from within 300 feet of an LRT/BRT station.



Implementation notes

- Existing drive throughs that become nonconforming may continue, even if altered, so long as:
 - they are not expanded; and
 - any dimensional nonconformity is not increased.
- 58 of St. Paul's 75 drive throughs (not including the Capitol Area) are already nonconforming
- Estimated 12 additional drive throughs would become nonconforming under the current proposal, including 8 fast-food restaurants and 4 banks



Problems with drive throughs

Off-site queuing

- Traffic studies have shown a need for 5 to 26 vehicle stacking spaces
- Highest numbers are for coffee and fast-food


