

Did You Know?

The last verified UCV Veteran to die was Mr. Pleasant Riggs Crump, who died on December 31, 1951 at the age of 104.

A native of Alabama, he enlisted in 1864, in the 10th Alabama Infantry, fought in Virginia and was at the Appomattox surrender.

The United Confederate Veterans awarded Crump the honorary title of colonel in their organization.

He is buried in Lincoln, Alabama


The Battle of Fort Sumter Ignites the Civil War



On April 12, 1861, the first shots of the Civil War were fired at Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina. This battle is often considered the official start of the war. Union forces, under the command of Major Robert Anderson, found themselves under siege by Confederate troops led by Brigadier General P.G.T. Beauregard.

Despite a spirited defense, the Union garrison was forced to surrender after 34 hours of bombardment. According to the American Battlefield Trust, the fall of Fort Sumter galvanized the North, leading to a surge of enlistments and a firm resolve to preserve the Union. Conversely, it emboldened the South, solidifying their determination to fight for independence.

The Battle of Fort Sumter had no casualties, but its significance cannot be overstated. It set the stage for the bloody conflict that would follow and underscored the deep divisions within the nation. The battle also demonstrated the strategic importance of controlling key fortifications and harbors.



Congressional Medal of Honor Recipient Visits the Key Camp

Joining the Key Camp for our May meeting was **US Army Veteran Chris Crowley** of Leawood, KS who is a neighbor of **Commander McPherson**.

Crowley was among his group of a Vietnam "Dustoff" group that was honored this past fall with the Congressional Gold Medal for their service in evacuating wounded soldiers during the war.

As s a Dust-off helicopter pilot, he would land his chopper in close range of the fighting, often clipping the rotary blades among the tree tops. With very no machine guns to defend them from enemy fire, nearly one-third of all Dust-off helicopters were shot down, many resulting in the crews deaths.

At the risk of his own life, Crowley flew over 1,000 missions resulting in the evacuation of more than 3,000 soldiers.

It was an honor to have **Chris** join us and is always the case, we thank and honor *all* of our Compatriots who also served our country. You are all **Hero's**!



Congratulations to all and thank you for representing the Key Camp so admirably.




Compatriot Lane Smith of the Key Camp was at the Miami County Historical Society where he gave his presentation on the Trial of Jefferson Davis but with a twist. He did it as Robert E Lee defending Jefferson Davis. Lane asks the audience to be the jury and presents all the facts.

Then he asked the audience why they think not one Confederate was ever charged with Treason and explained the reason behind it.

He had a great crowd of open minded and respectful listeners.

Lane was joined by the Ladies of the Plains- Monet Kietzman and Key Camp Compatriot Jim Thornton.

"They couldn't hit an elephant at this distance" Yankee General John Sedgwick spoke these words just moments before being shot dead by a Confederate sniper at Spotsylvania.





With a bit of <u>levity</u>, I know my friend Lane Smith won't be surprised to know that General John Sedgwick is in my family tree. So, here it is Lane.... My 5th great grandfather was Sgt. George Colton Kellogg 1737-1808 and a Revolutionary War Patriot. In fact, he was my ancestor for whom I joined the Sons of the American Revolution. His mother was Mary Sedgwick who was a great aunt of John Sedwick. OK, we got that out of the way.

Sedgwick has a large equestrian monument of him on the Gettysburg battlefield and also at West Point. The Kansas county where Wichita is, was named after him. Sedgwick holds the distinction of being the highest ranking general officer to be killed in the war. Although my favorite Yankee, Gen. James Birdsey McPherson was actually in command of an army at the time of his death, Sedgwick had the most senior rank by all major generals killed. (However, McPherson was a brigadier general in the regular army and outranked Sedgwick, who was a colonel). Upon hearing of his death, Lt Gen Ulysses S Grant, flabbergasted by the news, repeatedly asked, "Is he really dead"?

His nickname was "Uncle John" and his death was met with sorrow, even by Robert E Lee. It seems Sedgwick was reportedly out in the open at the Battle of Spotsylvania Court House chiding his men, who were ducking for cover from Confederate sharpshooters. He was quoted as saying, "What? Men dodging single bullets? What will they do when they open fire along the whole line?" Although ashamed, his men continue to flinch and he said, "Why are you dodging like this? They couldn't hit an elephant at this distance."


These were Sedgwick's last words as a bullet hit him under the left eye and he fell mortally wounded.

So, with McPherson and Sedgwick, I have the dubious honor of having not only *two* Kansas County's named for my kin but also the two highest ranking soldiers killed in the war. Eat your heart out Lane!

And now you know, the rest of the story. Good day! (P.S. There is also a Rick's College!)

Trump Order: RESTORING TRUTH AND SANITY TO AMERICAN HISTORY

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered:

It is the policy of my Administration to restore Federal sites dedicated to history, including parks and museums, to solemn and uplifting public monuments that remind Americans of our extraordinary heritage, consistent progress toward becoming a more perfect Union, and unmatched record of advancing liberty, prosperity, and human flourishing. Museums in our Nation's capital should be places where individuals go to learn — not to be subjected to ideological indoctrination or divisive narratives that distort our shared history.

To advance this policy, we will restore the Smithsonian Institution to its rightful place as a symbol of inspiration and American greatness — igniting the imagination of young minds, honoring the richness of American history and innovation, and instilling pride in the hearts of all Americans.

Further:

- (ii) take action to reinstate the pre-existing monuments, memorials, statues, markers, or similar properties, as appropriate and consistent with 43 U.S.C. 1451 et seq., 54 U.S.C. 100101 et seq., and other applicable law; and
- (iii) take action, as appropriate and consistent with applicable law, to ensure that all public monuments, memorials, statues, markers, or similar properties within the Department of the Interior's jurisdiction do not contain descriptions, depictions, or other content that inappropriately disparage Americans past or living (including persons living in colonial times), and instead focus on the greatness of the achievements and progress of the American people or, with respect to natural features, the beauty, abundance, and grandeur of the American landscape.

Note: this order, however, DOES NOT apply to Arlington Cemetery, which is under the control of the Dept of Defense. There's undoubtedly more to come.

We will learn about the key role the Arsenal played in the community, which at the time was the western frontier. Join us on Thursday to hear Chris's presentation and enjoy some BBQ and Key Camp comradery.




