### The Confederate's Corner

Greetings to all compatriots and friends of the Major Thomas J. Key Camp #1920.

The June 2023 meeting was attended by 15 members and 8 guests. This was the 237<sup>th</sup> regular meeting of the Major Thomas J Key Camp #1920



Our June speaker was State Commander and Key Camp Adjutant Lawson Rener who spoke about the Fayetteville Confederate Cemetery and the Southern Women's Association Memorial event in which Lawson was to be the keynote speaker.

Lawson showed slides of the cemetery and told of its history and of more than 600 dead buried there from Confederate forces of Missouri, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana.

The **Key Camp** elected to donate \$100 toward the Southern Women's Memorial Association in Fayetteville, Arkansas. The motion made by **Compatriot Walt McKenzie** and approved unanimously.

The **Key Camp** voted enthusiastically to name our annual Camp picnic, the **Col. James "Spike" Speicher** picnic.

Compatriot M<sup>c</sup>Pherson presented "Key Kamp Kapers", a ppt presentation that included pictures of compatriots who participated at the Lone Jack Heritage Days and the Mine Creek Park Day events on behalf of the Key Camp. That was followed by a segment called "Mystery Compatriot" that featured Adjutant Rener from his high school days back in 1986. The **Thomas J Key Camp #1920** received its charter as an official camp under **the Sons of Confederate Veterans** on May 22<sup>nd</sup> 2000. At that time, eight members were listed upon the charter. Leading that effort was retired **Colonel James L. "Spike" Speicher**.

# June Rappenings

The war has ended. Fierce battles have been fought in Northwest Arkansas, including the Battle of Pea Ridge, the Battle of Prairie Grove, and the Battle of Fayetteville. The harsh winters of 1861-1862 have left many soldiers very ill and claimed many lives. Graves are everywhere across Northwest Arkansas and the dead lay just where they fell.

Imagine to, living in Fayetteville in 1866. The city with a population of just under 1000, still mourning its dead and rebuilding from the destruction of the just ended war. Mass graves, lonely graves in pastures and roadsides held the remains of Union and Confederate dead.

The Federal government made arrangements to bury all of the Union dead in National Cemeteries, including the National Cemetery in Fayetteville. Confederate soldiers, however, were left where they'd fallen or where they'd been buried, sometimes in a mass grave or roadside grave.

Imagine also being the family member left behind... the wife, mother, sister, or daughter of a fallen Confederate soldier. All they wanted was a proper burial for their loved ones; they wanted them to be remembered. For this reason, the Southern Memorial Association was formed in 1872.

You could talk about dignity and about love no matter the side of war; you could talk about how important it is to remember war. Let me just share the words of ladies from the Southern Memorial Association, as they worked to raise funds for moving the bodies of their dead. These words are written on an informational plaque inside the Confederate Cemetery...


"Help us gather the moldering bones of our soldiers from the barren hillsides and place them beside their fallen brothers to rest where their graves may be bedewed with the tears of their kindred and strewn by the hand of affection with brightest flowers."

Those words will forever haunt me. So poetic... so beautiful... so filled with grief and desire to bury their dead with dignity and love... filled with, I can only imagine, a desire for closure. And after one year of raising the funds, they celebrated the dedication of the cemetery.

Upon arrival at Confederate Cemetery, you'll enter the gate and cross beyond the rock wall that was built in 1885. An informational plaque rests just beyond the gate with the story of how it all came to be. Beyond sits a gazebo where you can sit and rest.

Confederate Cemetery is one of the most peaceful places you can visit. Beautiful, old, very tall trees shade the stone graves. Grass grows all around, not perfectly mown but still kept up quite nicely. It's simply gorgeous and beautiful.

Graves are arranged by state with a monument in the middle pointing to each state's section... Arkansas, Missouri, Texas, and Louisiana. At the top of the cemetery are the Arkansas graves. Most are either unmarked or not legible anymore, though there are a few that have writing, including the grave of Brigadier General William Yarnell Slack.





You just can't get over how peaceful and beautiful it truly is.

If you find yourself in the Fayetteville area, this is a must stop to appreciate one of few Confederate Cemetery's in our area.




# Meanwhile in Algginsville

# Colt Model 1855 "Root"





.The picture (above left) is the pistol from this account and on the (above right) is what that revolver would look like if it were not damaged.


Above left is a captured Colt Model 1855 "Root" side hammer revolver. This .28 caliber, five-shot percussion revolver, belonged to Lieutenant Colonel Bartley B. Boone of the 2nd Mississippi Infantry, who was captured by Javan B. Irvine of the 1st Minnesota Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Company A, during the Battle of First Manassas.

At First Manassas, the 1st Minnesota had not yet been issued regular army uniforms and most of the men were wearing red flannel shirts, similar to the style worn by both the 4th Alabama and several companies of the **2nd Mississippi**.

During some of the hottest fighting on the far Confederate left, a couple of companies from the 1st Minnesota were separated from the rest of their regiment and found themselves on the left and rear of the 2nd Mississippi. As the regiment was taking casualties from fire from this direction, Lt. Col. Boone thought that the troops were "friendlies" of the 4th Alabama. He rode forward to order the men to stop firing on their friends. The uniform confusion allowed Private Irvine of the 1st Minnesota to force Lt. Col. Boone to surrender. Boone was the highest-ranking Confederate officer captured at First Manassas. At gunpoint, Irvine forced Boone to dismount, disarmed him, and turned him over to a Union lieutenant to be taken to General Irvin McDowell. While Irvine sent Boone's sword with him, he kept the revolver for himself.






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# Miscelaneous

Adjutant Lawson Rener was out this past weekend, doing some hiking around Osceola, Missouri when he stopped by Iconium Cemetery and took some pictures.

Nearby, on his attack on Osceola, Sen. James Lane and a band of jayhawkers, defeated a secessionist force, looted the town of 2,500 residents, liberated hundreds of slaves, and summarily executed nine locals. Of the 800 buildings in town, only three were spared from burning. The town never really recovered and has less than a 1,000 residents today. The raid by Lane is said to have inspired the attack on Lawrence by William Clarke Quantrill.

These items came courtesy of Compatriot Neal Hanley of the Leavenworth Camp who felt the Key Camp would enjoy displaying them.

In addition, Commander Schley purchased an 1855 Sharps Carbine Rifle to add to our gun display. Known for its long-range accuracy, the Sharps rifle played a prominent role in the Bleeding Kansas conflict during the 1850's, particularly at the hands of anti-slavery forces.

It was used in the Civil War by both Union and Confederate Cavalry armies prior to being replaced by the seven-shot Spencer carbines. **Thanks Walt!** 










