The July 2023 meeting was attended by members and guests This was the 239th regular meeting of the Major Thomas J Jey Camp #1920





The Key Camp displayed our weapons and artifacts, weapon firing demonstrations were presented, both Yankee and Confederate troops fired upon each other and the cannons roared. Several hundred folks came out to enjoy the day where on October 25th, 1964, on the banks of Mine Creek, two Union brigades of approximately 2500 troops defeated an out gunned 7,000 Confederate troops under the command of General Sterling Price. Mine Creek was the largest Civil War battle fought in Kansas and one of the largest cavalry engagements of the War Between the States.

Compatriot Larry G. Sumner

My 2x grandfather **Private Robert Nelson Sumner, Sr.** was in Company L, 22nd Regt. NC Infantry was mustered in on March 12, 1862, along with his 3 brothers and 5 cousins.

On April 2, 1865, he was captured at Hatcher's Run, Virginia. He was then confined to Hart's Island NY Harbor, On June 20th, 1865, he took the Oath of Allegiances. After he returned home, he married the girl in the next holler over and raised 13 more kids besides my great grandfather and his little brother. He went back to becoming a dirt farmer again. He was from Trinity, NC in Randolph County. He is buried at the Mt. Gilead Cemetery.

I have been to his gravesite and his home in which it still stands on Sumner Rd. I am very proud to be from the same blood of this true Confederate, He never owned any slaves. He was fighting against the Northern Aggression for his own family land and the wellbeing of his family.



Compatriot John Atherton

My ancestor **Pvt. John Henry Fisher**, Kanawha Artillery (battery). He enlisted July 27, 1861, in Mercer, W.V. at age 28 and while under the command of Captain Thomas E Jackson, was captured at Ft Donnelson Feb 16, 1862, and sent to Camp Douglas. He died of pneumonia on March 12, 1862, and is buried at Oakwood Cemetery in Chicago, Illinois.







The Lincolns' Confederate Relatives

Did you know ... While Abraham Lincoln was

President, several of his wife's brothers served in

the Confederate Army?

FIVE LINCOLN BROTHERS-IN-LAW SERVED IN THE CONFEDERATE STATES ARMY, THREE DIED OPPOSING HIS INVASION OF THEIR HOMELAND...

David Todd, the black sheep of the family ran away from home to fight in the Mexican war at age 14. Confederate officer and briefly commandant of Libby Prison in Richmond...

Samuel Todd was killed at the battle of Shiloh in April 1862. Four other brothers were present at the battle also.

George R.C. Todd served as a surgeon in the Army of Northern Virginia and was at Gettysburg with General Lee.

Alexander "Aleck" Todd was the youngest and served in Kentucky's famed Orphan Brigade. He was at Shiloh and Vicksburg as aide de camp to his brother Benjamin much of the time. He was killed by friendly fire near Baton Rouge, Louisiana in August 1862.

General Benjamin Hardin Helm was killed at the battle of Chickamauga Ga. in 1863, where within an hour of the order to advance, a third of the men of the Orphan Brigade were lost. It is said Lincoln mourned his death, but Mary Todd Lincoln did not; her niece recalling: "She knew that a single tear shed for a dead enemy would bring torrents of scorn and bitter abuse on both her husband and herself.


Stone Mountain



Stone Mountain, the largest bas-relief sculpture in the world, much larger than Mount Rushmore, and the most popular tourist spot in Georgia. It is 90 by 190 feet, recessed 42 feet into the mountain. In 1916, it was conceived by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and officially completed in 1972. Since it is carved in granite, it will last longer than any other achievement by human beings. In other words, when all the buildings, bridges, dams and engineering feats of the human race fall into ruin and dust, the granite carvings of Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis, and Stonewall Jackson will endure. It is fitting, I think, that the greatest ideas and the noblest heroism should be remembered in the most enduring monuments.

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
********NEXT CAMP MEETING*********
