Speaking of Pie and the Methodist church --

During RAGBRAI the Iowa Annual Conference created a map that was sponsored by United Methodist Communications to direct riders to meals and events on the route.

On the first evening of the ride, when bicyclists rolled into Storm Lake, IA, the reality of the quantity of food and pie served at the Storm Lake United Methodist Church was eye-opening. From 3:00 p.m til 6:00 p.m. when they ran out of food, more than 1,200 hundred people were served a heaping plate of spaghetti with meat sauce, garlic bread, lettuce salad, and their choice of pie.

Jefferson First United Methodist Church sold 880 burritos, about 1,000 pieces of pie, 300 bars, and gallons of tea and coffee, which had a tent set up along the main route.

Lakes United Methodist Church worked with two other churches in Lake View to sell 2,200 pieces of pie and ice cream. I don't have any figures for the rest of the ride.

In three days, that's 4,400 pieces of pie!! Wow people sure love pie!!

Osceola UMC hosts school supply event to meet 'extraordinary need'

This past school year, 31% of Iowa schools had a rate higher than 50% of students participating in the free or reduced school lunch program, including all of the Clarke Community Schools, both East Union schools, both Central Decatur schools, and both Mormon Trail Schools. Our area schools are a hot spot of rural poverty in Iowa.

To help ease the transition and put the kids on the best track for future success, Osceola United Methodist Church recently hosted a backpack and school supply giveaway, along with a school clothes voucher program for families. We have done this event in various ways over the past several years.

The need was extraordinary this year, with an unexpected 19.5% increase from last year. The church distributed 380 filled backpacks, 62 more than last year, representing nearly a full quarter of the students in Clarke County.

The goal is not just to help people in our community, but to also allow them to receive with dignity and pride and to be able to feel like they are a part of something that helps others.

In our area the Cambridge United Methodist church and Nazareth Lutheran church are helping our Cambridge residents by providing a snack after school at the Cambridge bus stops.

The snack will include a granola bar, PBJ or another nutritious offering, a drink, and some fruit or vegetable. The Methodist serve approximately 40 snacks a week on Thursday. And the Lutheran church expects to serve an equal number when they start their snack day on Tuesdays.

In Iowa, 238,290 people are facing hunger - and of them 68,990 are children. That means 1 in 11 children face hunger daily.

We address critical life-safety issues – The repair should only address a critical need. 2. Assist individuals in need. 3. Fix a problem & improve the living conditions of residents.




Another New Roof
