Annual Convention - Austin, Texas

The General Federation of Women's Clubs Annual Convention was held June 29th to July 1st in Austin, Texas. I went a day early so I could join in the tours offered in conjunction with the conference. Friday's tour of Austin was superb! We had a guided tour of the Texas Capital Building and self-tours of the Lynden Baines Johnson Presidential Library, the Bullock Texas State History Museum, and the GFWC Texas State Women's Club Headquarters—a magnificent mansion the organization designed and built in the 30's. We were royally entertained with a Texas BBQ lunch.

During the business meetings resolutions were discussed and accepted/rejected as were bylaws. Awards were presented with Oregon winning awards in website, leadership, fundraising, and domestic awareness and prevention.

I attended the Epsilon Sigma Omicron (ESO) breakfast and learned more about this GFWC club. Oregon has recently reactivated its ESO club. If you are interested, there is lots of information online. To join and stay a member, you need to read a variety of books and write a couple of sentences about the book. Remember, GFWC has its roots in an organization formed when a female reporter was not permitted to attend a presentation by Chares Dickens!

At a workshop on Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention, Oregon City Woman's Club Healing Heart Walk was one of the top projects featured. I was asked to attend so I could elaborate on the project. The description was so good all I added was participants also decorated pinecones for the Washington, DC Christmas tree.

Joseph Starita, a journalism professor at the University of Nebraska. spoke at one of the business sessions. He noted how women have become the agents of social change worldwide and illustrated this assertion using his knowledge of Susan La Flesche, an Omaha Native American who became the first native doctor 31 years before women could vote!

Things I learned:

• Lyndon Johnson "was born in a home with no electricity, running water, radio or television. He lived through two

world wars and the Great Depression.... Six months after he left office, a man walked on the moon."

- The Woodstock music festival was going on the same day I was married. (That's why I don't remember much about it!
- I now know who Chip and Joanna Gaines are.
- There are a million and a half bats that live under the bridge two blocks from the Marriott.
- The JW Marriot Austin is a fabulous place to stay. The hotel employees are gracious and helpful!
- Look out if someone starts a statement with, "Bless her/ his heart."

More importantly:

- The funds we donated to provide milk for children in Tanzania provide a multitude of benefits in that country. The children are being nourished and so are paying more attention and learning more because their tummies are full. The milk is supplied by farmers who have received animals from Heifer International and who have more milk that their families need. These farmers have milk for their households and an income generated by the surplus milk.
- The conference was attended by 664 individuals representing 49 states and several foreign countries. Of the 664, 103 were attending their first GFWC conference.
- Collectively, GFWC members reported 7.4 million volunteer hours in 2017, the equivalent of 3500 full-time employees.

The 2020 GFWC Annual Convention will be in Atlanta, Georgia June 27 to July 1. Y'all come!
