#### Why No Cell Phones at Camp Blue Diamond

In a world where smartphones are always within arm's reach, the idea of spending a few days without one might seem unimaginable, especially for kids and teens. At Camp Blue Diamond, we believe that unplugging from technology is one of the most powerful gifts we can give to our campers. That's why we have a no-cell-phone policy. What got me thinking about this was a recent conversation with the mother of a new camper asking if her daughter could bring a cell phone to camp. While we will never deny a camper or parent who insists on speaking to each other that opportunity, we really encourage independence while at camp. We definitely encourage letters and postcards to let your camper know that you are thinking about them and everything at home is good. Here's why we don't allow cell phones:

- 1. Real Connections Over Screen Time Camp Blue Diamond is about making friends, building relationships, and being fully present with others. When campers aren't distracted by texts, social media, or games, they naturally engage more with their peers and counselors. Shared experiences like canoeing, roasting marshmallows, or simply playing cards become more meaningful when everyone is fully involved in the moment.
- **2.** A Break from Social Media Pressure Let's be honest—social media can be a lot, especially for young people. Taking a break from the constant pressure to look perfect, gain likes, or keep up with online drama is often a relief for campers. Without phones, campers get a chance to just *be themselves*, free from comparison or judgment.
- **3. Building Independence and Confidence -** Part of the magic of camp is giving kids a safe space to grow. When campers don't have the option to immediately text home with every challenge or complaint, they learn to problem-solve, communicate, and rely on themselves and the community around them. That's not just character-building, it's empowering.
- **4. Digital Detox = Mental Reset -** Being surrounded by nature, engaging in creative play, and simply slowing down are all incredibly good for mental health. Without screens, campers often sleep better, feel less anxious, and have more energy. Camp becomes a time to recharge emotionally and mentally, something we all need from time to time.
- **5. Safety and Simplicity -** Cell phones can also create safety concerns and logistical headaches—from lost or damaged devices to unwanted photos or videos being taken. Removing phones from the equation helps protect everyone's privacy and keeps the focus on fun, not tech troubleshooting.

We know that leaving a phone behind can be tough, for campers *and* parents. But year after year, we see how transformative this experience can be. When the distractions are gone, the connections grow. And that's what summer camp is all about.

So go ahead, send a letter, write a postcard, and wait for those smiling camp photos. Your child is out there making memories the old-fashioned way, and that's exactly how it should be.

#### Support Girls' Education in Nepal—One Step at a Time

In 2022, Camp Blue Diamond proudly partnered with the New Community Project's *Give a Girl a Chance* initiative, helping Chepang girls in Nepal stay in school and build safer, brighter futures. Now in 2025, we have a new opportunity to make a difference!

These young students face a grueling 7-hour roundtrip walk through mountainous terrain just to attend school. Along the way, they brave unpredictable monsoon rains and even monkey attacks. To protect their limited school clothes and shoes, most girls make the trek in worn-out clothing and sandals.

This summer, New Community Project is launching a new way to help—by providing **travel kits** designed to ease the girls' journey. Each \$53 donation funds one kit, which includes:

- ↑ 1 pair of locally made shoes
  ↑ 1 pair of socks
  ↑ 1 spare school uniform
  - ♦ 1 umbrella (for rain *and* monkey defense—seriously!)




