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

Cross-over patterns are the life blood of most warm water flies. Patterns occupying our fly boxes show variants depicting clousers, deceivers, woolies, and jig heads. October focuses on warm water, deceiver-style variants.

The attention to feather movement, wet shape forms, and castability are on the menu. Join us this month for an event that zeros in on what really produces more strikes, making this a session not to be missed. See you there.

1. Bring:

- sharp tying scissors.
- a small tube of Super Glue.
- 6/0 or 8/0 black or neutral thread.
- magnifiers with a power of 2.5 5.0. They will definitely help you see materials placement better.
- a battery powered light source (i.e., LED reading light).

Yellowstone to Cull the Wild Bison.

Up to about 175 years ago millions of Bison roamed our mid-western prairies in vast herds that made the ground rumble when they ran. For thousands of years the Native American

Tribes had a culture that was centered on these magnificent animals. They were food, clothing, tent material and by their grazing were grooming a vast grassland that was settled by us European Immigrants. Our early settlers needed both the grazing land and the water, and so began killing these animals off in horrifying numbers. By 1900, fewer than 1000 of these animals remained, and only 23 Yellowstone Park Bison.

This destruction of the basis of their culture had an unforgivable impact on the native peoples that had depended on the herds for almost every element of their lifestyle. Through the efforts of Conservation Minded Citizens, the US Fish and Wildlife Service believes that today there are 20,500 Plains Bison in conservation herds, and perhaps as many as 420,000 in commercial herds. So as a minimum the animals are no longer near extinction.

Even better, the animals in the Yellowstone herd are the last true buffalo that still have all the instincts of self-survival. Several Conservation minded groups are watching the Yellowstone herds year-round to protect the natural genetic diversity of its three distinct

herds. Recently news about capturing some of the growing numbers of animals in the herd and move them to tribal lands to restore the culture of our Native Americans gave me reason to feel good about the thinning of the Yellowstone Herds. I hope I was not too optimistic. The problem of having the excess animals migrating north over grazing land for cattle ranches is also important. A balance must be found here.

One of the most pressing needs is to protect the Bison's seasonal migration needs and protect a historically overhunted species. This is a hot button for the United States Group of the Y2Y project, the Yellowstone to Yukon Project. I support this project, and it is huge. It attempts to protect the last mountain range in North America that runs from our high-country parks around Yellowstone up the valley to the Canadian Province of Alberta and on up that valley to the Alaskan border.

The major issue is the recreational development of the mountain beauty at the expense of having the animals have more limited access to move to safer ground when adverse weather limits their ability to stay where they are. In a nutshell, this is our best

and possibly our last chance to establish some kind of truce with nature, and to preserve the fragile relationship we have with our wilderness ecology.

An exciting event occurred this year. An all-white Bison Calf was born June 4th. These rare animals are part of the Native Prophesy of the Sioux Nations.

The little animal has been named "Waken Gli" which means "Returns Sacred" in the Lakota language. Chief Arvol Looking Horse says that the white calf is a universal symbol of purity, and the prophesy is "a warning for us to do something" about the collapsing environment.

Tribal Groups see the calf's arrival as a sacred blessing, a warning and the fulfillment of a 3000-year-old tribal prophesy. The prediction is that the world will experience immense trouble and suffering if people do not work together to protect the environment.

I would hope that we can unite with the Native American Tribes in this prophesy and the mission of doing something about the damage to our planet. I am even more worried that the White Calf has not been seen again since its birth.



How Are Our Fish Doing?

It is the allergy season, and you who are pollen sensitive need to be careful. Our delayed fall weather is making it worse. I remember the pollen season in the Atlanta Area. My black VW would be so covered with yellow pine pollen that it looked like a heavy frost layer. With our fall rains a bit behind schedule, be sure to water those plants. If you have Crepe Myrtles, a good soaking every other day will keep them blooming for a bit.

Last month I documented the Alaskan Salmon Harvest by the bears in Katmai National Park. The big animals work together to get fat for the Alaskan Winter. I grew up along the Columbia River between Washington and Oregon, and our salmon fishery was very important even back in the 1950's. One of the last Dams to go in along that border was the Dalles Dam. It drowned Celilo Falls which was a Native American Fishing site documented in the 1855 Treaty with the Nez Perce Tribe. Here is an old photograph of the fishing there by the native tribes.

This was very dangerous; however, it was their right to fish there. These falls were drowned by the Dalles Dam.

What I am concerned about is the current push to remove useless dams on the Klamath River and on the lower Snake River is turning into a remove all dams. A very large amount of the water for agriculture and much of the Electric Power in the Northwest States comes from those dams. I am sure that the salmon can traverse these lower Columbia River Dams with relative ease.

With the green power folks feeling that Hydroelectric Power is a great deal better than coal fired power, I am concerned that this movement to remove all dams is contra productive and hence not very well thought out. Replacing the lost power with mini reactors in regions all over the Pacific Northwest will take time and cost a great deal of money. My position is that I resist "fixing things" that are not broken.

With the cooling of fall, be sure to get those young people out there and fishing. Our panfish will be active, and the bass and catfish will be hunting for an endless lunch counter. The last gasp of a Texas Summer is so beautiful with the leaf color changes that just being out there is almost



a religious experience. So, start thinking about our short cold and usually wet fall weather. Try to get out there and be ready for the beginning of the trout stocking program. I do not get very excited about a truck load of hatchery Rainbows. I was raised in the Western Mountains and fished for real trout, and their cousins, Salmon and Steelhead. But a trout is a trout so I will probably be out there.

In any case, the end of our fishing year means that you need to renew those licenses, so do not forget. I am seldom asked to show my license in Texas, but it is still the law, and they are very inexpensive for we senior fly fishers. Start hinting about that item you want a loved one to add to your Christmas List. In the meantime, be safe and enjoy the last of our outdoor season.
