Fishin' Tales

As we come to the end of another year fishing together, I enjoyed reviewing all that the Dallas Fly Fishers achieved in 2021. Behind the scenes, the DFF Board succeeded in accomplishing many goals and supported one another through some difficult challenges. When Al Hillman, our 2020-2021 president, passed away suddenly and unexpectedly in early January, we navigated leadership roles, which in turn led us to examine our by-laws and 501(c)(3) status. In updating our by-laws and nonprofit operations, we evaluated our banking experiences and how the club could be better served by a different banking group, so we moved to a new financial institution. In wanting to share in camaraderie and seeing friends we missed during 2020, we moved to holding hybrid meetings-keeping our Zoom platform while simultaneously returning to inperson meetings. We continued our beloved outings to the Gannons and South Fork, CO and helped sponsor the Lake Athens Fly Fishing Festival and the wonderful charities that directly benefit from LAFFF. joyfully returned to educating others about fly fishing and fly tying, attending the Texas Fly Fishing and Brew Festival, working with groups at Dallas Baptist University, the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center, public outreach at Cabela's in Allen, and sponsoring New Member fishing events. We participated in Dutch Baughman's and Barry Webster's Fly Fishing Skills Classes via Zoom, and we fished together at monthly outings to destinations within and outside of the Metroplex. We also became an Amazon supported charity through https://smile.amazon.com/. It has been fun being active together!

Four of the biggest decisions the DFF Board made concerned our meeting locale, a 2022

auction, membership dues, and the annual Holiday Party. Typically, the DFF holds its fundraiser auction every even year in March or April. Due to the COVID-19 Global Pandemic, the DFF did not hold an auction in 2020, which meant our 2021 treasury operated from our 2018 auction fundraiser income and current membership dues. The immediate issue became our meeting locale. The hotel industry changed their business model and operating standards almost overnight, and new ownership meant new contracts at doubled price points. A search committee worked diligently to find a comparable hotel within the same geography and at our 2019 budget. Embassy Suites Park Central came the closest to achieving all our parameters. It didn't work for our needs, though, especially since it sold, and we had to rely on another new management to honor pricing from the previous management group. In the DFF's 49 years, we have met at the Filter Building on White Rock Lake, the Addison Conference Center, REI (old location at 635 and the Tollroad), the Wyndham/ Sonesta Suites, and Embassy Suites. With membership dissatisfaction at Embassy Suites, we recognized it was time to abandon the hotel industry as our meeting locale, so we searched again. Implementing membership demographics, we chose the First United Methodist Church Richardson as our proposed new meeting locale for November and Monday 10 January 2022. When our Meeting Location Survey results are tabulated, we will know whether or not we will continue meeting at FUMCR in 2022 or continue searching for a new meeting locale.

We decided for 2022 we would hold our auction, but as COVID variants created spikes and new cases, we debated how to hold

the auction—in-person or on-line. As COVID vaccinations increased and cases declined, we made the decision to seek a venue and hold our auction fundraiser in person. We secured the Plano Event Center as our auction locale and want to see you and your friends at our auction fundraiser on Monday, March 7th beginning at 5:30 p.m.

Though we have been fiscally prudent while being active and serving our members and community, we examined our membership dues and our Holiday Party expenditures. We voted to maintain the 2022 membership dues at \$36.00 and asked the membership to cover more of the cost to attend the Holiday Party. Analyzing how the club subsidized the Holiday Party from 2017-2019, the increase in price to host this one event was becoming counterintuitive. Club expenditures were: 2017—\$4,662.57; 2018—\$4,166.03; and

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DFF Speaker Details


New Meeting Location.

Letters From the Editor

Fly Tying

When I joined the DFF roughly 30 years ago, we had some of the best fly tiers on the planet teaching and enjoying hanging out together on weekends. A lot of the momentum in fly tying has been lost in the last couple of years as stores would no longer let us gather there. This year **Dan Montayne** thought up a once a month seminar where our fly tying enthusiasts could gather and learn from each other. On the third Tuesday the group meets in the Cabela's Conference Room in Allen TX, and two members of the group explain their favorite warm water fly, how to tie it and how to fish it. The group is for everyone from beginner to expert, and an article is available in this newsletter.

This group is growing, so reserve a place in it. We have gone from two rows of tying tables to three rows. If we keep growing, we may need to come early and knock out a wall to seat everyone. If you have a place reserved and can't be there, please call Dan, as we may have someone else that wants to attend but there isn't room for them. This is a unique idea, and **Jere** is very glad to be one of the ground floor fly tiers in this event. Give it a try. Even if you are intimidated by tying in a crowd of experienced tiers, please come and see what fun it is. We have some of the Club's

tying equipment, so don't worry about tool kits and the like.

We just had our last session of Dan's Warm Water Information Exchange. I am fully behind us getting this going again in 2022. In fact I have already been asked about a couple of flies that I wanted to do. Don't mis the chance when signups begin in January.

Outings

Our adventures in the great Outdoors are getting going again. They seem to be in three flavors.

First on our FB page are lots of notes with questions about how and where to fish for certain species in certain times of the year. Keep this up and add your adventures as well. Many of these posts are obviously from relative novices, and we have lots of experienced members who seem ready and able to help the less experienced fly fishers with the question to find an answer.

Secondly, and my favorites, are the posts and E-mails about group activity. They typically are a dozen or so Fly Fishers going to meet at some good fishing spot to fish and then to have their sack lunch and tell stories about the fishing. Whether the club organizes these or someone just posts that they are going and I will see you there, phone if you have This is a great outdoor questions. opportunity. Some of these are fly fishing contests where lots of great Fly Fishers compete, and they offer lots of prizes and frequent DFF winners at some level. Others like Sow Bug, Trout Fest, and many more are an easy way to get some fishing in with a lot of really fun club members.

Tying the FFI Award Flies with Jack Gillis

Jack Gillis, holder of the FFI Gold Level Fly Tying Award, is offering an online class learning to tie the flies needed to achieve the FFI Bronze Level Fly Tying Award, starting January 2022. Online classes will occur every 2 weeks. The first week will be instruction, with tie-along during the class, of a Bronze Level Fly. Each attendee will be able to tie the fly, along with the instructor in class, and then practice for two weeks until the next class. During the second class each month, all attendees will again tie the same fly to measure improvement since tying the fly in the first class. This also provides an opportunity to tie the fly, formulate questions or challenges incurred, and to discuss during the class. The online class will continue until all flies in the Bronze Level are tied. Hello Everyone, this is my last newsletter article as DFF's casting coordinator, but I will continue to help people with their casting skills. I am just taking a break from the DFF board after being on it for the past seven years. I've enjoyed serving in this role and we've hosted a wide variety of casting events ranging from individual casting lessons to large group presentations covering both basic and advanced casting skills. With the help of the club's other casting instructors, we've tried to prioritize the people that are active in the club in our casting classes. I want to add a special thank you to Rick Brown, FFI CI, and Jim Bass, FFI CI, for their help. Without Rick's and Jim's support many of the club's casting events would not have happened.

So, what's next? As of this writing the club's casting role is open if you're interested in it. For me, I plan to continue teaching. I was offering small group casting lessons before I joined the DFF board and plan to continue offering them. The format will be similar with the sessions announced through email and the classes will be filled on a first response basis. If you are not on my email list (the one from

my Hotmail email address) and want to be added, just let me know and I'll add you. Unfortunately, the schedule will continue to be random and based solely on when I have a free Saturday and the weather cooperates.

I will continue to help at fly fishing events across the region including the Texas Fly Fishing and Brew Fest in Mesquite in February. This event is different than the more common local club and FFI sponsored fly fishing event formats, but I enjoy it. Multiple nationally known speakers attend this event. While some classes require an extra fee, you can get your money's worth from the included options and from the presentations at the casting pond. There is a lot of fly fishing information is available at this event. Some other upcoming events with casting opportunities include the Red River Fly Fisher's event at Eisenhower state park on Lake Texoma in January, TU's Troutfest in the hill country in February will have a large number of casting options, the Trinity River event in Fort Worth even offers a chance to fish in downtown during March, and Oktoberfisch just finished and will move to Kerrville in October. If you never been to a

fly fishing event, I encourage you to give it a try and attend one. They are great opportunities to meet other local fly fishers, learn a new skill, and maybe event learn a new fishing spot or two.

So, what is a good fly cast anyway? Personally, I don't think there is a "one size fits all" answer that defines a "good" cast. To me, a good cast is one that puts the fly in the right orientation and location needed for the spot you are fishing. Let's be honest, if the Stripers are surfacing on Lake Texoma 50 feet from the boat, a 30 foot cast will not catch any fish. But, a nice doubled hauled 80 foot cast will not catch anything either if the trout are 15 feet from your toes. Adjust your casting technique to match the conditions you are fishing. Learning additional casting skills will help you to become a more versatile fly fisher.

I encourage you to learn some of the non-standard casting styles such as the Belgium cast, the Reach cast, the Curve cast, the Pile cast, and there are many others. Then experiment with them on the water and I'll bet you'll have a successful day.

A Force Awakens

For the past fifty years, DFF has produced a host of fly tying legends that hang in mental portraits and emerge on the tongue tips of we who continue the tradition. DFF members proudly remember such pioneers as Richard Blair, John Peterie, Malcolm Duke, Joe Myer, Harvey Stahl, Charlie Ducote, Clem and Barb Fullerton, Norm Goheen, Al Hillman, and Caroline Hill. Thus, we hang their brocade hats on our club wall of artistic honor.

These people ushered in a movement and awakened a force to follow -- until the past two years. During 2020-2021 we swam around with masks, stood in line for vaccinations, and stayed at home for COVID safety. Many experienced cabin fever and personal mental stability -- or instability. Despite the restrictions, a few ventured out to meet in small, diverse groups to pursue their fly tying passion. Finally, group gatherings became a reality, and monthly events reemerged.

Cabela's Outfitters in Allen, TX offered a tying sanctuary on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Thankfully, that was a force awakening.

In June of this year, the concept of DFF fly tying artistry began again with the event "Go To Patterns" for warm water lakes and ponds. At each session, we introduced two patterns that were tied and tested by the artist. Participants received handouts with step-bystep photographs and a recipe list. A materials kit and instructions that explained "How to Fish It" were also provided.

The Force continued with a customer interest card designed and supplied by DFF and distributed at Cabela's. The fly fishing department offered both fly tying and introductory casting instruction sessions that were and are taught by DFF members. Wow! The leads started coming in and continue to this day. We have collected 18 requests for casting instruction. Fly tying numbers

continue to grow from 14 participants to 21, which is now near the conference room capacity.

After a screeching halt to education activities in 2020 we learned how to zoom, wear masks, get shots and to kick start the education program into full swing in 2021. Volunteers were ready to get out of their houses to participate in the education of new fly fishers and remove the knots from our mothballed minds and equipment. We had some great classes in Coppell, Carrollton, Farmers

Branch, Castle Hills, DBU, and with the Stephenville HS kids at the Fisheries Center. We introduced 269 students to the wonderful sport of fly fishing in 9 scheduled events. Volunteer instructors provided 529 instructional hours to make the classes happen. We had fun and enjoyed the comradery with our great members.

Programs 2021

2021 was a spectacular year with Dallas Fly Fishers for Programs and Speakers. We were fortunate, especially with Covid, to have the lineup that we did. Here's the roundup:

January was **Jeff Currier** presenting his topic Fly Fishing Warm Water - Bass, Carp, Pike, and More. Jeff is an "Ambassador" for Yellow Dog Flyfishing Adventures hosting exotic trips and exploring new destinations throughout the world. He has guided throughout Wyoming, Idaho and Yellowstone National Park and escorted fly fishers on six continents. Jeff has fished in sixty-two countries and caught over 420 species of fish on the fly!

February was the renowned Landon Mayer presenting Proven Trout Tips: Secrets, Tactics and Techniques for Quality Trout. Landon's angling success is fueled by an addiction to pursuing large trout with small flies and lightweight fly-fishing equipment. Landon shares these tips and secrets in his many books, including The Hunt for Giant Trout: 25 Top Locations in the US to Catch a Trophy, Trout Tips: A Guide's Secrets, Tactics and Techniques, Colorado's Best Fly Fishing, Sight Fishing for Trout, and How to Catch the Biggest Trout of Your Life.

March, **Pat Dorsey** with Fishing Western Waters. Pat Dorsey has been guiding for 30 years and spends well over two hundred days a year on the water. Pat authored the books, A Fly Fishing Guide to the South Platte River, Fly Fishing Tailwaters, Tying and Fishing Tailwater Flies

April, **Kevin Hutchison** Fly Fishing for Bass. He is the author of many articles on fly fishing in the Texas Hill Country, including the book Fly Fishing the Texas Hill Country, Fourth Edition, and frequently speaks on the subject to fly fishing groups across the state and country. He has introduced hundreds to the joys of fly fishing using the innovative casting instructional techniques he has developed. Kevin is a FFI certified casting instructor and former "Teacher of The Year" for the Southern Council of FFI.

May, Jen Ripple's partner, Kurt Kopala presented Fishing the Mighty White River. In 2010, he combined his passions of programming and fly fishing by programming a 'web based, page turning' app to display an online magazine called a Tight Loop Magazine. Today Kurt is the lead developer for DUN Magazine, an International digital/print fly fishing magazine.

June, **Chris Taylor** Secrets of Fishing the San Juan River. Chris has fished all over the world, and guided throughout the West, from Alaska to Colorado. Fisheads is recognized as an Orvis Guide Service of the Year.

July began our Summer Education Series with Rex Walker Useful Fishing Casts. For 15 years Dallas-based casting instructor, fly fisher, and fly tyer Rex Walker has been helping people improve their fly casting skills. He has worked with many of the region's fly fishing clubs, at fly fishing events across Texas, and with both Reel Recovery and Project Healing Waters. Walker is a Fly Fishers International-certified casting instructor and the fly casting coordinator for the Dallas Fly Fishers.

August, **Dutch Baughman** Reading & Understanding the Water Column. Dutch is an avid and experienced fly fisher, Steelheader, and fly tier for over 60 years, a sport he genuinely loves. Dutch is heavily involved with Fly Fishers International as Vice President, member of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee, Chairs the Education Committee, and the Learning Center. He was the 2019 FFI Fly Fisher of the Year, awarded the 2019 FFI President's Medal, and the 2020 Darwin Atkins Fly Tying Award. Dutch is a demonstration fly tyer for the FFI National Expo, Roadkill Roundtable, Northwest Fly Tyers Expo, Sow Bug Rendezvous, Fly Fest, and too many others to list. Dutch teaches Fly Fishing Skills I & II, at Tarrant Community College.

September was the last month of the Summer Education Series and featured **Barry Webster & Dave Etgen's** Fly Tying Demonstration and Tie-Along. Dave Etgen is a renowned fly tyer with over 60-years tying and flyfishing experience and has tied at such places as the Sow Bug Rendezvous, among others. Barry holds the Bronze Award from FFI and has tied at national demonstrations including FFI National Expo, Sow Bug Rendezvous, and others.

October was Robert Younghanz a/k/a The Bug Guy presenting an outstanding entomology course. As an aquatic entomologist, a day on the water is primarily about learning. He is the host of the top-selling DVD, Entomology for the Fly Fisher, co-owner/director of the Colorado Fly Fishing Guide Academy and teaches classes on aquatic insects in Colorado and across the country.

November, the infamous **Chris Johnson**, owner/guide of Living waters Fly Fishing, probably the best fly fishing shop in all of Texas, presented his favorite subject Rio Grande Cichlids. Chris has been a licensed guide in Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, and Alaska, and has guided the Texas Hill Country for over a decade. He's an FFI Certified Casting Instructor, Umpqua Signature Fly Designer, pro team member for Whiting Farms, Scott Fly Rods, and Scientific Anglers. Chris is enthusiastic about film and photography and co-produced the short film "Unspoken," to raise awareness for Rio Grande Cutthroat trout conservation.

The Annual Conservation Corner

This year saw the DFF continue to support the Stream Team that was

keeping tabs on the health of Furnaux Creek in the nature area that is rapidly expanding along the Blue Line Bike Trail in Carrollton. I have been very pleased with the data. The DFF was the stream team for White Rock Creek in the early 1990's, and it is a lot to do.

We also taught the Entomology and fish health parts of the Angler Education Classes for TPWD. Our Outings have been good for keeping a handle on the state of the Spring Spawn, and the effects of the summer heat on our fishes.

I am still one of the recipients of the FFI Conservation Plan, updates four times a year.

It is 9 pages long and has a lot that we can help with. The Texas Council also has good suggestions for conservation activities.

My favorites are related to water issues and warm water fisheries. Our November Speaker was very interesting with his in depth analysis of the Rio Grande Cichlid, a native fishery that I had very little information about. Living in the Southeastern United States, we are in the area with the greatest variety and greatest numbers of fly rod sport fish in the nation.

Our TPWD Inland Fisheries Staff was awarded the Henshall Warm Water Fisheries Award in 2016. Their work since 1992 to save and recover the Guadalupe Bass, our state fish had been huge. Lots of opportunity to help with stream surveys, stream Clean-up

and restoration projects. I get asked by the FFI Conservation Committee for information on how these projects, and for that matter how the big picture is going.

I am now focused on warm water projects like getting more people involved in Black Bass Fly Rod Fishing for the 17 recognized species in conjunction with the FFI Conservation Group. This and the complete structure of big fish records in Texas is a good place for you to start. Catch them and enter them and then release them. The FFI calls it part of the Keep Fish Wet Program.

That and some Earth Day Projects are fun and good for our Outdoors. Another opportunity to get involved will come as Lake Bois d'Arc fills and the fish get up to a population where

TPWD needs some experienced fly fishers to evaluate how it is coming along. The second new lake, Lake Ralph Hall, formed by Leon Hurse Dam on the North Sulphur River is also going to need monitoring. So far they have just broken ground for this second lake.

We are most worried about some of the invasive fish that would ruin the water recreation. The Hard Head Catfish that

jump as your boat goes by are in the Red River and a couple of others. We can help by calling in any sightings of strange fish either in the water or in boats live wells. We must NOT let these get to be widespread. Keep up with the Invasive Species page on the TPWD Web Site.

There is so much we can do without forming a big project, and even more if we find some partners and offer to help Inland Fisheries with some project or another.
