April 4th - We continue to celebrate the DFF 50th anniversary. The very first speaker at the newly formed Dallas Fly Fishers in 1972 will be our featured speaker - **Dave Whitlock** accompanied by his wife **Emily**. Come at 5 PM to watch Dave tie a set of caddis emergers presented in the Trout Magazine. He will talk briefly about those flies and how to fish them and then have a story-telling, question and answer session during the meeting starting at 7 PM. May 1 (Sunday) - Streamside Entomology Class by Robert Younghanz, an entomologist, aka, The Bug Guy! Arguably, the most common blind spot for the fly fisher is an understanding of aquatic insects, their lifecycles and habitat, which is the key to fly selection, catching more fish and having more confidence on the water. Some of you may remember Robert from our meeting last October. This will be a hands-on workshop from his October presentation.

Robert will be conducting this in-stream entomology class for our DFF members only at LLELA Nature Preserve, Sunday May 1st from 1-3 PM.

This stream-side workshop will be limited to the first 20 to sign up. Registration is required and now open! Check your emails for the link to register and details.



May 2nd - Our May speaker will be Robert Younghanz. Robert's presentation begins at 7 PM. Our very own Barry Webster will be demonstrating how to tie two nymphs at the 5-6 o'clock hour: the Polly Rosborough's Casual Dress and the Burrowing Mayfly Nymph. This will be an in-person and Zoom event.

Robert is an internationally known Aquatic Entomologist, Fly Fishing Guide and Instructor. Robert has been involved in the Fly Fishing industry for close to 20 years. Having traveled to over 60 countries, he is an accomplished angler, teacher, and guide for fresh, salt, tropical and warm water species. His passion and expertise in the field of Aquatic Entomology has enabled him to travel the world collecting Insects, as well as studying, researching, curating, and teaching at Colorado State University, Front Range Community College, Pikes Peak Community College, and the Florissant Fossil Beds Seminar Series through Adams State University. Robert has been a guest lecturer across the Western United States on the topic of Aquatic Entomology and is a Master Fly Fishing Instructor. As a contributing writer to Field and Stream's "Fly Talk" with "The Bug Guy" Robert offers helpful advice on entomology and fly selection to fly fishers all over the globe. Also look for Robert's regular article: Hatch Happening: With The Bug Guy featured in Trout Magazine in every issue. Robert is a Simms Ambassador and Orvis Endorsed Guide and has conducted entomology classes for both Simms and Orvis guides at their national gatherings, as well as for Trout Unlimited and other local organizations across the country. June 6th - June Meeting featuring our **Rex Walker** on the subject of a Fly Casting Clinic.


June 10th-11th - 9th Annual Lake Athens Fly Fishing. One of the great events in the DFF Year.

Surprise, Surprise!

Not long ago, I had a discussion with a fishing partner who shared his waterside success and reasons for it. Surprise, surprise, his every day success and ability to catch large numbers of fish had little or nothing to do with pattern choice, pattern size, or casting. It was due to his observations and anticipation.

Fly fishing should be like the old, cranking Jack-in-the-Box. The excitement that anticipates the explosion of the lid and pop up of the clown is un-nerving. From the moment your fly reaches its destination, the Jack-in-the-Box anticipation mounts. As the fly begins its journey back to you, expectations that a fish will be there consume every muscle of your body. You want it to feed, but will it feed now? When the fish does strike, it's like the spring door opens and the clown jumps up, making you gasp and strike back. Most fly fisherman I know express breathlessness followed by a quick declaration, "fish on." However, if for some reason this moment is not registering heart stopping excitement, you might have chosen the wrong sport! Possibly, your profession as a freehand rock climber, bungee jumper, or cliff diver has numbed your senses. Hopefully, they will return and welcome you to fly fishing.

My colleague's assessment of that moment of hook up, emulates a bolt of lightning shooting up the line, through the rod, and into your arms, all in an instant of Surprise, Surprise. Somehow fish have a way of heightening this surprise by a series of clues, thus creating tension. Maybe it's the silhouette you spot, or a swirl, a flash or multiple bait fish running for cover. Anticipation begins to build as you try to outguess

that trophy and the timing of his actions. You momentarily hold your breath and brace for the strike. Here is the electricity. Your observation of rising fish is another foreshadowing of what might follow. Many fish announce their intent to eat by providing this clue. Now it becomes your task to offer something that looks edible.



I have noticed that my tension seems to build as my retrieve enters the last 10 feet or so. At this point, the fly is not yet visible, but the last bite

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is still possible. The tension of the last line jiggle or the lift for a new cast screams to the fish. It panics and takes the final second to capture its meal. How many of those last moment strikes have ended in a threeinch, fast flying, fish missile. You've just created a wingless flying fish destined for parts unknown, all in the blink of an eye. Hopefully, none of your fishing partners observed your flying trophy. If so, check out their smiles and grins mixed with respectful laughter. Even with this dramatic build-up of strike anticipation or hook set, the reward is Surprise, Surprise. The memory of when you last felt this jolt and the engagement with something unforeseen, conjure the excitement of the Kodak moment to follow. How we prepare for that trapdoor springing open and the clown jumping out is what fly fishing is all about. Surprise, Surprise!

We as fly fisher persons are blessed with an electric experience every time we encounter water and the mysteries that lurk there.

I am solely responsible for these observations, my conclusions, and article opinions.

The Conservation Corner

Its here!! After all the strange weather and even stranger restrictions on our Outdoor Life, springtime is upon us. Our planter Rainbows are still available, and probably will be part of the by-catch for a few more weeks. But the real Texas Sport Fishing Season is real, and we are glad.

Quite a few more State Lake Record Bass have been turned in to the 2022 Share-A-Lunker Program, and for us who just fish as an excuse to get out of the house and on the water, the warmth of the weather and fellowship of our fellow Fly Flingers does not need any more of an excuse. However, is there anyone who does not know about a great Texas program like Share-A-Lunker?

During the first three months of the season (Jan. 1 through March 31), anglers who reel in a 13+ pound bass can loan it to TPWD for the ShareLunker selective breeding and stocking program. These anglers can call the ShareLunker hotline at (903) 681-0550 to report their catch 24/7 until April 1. Anglers who catch and donate one of these 13+ lunkers earn Legacy Class status, receive a catch kit filled with merchandise, a 13+ pound Legacy decal for their vehicle or boat, VIP access to the Toyota ShareLunker Annual Awards event and a high-quality replica mount of their Lunker fish from Lake Fork Taxidermy. These anglers will also receive entries into two separate drawings – a Legacy Class Drawing and the year-end Grand Prize Drawing. Both drawings will award the winner a \$5,000 Bass Pro Shops shopping spree and an annual fishing license.

These Legacy Class Monster Momma's are not likely to be fly rod caught. As early in the year as this program is, these fish are deep and getting ready to move to the spawning beds when the water warms. As they come out of the deep holes where they winter over and begin to migrate to the spawning level, a Fly Rod Fisher could get a really deep running minnow imitation to the fish.

I personally would so love to land one of these monster Legacy Black Bass that I might just be deep fishing with a plastic worm Texas Rigged on the fly rod. I realize that is heresy, but I will take my chances on that. I have an 8 WT that I built to take my youngest son salmon fishing on the Campbell River area of Vancouver Island, Canada. It got a lot of practice

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with us limiting out daily for a week. So do I think I can handle one of these?? Probably, but in any case it would be a real adventure to try it.

The year-round Toyota ShareLunker program offers four levels of participation for catching bass over eight pounds and 24 inches in Texas. The 2022 season offers an opportunity to join the special club of premier anglers who have submitted one of these Legacy Class ShareLunkers. The big two class of ShareLunkers are these;

LUNKER LEGACY CLASS

Want to be part of the ShareLunker legacy for generations to come? If you catch a 13+ pound bass and loan it to us during the spawning period (January-March), you support our selective breeding program and will be recognized as a member of the Lunker Legacy Class.

LUNKER LEGEND CLASS

Out of the millions of bass anglers in Texas, only a select few have ever crossed the 13-pound threshold. We recognize these anglers as part of the Lunker Legend Class.

LUNKER ELITE CLASS

Anglers everywhere dream of catching a double-digit bass! When you reach that goal in Texas, you will be recognized in the Lunker Elite Class.

LUNKER CLASS

Catch a lunker that is at least 8 lbs. or 24 inches to become part of the ShareLunker program and be recognized in the Lunker Class.

So where do we go to catch one of these wall-hangers? A lot more places than you might think. The rumors are that if you are not fishing Lake Fork, you are limiting yourself. It is clear that this is not entirely true. This year in the early Legend Class, the entries come from a much larger list of water.

As I am writing this, O. V. Ivey is the leading supplier of these big fish for 2022, to the point that TPWD will not accept any more Lunkers from there for the breeding program.

The year-round Toyota ShareLunker program offers four levels of participation for catching bass over eight pounds or 24 inches in Texas. ShareLunker entry classes include the Lunker Class (8b+), Elite Class (10b+), and Legend Class (13b+). The 2022 season offers an opportunity to join the special club of premier anglers who have submitted a Legacy Class ShareLunker.

Once a lunker is reeled in, anglers need to enter the catch data on the Toyota ShareLunker online app at TexasSharelunker.com. In addition to providing basic catch information, anglers can also provide a DNA scale sample from their lunker bass to TPWD researchers for genetic analysis.

As a conservation project, this selective breeding program for exceptional Fish may be the most active in the USA. The only glitch I can see is this; What if the Florida Strain Black Bass is declared and individual species? There is a fair amount of energy looking into this in the Fisheries Biologists. In Texas we have been treating them as a unique variation of Largemouth, and hence mixing the Gene Pool is not contaminating it. However I hope everyone likes these results of the genetic wizardry that is producing these great memory's of the catch of a lifetime.

Thanks to The Inland Fisheries Program that created these great fish, we a lucky group of fishing nuts. I did not realize the large numbers of these trophy fish that are registered each year. All right you fly flingers. Let's us get a fly caught fish in the top 50.

We have a lot of guides in these Clubs that fish where these monsters live. This year one Lake had so many entries that they stopped taking the Big Mama Bass for spawning. But don't let your guard down. Be sure to keep these Legacy Fish from being overharvested. Our FFI motto, "All Fish, All Waters" is a good one.
