DFF Program Schedule





Embracing 2024: Fishing Hopes, Nature's Gifts, and Fly Fishing Adventures

Happy 2024 to you and best wishes for a great year. I hope your Holiday Month

was full of great things and family fun.

2024 looks like it could be a good one. We are expecting a warmer wetter winter due to El Niño, and if true, our lakes will be full, and the drought will be reduced for most of Texas. I would hope that our fish will be active early and that by the time you read this, that the Spawning Bass are active and nesting. Go get us some. Last year was a bumper crop of Share-A-Lunker's and I want a lot more of these to be fly rod fish. We live in the quarter of the USA blessed with the best

outdoor opportunities in the nation. Hit that water and have fun.

So let us move forward enjoy our gift of nature. The trout are being stocked, and while one of our best trout puddles at the TFFC is closed for remodeling, the little fish will be planted almost everywhere that public accessible water exists. Huge numbers of our little warm water species are some great action on a fly rod, and are almost everywhere. Tie up those little flies. Conservation Projects

I want us to have a bumper year of Conservation Activities as well. One of our most important is Trash-off events in the springtime. I will try to keep a list in this column, so you don't miss them. Normally, the participants get together and bring in a ton of litter, then have food and fun to round out the day. Both springtime all over Texas and the world need these activities.

The annual world meeting of the climate forces is called COP28 this year. The thing is over, and I bet not a word about cleanup comes out of it. China, possibly the world's biggest polluter, is building a ton of Coal Fired Power Stations to add to the air pollution. They are also believed to be one of the world's biggest contributors to the Ocean Plastic Problem. America, on the other hand, has been actively cleaning up its pollution footprint ever since our First Earth Day in 1970 when Air Pollution and Water Pollution were the big hot buttons.

We have made some huge strides. Our cities were so polluted with Smog due to engine exhaust from Gasoline and Diesel vehicles that it was a standing joke for TV comics. Lines like "we don't trust air we can't see and taste" were common. But vehicles cleaned up their exhaust a lot and added safety items as well. Today's autos are some of the least polluting in the world. In fact, since the thermal power stations to generate the electricity for EV's are enough more polluting than the gasoline powered autos they replace, it is debatable if electric cars really are less polluting when you view the entire energy picture. Trading highly efficient fuel burning vehicles for less efficient thermal powerplants may not be better.

Our inland USA water was so polluted by industry in 1970 that in many places it could be lit with a match. The water was giving off enough methane from the organic wastes in it that explosive mixtures of methane

and air were not totally unheard of. That is mostly cleaned up, or at least much cleaner. Most of our fossil fueled electric power is now done with Natural Gas, which burns much cleaner. It is highly reliable and has few seasonal problems. The exhaust from these power plants is mostly water (H2O) and Carbon Dioxide (CO2) which are both vital parts of the life cycle of every living thing, both animal and plant, on our planet. The current alternatives known as "Green Power" are hugely more expensive and much less reliable. Last winter, Germany and Great Britain both of which had huge investments in so called "Green Energy" found that it did not generate but a tiny fraction of its designed power in the winter weather. I am an Engineer by training, and do not doubt that alternatives will be found and developed, but for now what we count on here in Texas is well developed and reliable.

Crowdsourcing Conservation

Crowd-sourcing from concerned, like-minded folks possesses a significant partnership role in conservation. Witnessing, documenting, and accurately reporting events observed while out fly fishing, can expedite help and badly needed resources in an urgent situation.

In 2022, Round Rock's Brushy Creek suffered a fish kill due to wastewater leeching into the creek. Several anglers made the discovery when they showed up to the area for a day's fishing. They reported their observations to Living Waters Fly Fishing shop owner Chris Johnson who notified TPWD. Brushy Creek had suffered an inexplicable fish kill the year previously when





waters rose from their normal 30 CFS to 130 CFS, and again in 2019 when over 100,000 gallons of wastewater from the treatment plant leaked into Brushy Creek during a power failure. During the 2023 Spring across several Texas river basins, a Golden Alga Bloom was probably responsible for numerous fish kills. However, definitively having an answer can be difficult for the TPWD Kills and Spills Team, because the more time lags from kill to report to biologists surveying the area, the more difficult it becomes to trace the source. "Large numbers of small fish may be killed. Predators such as birds and raccoons may eat larger dead fish before they are observed or counted. Also, dead fish quickly sink below the surface, which interferes with counts. Estimates of numbers of killed are only as good as the evidence available on the scene."

In November 2023, DFF member Dan Inns

went to fish the Lewisville Tailrace chasing Smallmouth Buffalo, when he stumbled upon a fish kill. He reported his findings on our Facebook social media page. Fellow member and TPWD employee Keira Quam directed group members to make reports to the Kills and Spills Team by phoning the 24-Hour Communication Center in Austin at 512-389-4848.
