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

The outing costs will be \$8.00 per person, since we are renting this facility for the day. Please try to have the exact cash amount, if possible. You will need to bring a sack lunch, non-alcoholic beverages only, and a lawn chair, and we will meet for lunch by the copse of trees near the picnic table and bocce area at noon (marked in orange on the map). We have access to three ponds, a lake, and the Brazos River (marked with a purple check on map).

A map of the facility has been included. Most prevalent species are: Largemouth Bass, Crappie, Catfish, and Sunfish. There is shore fishing available on all water bodies and wading on the Brazos. Monitor this water gauging station for accurate water flows near our outing at the link here



Dan Montayne offered to teach a few of us from his third Tuesday Group some details of the fly tying arts and sciences. He even asked us what would we like to see? In this August Edition of our individual refinement of fly tying included Leader Assembly, streamer cheeks and eyes as used on classic feather wing streamer flies, UV Butt beads for certain nymph patterns and hair stacking.

Dan feels that we all left with some additional knowledge and skill, and Jere is very certain of that.

Here is the streamer fly we tied. There are about ten parts in the head and shoulder assembly.

The class had some of our star tiers in it and they all worked hard. This is a great example. A few strokes with wet fingers would groom these feathers a bit.

And goodies were available if you burned up all your energy, as well as coffee and water. I hope this becomes a more common thing. If it does, and you are asked if you want to be a part of this group, think about joining. It is invitational only, but this is a great group of feather benders.

Casting and Fishing at Castle Hills

One of the most fun events in the DFF calendar is to pick a bright summer day and go to a beautiful park like environment to fish. We brought our rods, and Richard brought 7 of DFF's certified instructors. With each instructor taking a few students, we moved out into the beautiful lawn area. Beside Richard, the DFF Certified Instructor Team consisted of Doris and Dan Montayne, Jere Anderson, Dr. Lou Montanaro, Paul Locklear, Vaughn DuBose, and Rocky Pitre.



The day begins with how to rig your fly rod. Each student and their Instructor got off to a good start.



Dan explains the basics to a student with basic questions, and outlines the activities. He is one of our best instructors of the arts of casting. We lay out our hoop targets for accuracy casting and away we go. There is plenty of space, and so it is easy to keep from crossing lines with other students. Here is a typical picture.



Several participants followed Dr Lou to try out the fishing. The environment looks very fishy, but the fish while plentiful are small.

Some of the younger set did better than the more senior one in terms of fish size. Here is the largest fish caught that I saw.



This, however, did not discourage many of our students.

This is often much better attended, but those who were here got their money's worth of fun, games and fishing.



Dr. Lou Montanaro and I had a talk about the science behind this casting thing. His medical science is deeper, but we are right up my



alley since casting, like engineering, is an applied physics science. Our patient and good-natured student survived our brief excursion into the hard sciences we were applying.

In any case, it was a beautiful day, and a lot of skill was gained by our students. I hope to see some of them at our next DFF Meeting. We are all happy and proud to present such an opportunity to enjoy a Texas Morning, developing your skills as a Flyfisher. It is seldom that we do the casting practice at a location where we can then go to practice our fishing skills. This event needed more publicity this time, but those who came certainly got something out of it.



Water Watch for July and August

We will catch up this month with the last Sunday falling in a gap before Labor Day. Here is the information from the late July Water Watch. We had too few helpers but were able to get it done.

The creek was looking a bit short on bugs, probably due to some heavy rains just a week before. This is often the case. But the worst part was the lack of specimens in our sample.

The few bugs we got were typical of our sampling point.

Here are the Stream Team findings.





Pretty sparce for our usual several dozen bugs.

We start the evaluation by collecting some bottom material and a few weeds with roots that hold the silt from the stream bottom. Here is Richard digging.

Our team also include two highly skilled laboratory quality analysis people. They do a complete water chemistry analysis.









Between the two teams, we have now created a several year profile of Furneaux Creek in the area a great restoration project. The goal is to have a cool spot with informative postings about the natural ecology of an Urban Stream. The results are impressive. Go to Friends of Furneaux Creek Nature Trail and marvel at what they have achieved.

Water Watch August

We did succeed in getting in the second Water Watch. On the bugs' side, our A Team of Roger, Richard and Jere were successful in getting the water and the bugs, though they were sparce. A new water chemistry team member, Amy, was able to help us get out samples. Here is the water chemistry team.



Amy adds just what our team needs, namely someone young and agile enough to get in the stream and get us some samples. Thank you, Amy. Here is Amy and Richard getting the silt and vegetation samples to analyze.



Once we got the needed samples the fun began. Here is the summary of the findings this month. Probably due to a lack of rain, the water was low, and the bugs were badly picked over by the next level up in the food web.

Some good bugs were found, just not very many of them compared to our usual findings. The damselfly is one of the best here. Tie it as a surface bug to imitate an emerger down to a deep running bug. This bug is going to be a beautiful insect if it is successful in evading hungry fish.

These look like an inch or more of tying floss. They are abundant

but hide well enough that I am skeptical of its role in the food chain.

So once again we succeed in documenting the health of the water and the health of the base of the food chain. This is an important type of information for both the fisheries folks and the City Water Scientists interested in the health and safety of surface water.

We very much need a few more volunteers. If we had 6 regular volunteers, then if one could not make it in any month, we would still get these data. Please come out on the last Sunday of the month and help. This is very interesting work and all we need is about 2 hours of your Sunday Morning.

The Conservation Corner

Another Texas Summer is almost history, and the fall group activities like classes and our famous Awards Banquet are on the horizon. This column will try its best to not have the noise leading up to the next election take up our precious space.

The DFF has done a lot of work for water quality, fisheries, and public education this year. We will be well represented at the Fly Fishing International's 2 nd Fly Tying Group Conclave. This will be a great one and it will be like the Conclave Floor with booths and some Nationally Famous fly tyers as well. Since it is so close, those of you that never went to the Livingston Montana event can get the feel of the bigger event that will be about an hour away or less for most of us. Details have been in the last three Leaders.

One of my favorites at the Toledo Bend Rendezvous is a park near Zwolle, LA. It is in mid-October, and is a 2 ½ Day campout in bunkhouses in a state park. I have not been to one since 2019, but here is the picture of President Dave, Jere, and the famous Bell Family, Cody and Julia.

The education program will have had our famous fly casting in Dr. Lou's park and pond in Castle Hills near Lewisvile on the 24th. This was a chance to work on your casting stroke and then go fishing in private water. This event will have finished just before this newsletter comes out, so hopefully I will have some pictures.

Of course our Stream Team will have gone bug picking on the 25 th . We really need a few more members to come out the last Sunday of the month and keep this great conservation project going.

In September our biggest outdoor event, in most years, the LLELA Fly Fishing Class and certification of new instructors if you wish to be one, will occur. LLELA is a great conservation project. In the beginning they are restoring the Blackland Prairies Ecology with appropriate animal life. It has camping by reservation for groups like the Boy Scouts. We will be at the big pavilion, and usually need a dozen or more instructors for this one.

Then the October big one is a class for the public sponsored by the Rosemeade Recreation Center. Casting in the yard, and fly tying an all the other wisdom in the classroom. A lot of fun, and where you can get an Instructor Certification by appointment. Call Richard for information.

Our Holiday Banquet will be coming up, and the signups will be in this or the next Newsletter.

This party is good, and a lot of work has gone into it all the way back to July. I expect an article about this event in this or the next Newsletter.



This summer has been very interesting. We have had one almost as hot as our current record year in 1935. The solar Scientists are saying that the sun is very active, and since that is the main source of energy on our planet, the heating this year makes sense. They are predicting that a Solar Minimum is coming, so I am looking forward to the cooling and for the folks that want my auto exhaust to be the sole source of the heating to wonder where the heat went when the solar furnace cools down.

And while the USA is doing a lot compared to other nations to clean up our pollution, we can do more. I would be excited about this a lot more if the entire planet were not losing ground. There



are major polluters that are exceeding the hard work of the Industrialized Nations of Europe and North America. Don't give up, just realize that if indeed this pollution from the world's industries burning carbon fuels is to be reversed, we must also get the professional polluters like China to join the cause.

We should hope that the COP29 Meeting of the world's nations would attack this problem. They usually do acknowledge its existence, but since the major polluters are often committee heads, they are more inclined to just demand that we Industrialized nations do more so the rest of them can do less.

One area that we can fix unilaterally is trash pollution. With the camping and picnicking seasons coming to an end with the new school year, some serious cleanup projects are getting



advertised. Last year Labor Day, the last blast of summer activity, was a true disaster in places like Lake Tahoe California. Our Ft. Worth water board folks have held four major Trash Pickup events that I am aware of.

"Leave No Trace" is not just a witty slogan, it needs to be a way of life outdoors. Major volunteer groups like the Master Naturalists do some trash pickups that will blow your minds.

Here is a project of theirs. I am not sure where, but I am sure that wherever it was, it looked a lot better than it did before. Please look for and support one of these events this September.

Most of them are half days of work, and then a lot of recreation for the volunteers.

In many parts of America, the cooling of the weather that signals the approaching of winter is the cause for major migrations of fish and animals to safer climate zones. In Texas we have Monarch Butterfly migrations and lots of songbirds.

In our major Western Mountains, the animals that have been grazing in the high pastures will be migrating to lower levels and safer winter locations. It is unfortunate that this leaves them very vulnerable to Hunters. I was a hunter in my youth, but we were hunting for table meat for the family of 9 kids to have for the winter. I do NOT object to game harvests that will be consumed within certain limits. Just be sure the animal population can afford the harvest of some of their numbers.

Here is a major league Salmon Harvest in progress. These Alaskan Grizzly Bears forgo their need for space and trade it for a little cooperation so all of them can get the rich, fatty meat of the salmon and build up the stored food and insulation for the winter. Nature at its best. I think this is the Brooks River and Brooks Falls in the Katmai National Park. The huge fierce animals are willing to cooperate for mutual good health and improved chances to survive the coming Winter. If only humans were that wise and were able to put aside their personal issues in favor of the mutual survival of the species, what a great improvement that could be.

With the cooling of fall, be sure to get those young people out there and fishing. Our panfish will be active, and the bass and catfish will be hunting for an endless lunch counter. The last gasp of a Texas Summer is so beautiful with the leaf color changes that just being out there is almost a religious experience. So, start thinking about our short cold and usually wet fall weather. Try to get out there and be ready for the beginning of the trout stocking program. I do not get very excited about a truck load of hatchery Rainbows. I was raised in the Western Mountains and fished for real trout, and their cousins, Salmon and Steelhead. But a trout is a trout so I will probably be out there.

In any case, the end of our fishing year means that you need to renew those licenses, so do not forget. I am seldom asked to show my license in Texas, but it is still the law, and they are very inexpensive for us, senior fly fishers. Start hinting about that item you want a loved one to add to your Christmas List. In the meantime, be safe and enjoy the last of our outdoor season.
