

On the weekend of October 18th through October 20th, many members of the Dallas Fly Fishers (DFF) participated in the 2024 Toledo Bend Fly Tying Rendezvous in Zwolle, LA. The event was first held in 1989, and now is an event supported by 6 regional fly-tying clubs, including the DFF. The gathering is held at North Toledo Bend State Park. At the event, fly tyers from Texas and Louisiana shared their fly-tying skills, made new friends, and enjoyed the beautiful scenery of Toledo Bend. The main event was held in the large group cabin where participants set up their fly-tying stations. Participants also brought dishes, many of them regional Cajun fare, to

share with each other. The food and comradery were excellent. No one went hungry! Some participants stayed in the bunkrooms; others camped in RVs or rented individual cabins in the park. Also, if you chose, you could fish before fly-tying, take a nature walk, or admire the beautiful sunrise. The bunk rooms were very affordable and available without extra cost. 

The city of Denison now oversees Loy Lake, as such, they have done some much needed maintenance. The tall grasses and cattails have been cut back, so anglers can enjoy bank fishing; the summer alga has dissipated, and the water has been quite clear. The forecast is anticipated to be low 70s,

mostly sunny, winds 9 mph. It is supposed to have rained the Saturday and Sunday before the 11th.

US 75 North to Grayson County. Exit 67, NORTH Loy Lake Rd. Do NOT take the South Loy Lake Rd exit! Turn West on to Loy Lake Rd. and be in the right lane. Continue west past the southbound US-75 service road and the entrance to Loy Lake will be on the north side; look for the bust of Eisenhower and the flags flying behind it. At the Y, stay to the left/northwest on R C Vaughn RD. At the next, quick intersection, turn west/left and enter in the park through the open gate. Loy Lake will be on the south/left side. There is a boat ramp, but with the water being a little lower than normal, if you are bringing a kayak, use the grass area beside the boat ramp to launch your kayak/kick boat. Bring non-alcoholic beverages and snacks to keep you hydrated and fueled.





Time to Jump In

DFF Fly Tying Corner

If you put off learning or improving your fly tying in the past, now's the time to jump in and refine your skills during the 2024 – 2025 tying year. Each of our monthly sessions starts with discussions about old and new materials used in tying. Next, we move to an explanation of why the evening's fly is a GO-TO warm water pattern. Then we hand out kits or materials along with step-by-step, color printed sheets, and follow those sequenced plates to completion. Usually, one instructor, along with the presenter, walks the room, helping tiers complete each step.

Believe it or not, this is the fourth year of tying at Cabela's in Allen, TX. Our focus is solely on making you an accomplished fly tier. The bonus

comes when you see the results of your personal tying efforts with more catches and a firm understanding of how to fish the flies you create.

Below are a few of the topics and flies produced over the last year: killer crayfish, realistic dubbing and applications, The Jewel Thief (synthetics at work), understanding fly proportions, split dubbing techniques; wings, wings and more wings; three perfect pan flies for Texas, surface streamers, parachute buggers, and how to determine the amount of feathers and or materials needed to form the desired fly shape. If you think that these topics and patterns are a lot, consider the last three years as well. Come on. Jump in. Join our fly tying group.













Fly Tying Events

The DFF has three fly tying events per month. The **Third Tuesday** is organized by **Dan Montayne** at Cabela's/Bass Pro and has been going for four years now. Check out his article above and make sure to be there for PART 2 of his dubbing class.

He will also bring tools if you call ahead.

DFF Education Corner

Dallas Baptist University Outdoor Experiences Class

This University Class that the DFF helps with was full of interesting and interested young adults. Most were Juniors and Seniors, so we were talking to a wave of new adults, and I was happy to feel the interest that they showed in Fly Fishing. The 12 students were instructed by a team of 4 DFF Instructors. The teaching team was President Dave Smith, Jere Anderson, VP Art San Ramon, and Dr. Ray Galloway is the professor that leads the class.

Here is the picture from day 1:



We taught rods and reels, about what fish eat, and tied a few flies. Then we taught knots and much harder, had them construct the nearly invisible leader that they would tie on the rods the next day, and present their fly with. Then Jere presented some notes on Conservation Projects and their importance, and on all the warm water species that are available to them here in the South.

We talked about the near loss of our state fish, the Guadalupe Bass, and its recovery as an example of the things they could get involved in, and about out Water Watch and its importance. We finished the day with a discussion about safety and proper clothing to wear fly fishing.

This was the fun but frustrating exercise in tying leaders out of leader and tippet material for the Tuesday Fishing.



This was Jere's team of fly tiers, all were quick and careful and learned fast. We tied a slightly simpler version first, then added some details. The two smiley women and I talked for most of the session since they tied their flies in well under half the time allotted to it. This is what I like best. Getting to talk to young adults about going out into the world about almost anything.

I gave them a copy of our Newsletter and how to join. One of the students told me they live in Plano so I will try to let them know about our activities. Most of the students could be part of something that we do.

November Conservation Corner

While the biggest event on an International Scale is COP 29, which has the Grand name of The 29th Session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, will not meet until the mid to late November time frame. Hence, I will not have much to say about it. I expect it to be best described as "Same Song, Different Day". We will

give them the benefit of the doubt for now.

Do be sure to vote, it is important, and if you have a connection with some of the young adults, be sure to let them know that it is even more so to them, since they will have to live with the effects of this election for most of their lives.

On the weather forecast, October had forgotten to show up in Texas. Then almost by surprise we started getting October temperatures about mid-October that were as cold as it had last been in early April. We usually have rained every few days off and on from mid-September, but so far it is dry in Texas. Hopefully by the time you read this, we will be back to normal. We were far ahead of

normal rainfall last spring, but we are back to roughly normal now due to the very dry summer. These weather cycles are normal, but the people that want to blame everything from Hurricanes to butterfly migrations on a mostly mythical climate change are hard at work.

The real climate scientists are more concerned about the Sun which has cycles, going into a cooling period. Since the sun is the source of most of the energy in the Solar System, I have little trouble believing that a solar cooling period will also be an Earth weather cooling period.

DFF Activity is Thriving

Fall season with school starting and the weather cooling has many changes. For those of us in the Texas Council Clubs, we had a huge early fall. Big, fun and important events for all to enjoy. Score yourself on the number of these that you took part in.

• It started with the FFI Fly Tying Group holding a huge national event. Our second shot at holding a big spectator event like the old FFI Conclaves in Livingston, MT. was well planned and brought in a



lot of the big names in the FTG. The FTG group President, the Texas Council President and officers of the DFF and our Twin Brothers in the FWFF had a lot of time to visit and compare notes. I hope for two things; I want a lot more tiers there, and I want a lot of spectators. But I was there for the first time in a big event since the Rendezvous in 2019, and loved it.

• We next had my favorite group to teach, the young adults of Dallas Baptist University for two days as a part of Dr. Galloway's Outdoor Experiences Class. They are alert and interested and participate actively. Teaching a group like that is what makes me wonder why I didn't become a teacher like my Mother was for her entire work life. We tied a few flies, tied a few

knots as they built the leader that they would fish with the next day, and talked about fish, their food, and how to find them. Lots of fun.

- The Oktoberfisch in Kerrville is a great event. This is a fun river fish and wading as well as where kayaks work well. The target species is in the river Guadalupe Bass, our state fish. Planter trout and others are also reported. It is a great outdoor show and fun. The group things are educational and fun.
- October 15th was Dan's Fly Tying third Tuesday event. He gave us a lot of knowledge about feathers and then we tied a feather version of the Deceiver Streamer Fly.
- One of our repeat classes is supporting the Rosemeade Recreation Center's programs with a Fly Fishing Class. These often draw as many as 40 students, however we had 12 this time. The club has so many good and willing Instructors that we handle the load comfortably. The good luck of a sunny fall season, this class was a fun day of instructing.
- This same weekend has one of our favorite gatherings, The Toledo Bend Rendezvous in Zwolle, LA. With the recently formed Gulf Coast Council of the FFI, this event started long ago as a group fishing trip by the Pineywoods Fly Fishers and the North Louisiana Fly Fishers and it grew to a full event that needed most of the capacity of a State Pard with many bunkhouses to hold it.

This year there were about 29 attendees. This is not enough to keep it going. I personally hope we get better attendance. Dave and Jere went to the 2019 one, and Jere has gone with several of our other tiers over the years. When Fred DuPre was going, we were certain to get some kind of shrimp dish or other Cajun Cooking. It is too good to have it die out IMO.

We have had sing-a-longs on the porch with many talented fly tiers who brought stringed instruments, and we relaxed after a huge feed and a full day of fly tying for a folk sing on the porch. We have an active group of fly tiers in the club, so what would it take to get a few more to this event? The food is like a giant potluck picnic, and often quite interesting, though always with plenty so you can have what you want out of the offering.

Wind Farm Project May Risk Endangered Marine Animals

Jere has long been a bit skeptical about the rush to install questionable technology for the equally questionable Green Projects. With the failures of wind turbines due to towers falling over, blade breakage, and the huge problems of moving the giant fan blades to remote location, the Engineer in me has been concerned that the rush to get this technology out in the field may have cut a few too many corners. Safety of the environment is not an issue in the wind farms in central Texas, but as the wind farms are being built in more sensitive areas, I am more worried about a real tragedy looming on the horizon.

As a lifelong conservationist whose concerns about protecting major endangered species from becoming closer to extinction due to some poorly thought-out major projects have troubled me a lot. For this month, I would like to discuss the ocean environment and some major critically endangered wildlife. Major projects to build wind farms on the continental shelf of the Atlantic Coast are getting a big push even as we speak. These areas are the home of a critically endangered species, the North Atlantic Right Whale. This animal and the Blue Fin Tuna are a part of a complex natural environment that is in the crosshairs of the anti-oil crowd and this questionable Project.

But there is more to this problem. Every year over 10 million visitors come to Virginia Beach to enjoy the open ocean view, and see the wildlife, relaxing in the peace and quiet of this major recreational area. The impact on the tourist dollars and the desirability of the area and its economy is an endangered species IMO. The Dominion Wind Project is just one of 30 such projects envisioned. This project envisions 176 Wind Turbines on 113,000 acres.

The construction of just this one project will require huge damage to the seafloor from pile driving the turbines tower structure into the seafloor, and then dumping hundreds of tons of rock and concrete slabs to stabilize the sea floor. What will be the impact of so much construction on the often-fragile ecology of the near shore seafloor? The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) would like you to believe that these are minor and temporary, being mostly part of

the construction process. I suggest that with the number of turbines towers that collapse every year world-wide to suggest that all will be rosy once the initial impact of the construction is done, it is absurd, or at least a stretch of the imagination. More important to me is how the migrations of our near shore sea life will be harmed by noise and construction pollution of this magnitude?

With a goal of NMFS' regulation appearing to be to ignore the cumulative impacts of thousands of other wind turbines to be installed as part of the 29 other wind turbine projects planned for construction up and down the Atlantic coastline. NMFS did not consider the effects of wind turbine structural failures—such as turbine or blade collapse—on the continued survival of the North Atlantic Right Whale that are occurring on wind turbines all over the world, including offshore of Nantucket, Massachusetts.

I am insulted by the agencies that want us to look at each project as if it was the only thing they are doing. If we do we will not see that much danger to the Ocean Ecology. I cannot fathom how anyone could say that with a straight face. I admit that my field of expertise is NOT ocean marine ecology, but this plan ignores too many things and makes arm waving statements that any of us can see are more fable than fact.

What can be done about this? Perhaps a new Congress will review these scary project plans. Priorities can change, and the more dangerous projects are put on pause. It would not be the first time a new administration, even if it was the same party often there is a momentary review of the stuff they inherited. I just hope that a project of this magnitude and impact will have budget problems and will be told to go slow.

On the Texas Front, the fall hunting and fishing seasons are coming on-line. The warm fall weather will have lots of sportsmen and women in the fields, I would expect. We can look forward to the Texas Trout season. Many smaller bodies of water will have planter Trout. Be sure to keep up with the planting schedule, as lots of people go there and fish them out in a very short time. As a former resident of real trout country, I am not very much inspired by the 8 inch hatchery trout, but since they seem to be the fish we are supposed to catch on a fly rod, by all means go for them.

If you have not signed up for our Holiday Banquet, there is an article in this newsletter, and it looks like a good one. Bring the other fishing folks in the family. Last year I brought my youngest daughter and my grandson. They had fun and talked to just about everyone.
