Goats to be Raised On LIG Farm

fter much consideration, the LIG board made a bold decision to enter the livestock raising business this past summer. We had long discussed the possibility of adding animals to the mix on the farm, and this summer the time seemed right. Swine and cattle had also been considered, but we settled on goats because they are readily available, relatively simple to raise, reproduce quickly, and are a popular food commodity in Liberia.

A mail appeal was sent to a number of LIG's faithful supporters in August of this year, and the response was amazing. A goat "barn" is under construction on the farm for housing and care of the animals. The new building will accommodate 80-100 goats. A number of solar floodlights are being installed and an isolation pen (lovingly called the "goat hospital") is being constructed. The first eight animals have been purchased, and they are being housed in part of an existing structure on the property.

A decision was also made to build a soundly engineered toilet facility on the property, which will include separate rooms for men and women. Well constructed latrines of this type are designed for sanitary disposal of waste in an adjacent septic tank with a minimum of the odors associated with the old "two-holers" that those of us who are older remember so fondly.

The addition of goats to our agricultural activities will help provide a source of protein for the Liberian people, diversify LIG's farming activities, and help the financial viability of the farm.

For those who have not yet participated in this project, but are interested in helping, we'd like to give you an opportunity to do so. The cost of the various components of the project are as follows:



GOAT BARN - \$4,900 (amount raised in full)

GOAT ISOLATION PEN - \$577

SOLAR LIGHTING – \$1120

MULTI-USE TOILET FACILITY with Septic Tank – \$2,700

PURCHASE OF BREEDING ANIMALS (GOATS) -- \$80 to \$100 each

there was a big group waiting for us, helping with our luggage and greeting us with smiles.

The Bible Talk groups were always full of energy and joy. They welcomed us with parades, music, and dancing. During the gatherings, people performed Bible dramas and played Bible quizzes. It was so fun and full of life every time. At one of them, I told everyone how cold it is where I'm from, I told them that it gets so cold in the winter that the lakes turn to ice so thick that we can actually drive cars on them! That was very surprising to them because it's very hot in Liberia. I also wore a necklace that represents Jesus with different colors and explained what each color means to the kids.

One day, we visited the Living is Giving farm. We brought rice and oil to share with the volunteers and got to walk around and see all the plants. My favorite was the cassava. I learned that you can take cassava sticks, chop them into small pieces, stick them into the ground at an angle, and they'll grow into new plants! I also loved seeing the plantains, which are kind of like bananas. Fried plantains were one of my favorite foods there.

We also visited Liberia International Christian College and had a meal with Pastor Bill who helps teach Farming God's Way.

But I also noticed some sad things. There's a lot of trash everywhere and poverty in Liberia. Here in America, we have things like youth group and Sunday school for kids and teens. In Liberia, there aren't as many opportunities like that. That's why I think Bible Talk Organization is so special. It gives kids and teens a chance to read the Bible, learn about Jesus, and be part of a loving community. I also know that not everyone has enough food to eat and not all of the kids get to go to school.

Going to Liberia helped me see how much we can learn from people who have so little but still have so much joy. It was also neat to be a part of helping others that have less opportunities than us. I'll never forget this trip!

While not an LIG project, Tim Burchill, co-founder and secretary-treasurer of Living is Giving, again participated in the Kiwanis Against Hunger event at the Jamestown Rural Fire Department on September 20. Tim has been a member of Kiwanis International for 35 years, and of the Jamestown Kiwanis Club for 18 of those years. Since 2011, the Jamestown Club has held a food packaging event each year (except for 2020 and 2021) to provide tens of thousands of pre-packaged meals for hungry children and their families, both in the US and abroad. For the past few of those years, the club has partnered with Orphan Grain Train and Mercy Meals in this worthy effort.

This year, with the help of over 150 volunteers from the community, over 72,000 meals were packaged. The bulk of these are headed for Liberia to help fight food insecurity in that part of the world so dear to our hearts. Thank you Kiwanis members, Orphan Grain Train, volunteers, and the entire Jamestown community, for making this year's event such a huge success.
