- Foley gave the art a name
- Began in radio in 1914
- Worked on the first movie that incorporated sound, The Jazz Singer
- The first known broadcast was Christmas Eve, 1906
- Radio broadcasts were interrupted by World War One
- AM transmitters were dominate until the 1970's
- Reagan administration began regulation of FM radio
- CBS was one of the first organized radio stations
