He was asking them to do a challenging task the word "contend" is the English word for agony. "Faith" is the body of Christian truth that we call the Bible that's been given to us once and for all. The idea was to make a legal defense for the beliefs taught in God's word not only to those in the world but especially in the church. Jude said this was necessary for the life and preservation of the church. The battle continues today, even in our own congregation.

As we begin the new year we are firming up the foundation of faith with a new sermon series called "Recapturing the Faith.". Won't you read and study ahead in preparation for the series?



cess. You will receive an email confirmation once your donation has been received. Here are some basic Q & A to provide more information.


