MUSEUMS & LIBRARY HOURS

The Jacobs Farmhouse is open by appointment only. Please call the Society for further information.

The Norwell Historical Society Library at the Norwell Middle School (328 Main Street--Route 123) is open from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday each week.

The Norwell Historical Society Archives Center on the 3rd floor of the Norwell Town Hall (345 Main Street--Route 123) is open by appointment only.

The purpose of this Society shall be: 1.) to plan and arrange for the promotion of knowledge about the Town of Norwell, Massachusetts by discussion, research, meetings and publications; b.) to collect, solicit and preserve documents, manuscripts, charts, maps, records, photographs, relics, and items of local interest; c.) to arrange, index, catalog and file/maintain such material for use by the members of the Norwell Historical Society and other interested parties; d.) to work with and cooperate with other entities, groups, organizations, and individuals directly and indirectly.

SCENIC ROADS OF NORWELL

Conservation and preservation efforts in any town require the coordination of different groups and regulations. One of many regulatory approaches Norwell has embraced is that of scenic roads. In 1976, Norwell designated our first scenic roads: Bowker Street, Norwell Avenue, Stetson Road, Tiffany Road and Jacobs Lane. Subsequent town meetings have added more, and Norwell now has 20 protected.

What makes a road a scenic road? The general laws of Massachusetts (Chapter 40, section 15C) provide that upon recommendation of the planning board, conservation commission or historical commission of a town, a town may designate any road (other than a numbered route or state highway) a scenic road. Why is the designation so important? The answer is that any repair, maintenance, reconstruction or paving work done with respect to the road shall not involve or include the cutting down or removal of trees, or the tearing down or destruction of stone walls (or portions thereof) except with

the prior written consent of the planning board after notice and a public hearing. If the work proposed involves the cutting or removal of a tree, the hearing is to be consolidated with the tree warden as well.

While it is difficult to imagine, there is a thriving business in the purchase of stone walls and relocating them to parts unknown for profit. Such activities in or on the 20 streets designated as scenic ways in Norwell (absent obtaining the required consent described above) would be illegal. If you encounter persons taking down trees abutting a public way or cutting through stone walls for one purpose or another, and the road in question has been designated a scenic road, it may make sense to determine from the planning board if the activity has the required approval.

In the future, we may hope for continuing designation of appropriate ways as scenic roads, with signage to remind us that they are scenic roads and entitled to the preservation protection described above.
