Farming the Demeter-certified Chene Vineyard in Edna Valley, her wines are pure, expressive, and crafted with respect for the planet. Together, these labels reflect a shared passion for regenerative practices and thoughtful winemaking.

Phelan Farm

Coming from the legendary mind and palate of Rajat Parr, Phelan Farm has begun turning heads since its release in 2021. The wines truly have an 'Old World' sensibility and flavor profile graced with the temperate climate of Central California. Aside from Raj's expertise, it is the clonal selections sourced from the world's best vignerons that especially help these wines stand out, be it Raul Perez from Spain or JF Ganevat in the Jura. The pedigree of these vines is something to behold. At Phelan Farm, they believe that great wines are born in the vineyard, not assembled in the cellar. They strive to work in collaboration with the diverse species of microbes, plants, and animals on the farm to build the healthiest soil possible, which allows them to limit interventions during vinification.

A. Levasseur

In 1944, Gilbert and Julienne Levasseur, both descendants of winemakers, decided to create their own brand of Champagne: Levasseur Winery. Gilbert's son Albert took the reins from his father and, in 1992, slowly began to pass along the wisdom needed for his son David to take charge. In 2003, David took full control of all aspects of day-to-day winemaking. He modernized the cellar, adding thermo-regulated stainless steel tanks and a new press. He uses computerized monitoring devices to watch over each plot and has converted all farming to sustainable viticulture, including overcrops. Only Organic fertilizers are used, and no synthetic herbicides or pesticides are ever sprayed.

Bernard Remy

Founded in 1968 in the southerly village of Allemant in the heart of the Cotes des Blancs, Champagne Bernard Rémy debuted on the domestic market in France in the early '70s to excellent reviews. With time and success comes expansion, and in 1983, Rémy built his own winery on premise to facilitate the purchase of more hectares of vine in other areas in Champagne. Now, 50 years after its inception, Rémy holds no less than 11 hectares under vine in prime parcels of Champagne, including Grand Cru areas. Though they are labeled as Négociant Manipulant (NM) and don't own all the land they source grapes from, Bernard and his son Rudy farm all the vineyards themselves - all of which are under long-term leases. In this way, they're truly growers, overseeing every step of viticulture, from planting to harvest.

Caillez Lemaire

Husband and Wife team Virginie and Vincent Vanpoperingh run this small family estate on the banks of the River Marne. Virginie's family has been growing grapes since the 18th century, and Raymond Caillez and Andrée Lemaire began making their wines from the family plots in 1942. Annie and Henri Caillez took over in 1976 before passing it on to their daughter and her husband in 2005. The estate holdings have grown from 2ha to just over 6ha, and conversion to Organic farming was certified in 2020 by EcoCert.

Daniel Moreau

Even though vine growing for the Moreau family dates back to 1875, the first wines from their grapes weren't made in the village until 1956 when Robert Moreau founded the local cooperative. In 1961, he bottled a few hundred bottles of champagne from his own grapes with an eye toward the future. He was hoping to create an independent future of winemaking for his son. By 1970, with his son Daniel now at the helm, the direction was clear. The estate would no longer provide grapes to the co-op, and all 2.68ha of Meunier would go into the family wine. In 2005, Daniel's son Bastien fully took over grape growing and winemaking operations. His immediate goal was to become an organic winery, and he has since achieved such and is fully certified Organic. His approach is rational, systematic, and precise.

Didier Herbert

In 1920, the Herbert-Pechon family began growing grapes in the village of Rilly-la-Montagne. Fernand Herbert managed his vineyards and sold to the local cooperative, of which he also served as President. It wasn't until 1959 that some of their grape harvest would go into making their own bottles of Champagne Maison Herbert. In 1982, Didier Herbert took over, and today, the 3rd generation, his son Thomas, along with his wife Marie-Charlotte, run the estate.

Domaine Guy Mea

Five generations of the Mea family have made wine in the Grand Cru Village of Louvois. Starting with Gilbert Mea in 1920, the unbroken lineage of family knowledge has been passed down, first from father to son, then father to daughter, and now from mother to daughter. In 1940, René the second generation of the family, was taken prisoner and spent five years in a camp in Austria. While he was away, his son, Guy, assumed the role of man of the house in charge of vines and animals despite only being nine years old. René returned safe and in good health, and Guy went off to school in Paris. There he learned to market and sell the champagne he was already accustomed to making from his own vines. While Guy is still alive and a part of the team, he turned over the day-to-day duties to his daughter Evelyne in 1982, who passed it along after 35 years to her daughter and current winemaker Sophie.

Domaine Rousseaux-Batteux

Like many of the best of Champagne's grower-producers the Rousseaux's have been growing vines for more than a century in the Grand Cru village of Verzenay. A walk up and down the streets in the village will reveal to you the number of family members, cousins, aunts, and uncles involved in making wine here. The family lineage to the vines that seems almost de rigueur these days is written in the family DNA, but Adrien, a fourth-generation winemaker, is anything but typical. Adrien's grandfather, Paul, bottled his first Champagne at the beginning of the 20th century, and his father, Denis, created the current brand Rousseaux-Batteux in 1976. Adrien has been in charge of the estate since 2012. He manages 2.6ha of vines spread across Verzenay, Verzy, Louvois, and Villers-Marmery.

Domaine des Tuileries

Bryan Marx is a young winemaker at the helm of this family winery in Venteuil. Five years ago, his father retired, and he and his mother bought a house in the south of France. While they occasionally return to assist in the winery, Bryan has assumed full control of the family business. Beginning with the 2019 harvest, Bryan carved out 1.5ha from five of his favorite plots to begin a new project, Domaine des Tuileries. The winery is named after the place where he and his grandfather used to picnic on warm summer days underneath an old Acacia tree.

Etienne Sandrin

Located in the picture perfect Côte des Bar village of Celles-sur-Ource, Etienne and Anne Sandrin took over the 10 hectares vineyard in 2006 after his parents and grandparents farmed it and sold grapes to the local coop. From 2006 to 2013 they progressively converted the vineyard to organic and biodynamic farming (certified Demeter in 2018). They started making their unique A Travers Celles cuvée in 2014, a blend of 80% Pinot Noir, 20% Pinot Blanc from different parcels across the village, with a very limited production. This started building their reputation. Their style is minimalist with no to low dosage and no use of wood.

Famille Delouvin

Geoffrey Delouvin works his 7 hectares of vines exclusively in the village of Vandières, just as the ten previous generations of his family have done. This family heritage and knowledge, coupled with a unique focus on one cru, make the wines he is producing some of the most exciting in all of Champagne. In 1992, after the cellar renovation, Geoffrey's father began a solera from his best Meunier reserve wines. Each year, a small percentage is drawn off for the Meunier Perpetual and Semper Fidelis and topped off with the wines of the year. The tanks that hold the 360 hectoliters of mature, deep, complex wines are the gem of the cellar.

J.M Gandon

Victor Gandon, a young and passionate Vigneron, is gaining recognition as a sought-after Champagne producer. His limited-quantity Champagnes are treasured discoveries. Reviving a family heritage, Champagne J.M Gandon traces back to his great-grandparents and father, Jean-Marie (J.M). Victor, who inherited vineyards in Branscourt, Vallée de la Vesle, specializes in Pinot Noir-based wines, highlighting the grape's exceptional qualities. He cultivates 5.5 hectares but currently vinifies only 0.72 hectares, with plans to increase this annually. His minimalistic winemaking approach uses minimal sulfur and no dosage, allowing pure fruit expression. A short skin maceration provides structure and a delicate pink hue to his wines.

Labbe et Fils

Damien and Jérôme Labbe come from a long line of grape growers, and more recently winemakers. The house, located in the village of Chamery in the Montagne de Reims, started making champagne at the end of the 20th century; the exact year is unknown. For generations, the family simply grew grapes in their small plot in their small village and sold them after each harvest. As the land and region slowly transitioned from agricultural farming to grape growing, the family began to acquire more plots and eventually formed a local co-op. At this point, the brothers' great-grandfather, Maurice Bonet, was the head of the house and a founding member of the CRVC (Cooperative Regional Wines of Champagne). Maurice had just one daughter, Jeannine, who married Michel Labbe. Together, they formed Champagne Labbe.

Louis Brochet

Fourth-generation brother and sister team Louis and Helene are now at the helm of this estate nestled in the vines of Ecueil. The first Louis Brochet made his first Champagne in the early 1900s from vines planted by his mother a generation earlier. They now farm 13ha spread over two distinct geographic zones. The first and more commonly known are the Montagne de Reims and the Ecueil, Sacy, and Villers aux Noeuds villages. The second zone is the Vallée de l'Arde and its pretty hillside vineyards on the terroirs of Branscourt, Mery-Premecy, and Treslon. They farm 50 plots in total and the predominant soils vary but mostly consist of clay, sandy loam over chalk.

Domaine Anne et Herve Sigaut [Chambolle-Musigny]

The Sigauts are unassuming but genuinely committed vigneron. Hervé Sigaut and wife Anne took over from Maurice Sigaut in 1990 and made important improvements both in the vineyard work and in the cellar. The winery was revamped in 2004 with a sorting table, and its stainless steel tanks are sunk into the winery floor, which helps evacuate harmful carbon dioxide during fermentation. They touch the wines as little as possible in the cellar and racks only once. New wood does not exceed 40% of the total, and the oldest barrels are five years old from several coopers. The aim is to drop the rotation to a 3-year cycle.

Domaine de la Cras & Marc Soyard [Dijon] - *Arriving Winter 2024*

Domaine de la Cras, a 160-hectare property outside Dijon, was purchased by the city in 2013 and entrusted to young winemaker Marc Soyard. With experience from Domaine Bizot in Vosne Romanée, Soyard farms the vineyards organically, incorporating biodynamic practices and minimal intervention winemaking. Reds are vinified with whole clusters and natural yeasts, and he experiments with a variety of wood for élevage. The domaine, classified as Bourgogne AOC, is the only one allowed to use the Coteaux de Dijon designation, producing distinctive wines from both lower and steeper vineyards, reflecting a unique terroir and winemaking philosophy.

Domaine Fourrier [Gevrey-Chambertin]

Domaine Fourrier in Gevrey-Chambertin, Burgundy, is led by Jean-Marie Fourrier, who took over from his father in 1994. With experience from Henry Jay and Domaine Drouhin, he modernized the domaine by vinifying each Gevrey 1er cru separately to increase the domaine bottlings. Jean-Marie focuses on old vines and meticulous care without strict biodynamic practices. In the cellar, he preserves fruit silkiness with de-stemming, natural fermentation, and manual punch-downs. Wines are matured in 20% new oak barrels, known for their bright color, pure red fruit aromas, and fine tannins. Jean-Marie, aided by his sister Isabelle and wife Vicki, produces authentic, terroir-driven wines.

Domaine Henri Germain [Meursault]

Founded in 1973, Henri Germain established his namesake estate after moving to Meursault from Chateau de Chorey les Beaune. After marrying his wife, Paulette Pillot, his small parcel in Meursault Charnes grew to include vineyards in Chassagne-Montrachet that she had inherited from her father, Alphonse Pillot. Today, Germain's eight hectares of vines include holdings across Meursault, Beaune, and Chassagne-Montrachet, most of which are white wine. Germain has retired and passed on the day-to-day operations of the state to his son, Jean-Francois.

Domaine Hudelot-Noëllat [Vougeot]

The Hudelot-Noëllat estate has given itself the mission of revealing the most sincere typicity of their terroirs. Founded in 1962 by Alain Hudelot, the estate has 10 hectares spread over 4 villages and 15 appellations. It is today managed by his grandson, Charles van Canneyt, who combines modern and ancestral techniques so that the terroir expresses itself without artifice. The winemaking is classic and minimally

Domaine Jean-Marc Millot [Cote de Nuits]

Arriving at the estate in 2014, Alix Millot started making wine on her own in 2016. Since then, she has perpetuated the family values of respect for the terroir instilled by her father. The vineyard is farmed organically (non-certified) with limited yields. Alix is committed to the traditional methods of wine production and is deeply committed in the respect of the typicity of the climates. During vinification, grapes are fermented with little extraction and no use of additives. Only ambient yeast is used. The estate grows today with cuvées of natural wines, sulfur-free and vinified with entire grapes (Aligoté, Côte de Nuits “Le Vaucrain” and Passetoutgrain “Les Autrots”). These wines, initially without very much fame, now enjoy a great notoriety.

Maison Glandien [Meursault]

Tino Kuban manages Les Jardin Vivants and Maison Glandien in Meursault. Les Jardin Vivants operates 1.5 ha vineyards with low yields, employing natural winemaking methods such as a vertical press, gravity, and no racking. Harvesting is done in multiple passes for optimal berry ripeness. At Maison Glandien, Tino acts as a négociant, sourcing grapes from Burgundy, Beaujolais, Jura, and Alsace. All wines undergo spontaneous fermentation, age without sulfites in used barrels, and receive minimal sulfites during bottling.

Maison Lou Dumont [Gevrey-Chambertin]

Driven by a passion for Burgundy and the dream of making wine, Japanese Sommelier Koji Nakada left his native Tokyo in 1996 and moved to Beaune to study oenology at the prestigious CFPPA. The first thing he had to do was learn French. He enrolled in language class at Dijon where his teacher was the lovely Jae Hwa Park, an expatriated Korean. During Koji's studies in Beaune, and during his subsequent internships at Chateau Kirwan in Bordeaux, and at small houses in Champagne and Alsace, the two dated and then married. The vineyards employ selection massale, an ancient propagation method using cuttings from the best plants to maintain genetic diversity. Notable vine pedigrees include Syrah from Chave (Hermitage), Grenache from Château Rayas, and Mourvèdre from Domaine Tempier (Bandol). With yields as low as 25 hectoliters per hectare, significantly below the authorized volume for the region, the focus is on producing highly concentrated, flavorful grapes, essential for crafting exceptional wines.

Beatrice & Pascal Lambert believe that crafting the finest, richest Chinon possible begins with respect for the soil and the vine. Their 18 ha domaine, Les Chesnaies, sits in Cravant-les-Côteaux, just east of the center of Chinon, and is home to some of the finest terroirs for production of artisanal Cabernet Franc and Chenin Blanc in the region. Gravelly, alluvial soils with plentiful silica produce wines of richness, while calcareous clay (which includes deposits of chalky tuffeau) and silex impart regional distinction and finesse. Luc and Bénédicte's dedication results in wines that evoke deep emotions, with a focus on aroma, mouthfeel, precision, and energy, reflecting their passion and commitment to excellence.

Since 1974, the Ribes family has been dedicated to producing wines with personality and character. Their vineyards are built around Negrette, with Cabernet Sauvignon and Syrah each playing a supporting role. With a total of 24 hectares, Domaine Le Roc has a team to tend to all of its needs. Karthäuserhof [Mosel]

The historic Karthäuserhof estate is nestled in a side valley near the village of Eitelsbach, just before the Ruwer meets the Mosel. While wine was made here in Roman times, it was "officially" founded in 1335, when Balduin, the Archbishop and Elector of Trier, gave the vineyards to the Carthusian monks. After Napoleonic secularization, the property was auctioned in 1811 to Valentin Leonardy, and has remained in the same family for over 200 years. Since 2012, it has been run by Albert Behler. These wines are emblematic not only of Mosel but of the Ruwer, a forest-flanked tributary that has only held distinct appellation status since 2020. The gem of the estate is the 19ha Karthäuserhofberg vineyard on iron-rich blue and gray slate, planted mostly to Riesling. Further holdings have been strategically added to bring total vineyard area to about 28ha. In 2020, the estate hired Mathieu Kauffmann, 2020 Gault Millau Winemaker of the Year, who previously worked at Von Buhl and Bollinger, and who swiftly began the conversion to organic and biodynamic practices. There is no use of pesticides or artificial sprays. Wines are made using whole bunches, without added enzymes or yeasts, and bottled without fining. While the estate produces off-dry and sweet Prädikat wines, most of their production is dry. Wines are mineral, crystalline, stunningly dimensional, and famously age-worthy.

Mönchhof [Mosel]

The iconic Mönchhof, formerly a possession of the Cistercian Abbey at Himmerod, is one of the oldest wine estates in the Mosel valley, with documented vineyard holding around the village of Ürzig dating back as early as 1177; contemporaneously, the monks built the vaulted cellars, which are still in use today. After Napoleonic secularization, the Eymael family purchased the estate on auction in 1804. In 2016, sixth generation Robert Eymael sold the winery to an investor; it is now managed by cellar and vineyard master Philippe Conzen. The Mönchhof farms the prestigious sites of Ürzig Würzgarten, Erden Treppchen and Erden Prälat, planted 100% to Riesling on original rootstocks. Contemporary archeologists excavated one of the oldest and largest wine presses north of the Alps in the Erden Treppchen vineyard; proof that viticulture in these villages was well underway in the Roman era, over 2000 years ago.

Schnaitmann [Württemberg]

Rainer Schnaitmann's family has grown grapes on the steep slopes of Stuttgart for 600 years; early on, he abandoned his plan to study architecture, and took up their mantle, founding his own label in 1997 convinced that the potential of the top vineyard sites in the Stuttgart-Rems Valley has yet to be reached. The estate comprises 25 ha of diverse plots on shell limestone, gypsum keuper, sandstone and marl. They have been affiliated with the VDP since 2006 (the youngest estate, at that time, to be recognized) and certified organic since 2016. 11,000 cases annual production is focused between Burgundian varieties and Riesling, with some Lemberger, Trollinger, Sauvignon blanc, Merlot and Cabernet in the mix. Production is focused on Riesling, Pinot Noir and Pinot Blanc but the specialty of the house is the aromatic varietal Scheurebe (a Riesling cross developed in the early 20th century), which has yielded wines of remarkable quality for decades at Weingut Pfeffingen.

Antonella Corda [Sardinia]

A 40-hectare farm with 15 hectares of vineyard, 12 of olive trees, 3 of crop land, and the rest left open for crop rotation. Antonella Corda believes sustainable cultivation to be the best way for people to coexist with nature, so it can be passed down to the next generation intact. All of this means that organic fertilizers, integrated pest control actions, and sustainable irrigation systems are utilized in the vineyards. The vineyards are already managed organically and starting from vintage 2021 the wines will be organic officially certified. The wines produced are the result of the perfect combination between terroir and indigenous grapes.

Filippo Grasso [Sicily]

Filippo Grasso is a small family owned winery on the north side of Mount Etna in Sicily. The current generation is the 4th generation of winemakers and they have been bottling their own wine since 2006. They are located on the Contrada Calderada, which features soils of large, black volcanic rocks that absorb the heat of the sun during the day and retain this warmth at night, protecting the vines from cool mountain nights. Filippo Grasso has six hectares planted to indigenous Etna grapes, such as Carricante, Catarratto, Minella, Nerello Mascalese and Nerello Mantellato (aka Cappuccio). Their commitment to the grapes of the region is an obvious one for the winery, as the goal is to simply translate the terroir of Etna into the bottle. The wines are unoaked, reflecting the purity of the native grapes.

Herdade do Rocim

Located in the Lower Alentejo region in the southern half of Portugal, between Vidigueira and Cuba, lies the estate of Herdade do Rocim on 100 hectares, 60 of which are under vine. Alentejo is sparsely populated and, in contrast to the rest of Portugal, has many large estates. The climate is continental, with hot summers and cold winters. Having fairly reliable weather combined with the large plots of available land equates to quality at an affordable price. Wheat is the most important crop grown here, but olive trees, cork trees and vineyards are all important agriculture here as well. Wines from Alentejo are becoming popular as consumers realize the great opportunities available here, and quality is improving exponentially. It is thought to be the new world inside the old world, with highly professional wineries using a scientific approach while respecting the terroir.
