Sixty (60) years in the making: 1954—2014. To preserve the History of the Billings Arts Association, I write & scan the following:

Spring 2013, the Billings Public Library, in accordance with plans to get ready for transfer into the New Billings Public Library, reviewed records stored in the basement area. The New building was not set-up for this type of record retention, and the records not removed were to be destroyed. A call was received that the Billings Arts Association had records in the Library Basement.

The records were picked up from the Library Basement by BAA Member Jeanette Magstadt.



Records in the form of Scrapbooks stored in the Billings Public Library Basement dated back to 1955.

These Scrapbooks were heavily covered in dust and obviously had not been opened for many years. Upon further investigation; 1954 seemed to be the oldest date, but the section behind the tab was blank.

Facts: The Montana Institute of the Arts was founded in 1948
With offices in Billings, MT.
The Billings Arts Association was formed in the fall of 1954 as a branch of The Montana Institute of the Arts (with no address)

The following article tells of the beginning.

A few notes from an article published in The Billings Gazette <u>September 21, 1960</u> "Wide Variety of the Arts Has Thrived Since Billings Founded" By Iris O. Malmin

".....the modern world is ruled by science, but given its shape and color by art, its most pleasing sounds and meaning by music and poetry, its categories characters and catch words by philosophy, fiction and history"... Jacques Barzun.

Billings has never been a cultural cactus patch. It has been unique among western frontier towns because since its beginning Billings has made consistent efforts to bring exhibits and the performing arts of drama and music to this area.

The Billings Studio Theater provides top-rate winter footlight entertainment to sell-out audiences, while during the summer a playhouse workshop with an enviable reputation draws actors from all over the county.

The Billings Symphony and Community Concert Association plays to capacity audiences year after year.

The Yellowstone Historical Society has developed a remarkable museum of western lore, preserving our heritage for future generations. The Billings Camera Club focuses on improving techniques and preserving the current scene for posterity. Private and adult educational art and craft classes are filled to capacity.

<u>The Montana Institute of the Arts was founded in 1948</u> to ".....preserve the heritage of the state as found in its history and folklore; to stimulate creative work in the several arts, and to make these cultural resources available for the benefit and enjoyment of the people of Montana".

MIA started an art collection for Montana in 1959, and has 12 items as nucleus of a collection to be shown permanently in the Montana Historical Museum in Helena.

The Institute is unique both in goals and principles. There is no other state organization where artists, historians, writers, weavers, photographers and craftsmen have banded together to further mutual interests.

Arts Group Formed

<u>The Billings Arts Association formed in the fall of 1954</u> by state members as a branch of the MIA, is open to anyone. It has grown from eight members to nearly 100. Eugene Carroll has been followed as president by Mrs. Ben Forbes, Malcolm Lewis, Irene McPherson, Bill Sage, Robert Fehlberg and Isabelle Johnson.

The association sponsors the Foreign Film Festival* to bring to Billings outstanding films from Sweden, Germany, Austria, Italy, England and Japan such as 'Aida" "Genevieve," "Green Magic," "Romeo and Juliet," "Othello," and "Animal Farm." These films vastly different from usual American film and television fare, afford a glimpse into foreign cultures. Proceeds since 1955 have gone into a **building fund** for a local art center.

An annual Christmas art exhibit sale and reception, held since 1956 in the EMC Union building draws large crowds to view oil and watercolor paintings, sculpture, mosaics, carving and ceramics produced by association members.

"Bits of Sage," a collection of prose and poetry by members of the writers' group, has sold 2,000 copies since 1957 and a fourth edition will be published this fall.

By the end of its first year the arts association had 30 members and was formulating plans for community activities.

Under the new president, Mrs. Ben Forbes, the association be-gan sponsoring the Film Festival, a series of foreign films shown at a Billings theatre. With the revenue from the films, members began a building fund which eventually will provide them with a suitable building.

Believing their goals are similar, the Billings Studio theatre and the

Billings Arts association last year joined forces.

In the fall of 1957 the group de-cided to begin an annual Festival of Arts. With the cooperation of the Billings Symphony and Chorus, the American Association of University Women, the Billings Cam-era Club, the Studio Theatre and Eastern Montana college, they printed a brochure listing all of the cultural events taking place in Billings during the months of Billings during the months of April, May and June this year. As you can see this was published by the Yellowstone News in December, 1958. The Billings Arts Association appeared to be a cultural leader in the late 50's. Note the quote: "That's "arts" with an "S." I hope you all can read this copy as I think the historical meaning would be lost if re-typed.

The Billings Arts Association continued as a Branch of the MIA and the first Newsletter of the BAA was published in November 1958.

Newsletters are a very important part of telling a story; no exception in the archives of the BAA. Volume I, Issue Number 1 was printed in <u>November, 1958</u>. Simply called: <u>BILLINGS ARTS newsletter, Billings Arts</u> <u>Association a branch of the Montana Institute of the Arts</u>. President Robert Fehlberg, Editor Edna A. Swab. No doubt printed on a mimeo. (The stencil duplicator or *mimeograph* machine (often abbreviated to mimeo) is a low-cost printing press that works by forcing ink through a stencil onto paper. These print machines were widely used in the 50's, replaced in the late 60's.)

Copy of the first BAA newsletter. Consisted of 2 pages and is quite readable. Many of the newsletters are faded / hard to read a characteristic of the mimeo.

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

BILLINGS ANTS ASS

I think with the start of a new publication and a new president of Billings Arts Association, we should review the reasons for having an organization like the Montana Institute of the Arts and the local branch, Billings Arts Association. To do this I am going to take a paragraph from the leaflet printed by M. I. A..... "M. I. A. stands for participation----participation of the creative worker and of the creative audience. For the creative person working alone or for the individual who has never participated in any of the arts but who inwardly has desire to do so, M. I. A. provides a meetingground which is stimulating to production."

This is basically what we are trying to do in Billings through the following ways: our art shows and sales. our displays of other artists' work, both in fine arts in co-operation with Eastern Montana College of Education and in dramatics through our film festival and our program of visiting artists and lecturers. With the profits from our film festival, we have started a building fund for an art center in which the creative workers could work together and where the audience could see the creations. A center of this nature would be of great value to the people who do not have facilities in their homes to carry out their work.

All of these activities have been spear-headed by a small group of loyal members who have done the work at every work session or planning meeting. These few are always in attendance and through their efforts, they have raised the building fund, arranged the art shows, the exhibits and the lectures.

Many more activities could be carried on if more members took an interest in the work and showed their appreciation by taking advantage of the opportunities provided for them. It is the purpose of M. I. A. to bring people of like interests together. It is important that the artist meet artist, writer meet writer, artist meet writer, that the amateur meet professional as well as the professional meet professional. During its ten years of existence, M. I. A. has continued to prove that it is needed in Montana and I can see no reason why we shouldn't have the largest, most active, creative branch in the state.

To better fill the needs of the people of Billings, two new interest groups are being formed--Crafts and The Arts of Daily Living. The Crafts group will include ceramics, enameling and jewelry. The Arts of Daily Living group is new to M. I. A. as well as to Billings, so will be an interesting group to watch in its activities. The primary function of this group is to form a place in M. I. A. for people who are interested in art in all its forms, but do not do any work themselves.






