Eligibility to Show

1. Exhibitors must reside in Miller.
2. 4-H and FFA Exhibitors must be members in good standing with their organization.
3. All exhibitors must be 8-21 years of age except for the clover kids, pee wee and open bottle calve classes.
1. Miller County exhibitors are not required to be a 4-H or FFA member to show in the breeding stock classes.
2. Market classes exhibitor must be a current FFA or 4-H member.
3. Exhibitors and their siblings, living in the same household, which are participating in other State or National 4-H or FFA event that do not have an alternative date to compete, may show and sell at the fair with approval from the 4-H or FFA leaders.
4. All exhibitors must be Missouri Show-Me Quality Assurance (SMQA) certified for the animal to be shown and sold at the auction.
5. Any 4-H member who has been an active member of a Miller County 4-H club for 2 years prior to their 18th birthday and not have passed their 21st birthday (4-H age) will be allowed to continue to show market animals, hams and bacons at the Miller County Fair. The member would be allowed to sell their market animal and or hams and bacons just as they were prior to aging out in 4-H.
6. Any 4-H and FFA member that resides in Miller County will have the ability to exhibit as an in-county exhibitor and must follow the in-county rules.
7. All in-county market entries must be owned by the exhibitor by the weigh-in date and must be weighed on this date to be eligible to enter the market classes at the fair.
8. All animals must be owned and shown by the exhibitor unless the exhibitor has more than 1 entry in the class.
9. Each exhibitor will be limited to two (2) entries in each breeding class.
10. Exhibitors are required to show animals unassisted. Special needs children are allowed to have another junior 4-H or FFA member assist them with prior permission of chairperson.
11. All exhibitors **must** show their **own** animals in the showmanship class.
12. Any misrepresentation of said exhibitors shall be cause for disqualification.
13. All exhibitors will be required to clean their own area at the conclusion of the fair or forfeit their premium money.
14. The homegrown market beef show is for Miller County 4-H and FFA members ONLY.
15. Only Miller County exhibitors are eligible to participate in the livestock sale. All animals that will be sold must remain on the fairgrounds until the livestock sale.

Out of County Eligibility to Show

1. 4-H and FFA members from adjoining and reciprocating counties may show at the Miller County Fair. Goats are open to all youth ages 8-21.
2. Exhibitors MUST be a member of a 4-H club or FFA chapter.
3. Reciprocation county must provide proof of ownership by county youth specialist or FFA Advisor prior to show.
4. Out of county exhibitors are limited to one (1) market animal entry.
5. Out of county exhibitor cannot reserve pens or stalls prior to weigh off.

General Rules for all Species

Animal Health

1. Missouri Department of Agriculture health regulations apply to all entries.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is required for sheep, swine, goats, & beef entries.
3. All animals must be identified by an official identification as defined by MO Department of Agriculture. Permanent identification can be RFID tags, tattoos, ear notches and scrapie tags (for sheep) that are approved by the state veterinarian.
4. No calming chemicals are to be used on any animal while on the Miller County Fairgrounds premises.
5. If an animal appears to be hazardous, uncontrollable, disruptive or the animal gets loose from the exhibitor 3 times in the show ring the chairman will ask the exhibitor to leave the ring.
6. While on the fairgrounds if an animal is deemed unsafe or exhibitor loses control 3 times the chair and livestock committee will ask that the animal be vacated from the fairgrounds.
7. If an animal is deemed unsafe and not able to show they are ineligible to sell.
8. Engorging animals with water or any filling substance/material by means of hoses, pipes, pumps, etc. is prohibited on the fairgrounds and will result in dismissal from show and sale.
9. All animals will be inspected upon arrival at the show and stock that are in unsound condition will be asked to leave the fairgrounds.
10. No drug use of any kind will be allowed on any market animal during the Miller County Fair. Drug use will cause disqualification of the animal. If any animal is condemned due to drug residues exhibitors will refund the purchase price of the animal and forfeit all prize money.

General Husbandry

1. All exhibitors will furnish their own feed and containers. Bedding will be provided for cattle, sheep & goats. Exhibitors may bring additional bedding, but **NO STRAW ALLOWED**. Poultry and rabbit exhibitors must provide their own cages.
2. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning the alley in front of their pen daily.
3. All stalls are to be cleaned by 5 p.m. so area will be clean for evening visitors.
4. All trailers and feed vehicles must be kept away from the barns from 5 p.m. until release of livestock or conclusion of the show. A designated parking area will be posted. This is to allow adequate room for evening fair visitors.
5. Chairman will assign pens and/or stall spaces. Cattle will be given a 3 ft space. The Chairman will have final say on pen/stall space if there is a conflict among exhibitors.
6. No cattle are allowed to stall in the sheep/ goat barn unless they have prior approval from the beef chairman.
7. A Herdsmanship plaque will be awarded to the exhibitor with the outstanding exhibit. The species chairman will make inspections to determine the winners. The following points will be considered: (1) cleanness, grooming, and appearance of the exhibits. (2) Handling of the feed, equipment, ECT. and keeping these items out of the alleys. And (3) cooperation, courtesy, and sportsmanship in the exhibit area and the show ring.

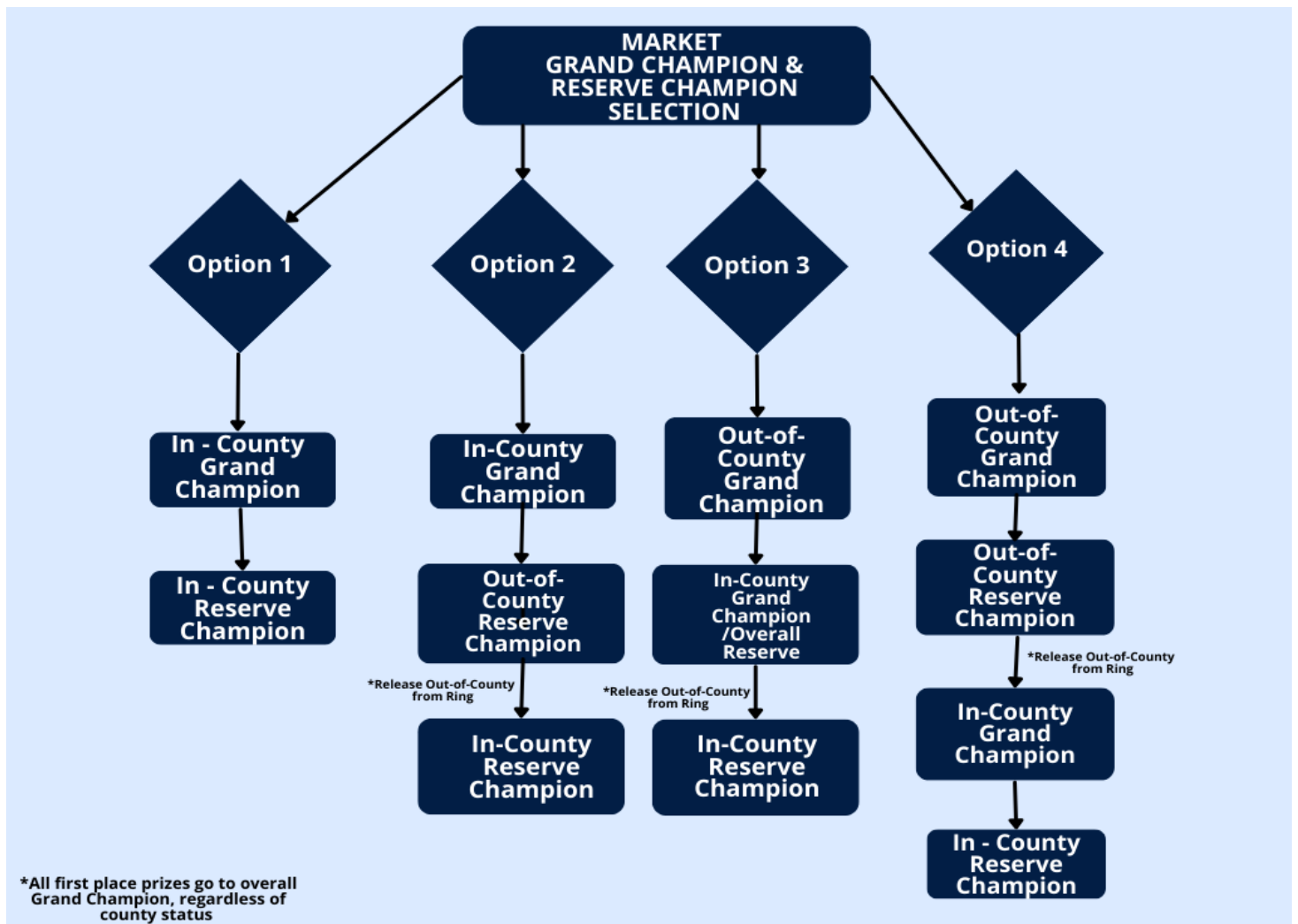
8. The exhibitor must be present for the chairman to choose their animal for the Livestock Judging Contest.

Weigh-in/off

1. Only the Chairman or chairman elect (person designated by the chairman) are allowed to read the scale weight.
2. All male animals, showing in market classes, must be clearly castrated prior to spring weigh-in.
3. Market animals that are MO State Fair bound that are required to have a DNA sample taken by the county representative will be done at the spring weigh-in.
4. At weigh-in exhibitors must provide a form of registration or have a permanent ID, as outlined by Missouri Department of Agriculture. If not an 840 tag will be available for the exhibitor or family member to apply. Assistance maybe asked from the 4-H and FFA leaders at weigh-in. If the tag falls out the chairman must be notified.
5. Exhibitors are allowed to reweigh at the discretion of the chairman IF: 1.) the weight is below minimum to show or sale 2.) the weight is above maximum to show or sale 3.) the chairman feels the weight is off. Reweighing must be done in the allotted time frame for weigh off.
6. Market classes will be determined after all animals in that specie have been weighed.

Show

1. All classes will be shown under the open system, except for the beginner's showmanship class, which will be judged under the Danish system. There will be no entry fee for the Beginner's Show Class.
2. All market animals will be judged and placed on hoof by the judge. ADG (average daily gain) will be computed on each animal with the top five paid premiums.
3. A Pee-Wee class for ages 7 & under will be before the first class of sheep, goats and swine.
4. Exhibitors may show two market animals per species, but only sell one. If both market animals are in the same weight class, another junior exhibitor may show one of the animals.
5. While the show is in progress one adult may assist the youth to and from the ring. All spectators must be outside the barn area.
6. Breeding animals must present registration papers on all animals exhibited that are purebred. Unless otherwise designated, all breeding classes are for registered animals. -Animal registration papers must be recorded according to the MO State Fair rules. Papers supporting this requirement must be available for the chairman to check at unloading.
7. In the championship drive, an overall grand and reserve will be selected. If either of these are out-of-county, the remaining out-of-county animals will be removed from the arena and any qualifying in-county animals will be brought to the arena for the selection of the in-county grand and reserve champions.



All animals that will not be sold at the livestock sale, must be removed from the fairgrounds by 4 p.m., the day of the sale.

Any dispute in the interpretation of the rules shall be referred to the chairperson whose decision **shall be final**. If the fair rules **do not** cover an issue that arise from a dispute, first, consult the chairman. If the dispute is not resolved then the livestock committee, made up of the Miller County Fair board, Livestock Chairman, FFA and 4-H representatives will make the final decision. The decision will be made by what the majority of the committee decides.

Country Cured Hams

Reagan Limbach & Hunter Naros, Chairperson

1. Hams must have been federally, or Missouri State inspected in origin or curing to be eligible to sell at the sale.
2. Class 115 is smoked hams. Class 116 is non-smoked.
3. Each exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit a total of two (2) hams per class, but only sell one (1) ham.
4. Entries will be taken during 4-H building check in for the given year. Hams will be released after 6pm on sale day.
5. Only Blue-ribbon hams will be eligible for the auction.
6. The top 15 overall hams from Miller County youth will be eligible to be auctioned at the livestock sale.
7. ALL hams left on premise by 10 PM on sale day will be donated to the local food bank.
8. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Country Cured Bacons

Reagan Limbach & Hunter Naros, Chairperson

1. Bacons must have been federally, or Missouri State inspected in origin or curing to be eligible to sell at the sale.
2. Class 114 is smoked bacons.
3. Each exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit a total of two (2) bacons but only sell one (1) bacon.
4. Entries will be taken during 4-H building check in for the given year. Bacons will be released after 6pm on sale day.
5. Only Blue-ribbon bacons will be eligible for the auction.
6. The top 5 overall bacons from Miller County youth will be eligible to be auctioned at the livestock sale.
7. ALL bacons left on premise by 10 PM on sale day, will be donated to the local food bank.
8. Bacons must have a length of 20" to 24" and width of 8" to 10", with a minimum weight of 6 to 6 ½ pounds.
9. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Junior Rabbit Department

Nicole Hanson, Chairperson

1. Exhibitors must be 8 – 21 years of age, except for Clover Kids (age 5-7) who compete for ribbons only. Exhibitors of an adjoining county MUST be a member of a 4-H club or FFA chapter. Exhibitors of Miller County are NOT required to be a 4-H or FFA member, except for the market rabbit class.
2. All known standard breeds recognized by the American Rabbit Breeds Association may be shown.
3. Each exhibitor can show an unlimited number in each individual class.
4. Each exhibitor will need to bring their rabbits in their own cages. Cages will NOT be provided.
5. Rabbits are released at noon following the poultry show. NO rabbits are to remain on the fairgrounds, except for the market rabbits that are eligible for the sale, which the chairman will determine if they need to stay.
6. Meat pens shall consist of three rabbits, all the same breed and variety. Meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Age limit is 10 weeks. Maximum weight is 5 ½ lbs. each. All rabbits must be weighed in the presence of the judge.
7. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Champion and Reserve Champion Rosettes will be awarded for each class. Awards will be awarded for best of breed and best opposite of breed in each class category and an award for overall best of show.

Grand and Reserve Champion pen of three rabbits will be sold at the livestock sale. Meat rabbits eligible for sale are to remain on the fairgrounds until sale.

Junior Poultry Department

Lynda Looten, Chairperson

1. Exhibitors must be 8 – 21 years of age, with exception of Clover Kids (ages 5-7) who compete for ribbons only. Exhibitors of an adjoining county MUST be a member of a 4-H club or FFA chapter. Exhibitors of Miller County are NOT required to be a 4-H or FFA member, except for the market poultry class.
2. Breeds will be Standard Breed (S), Bantam Breed (B), Waterfowl (Ducks or Geese (W), All other breeds (Guinea Fowl, peafowl, turkey, pigeon, and others) (O) and Laying Hen Trio Division.
3. Each exhibitor can show an unlimited number in each individual class.
4. Leg bands are recommended for identification purposes for all birds.
5. Each exhibitor will need to bring their poultry in their own cages. Cages will NOT be provided.
6. All poultry are released at the conclusion of the show. NO poultry are to remain on the fairgrounds, except for the market chickens that are eligible for the sale, which the chairman will determine if they need to stay.
7. Meat pens shall consist of four chickens, all of the same breed and variety. Weigh-in will take place during the poultry show registration in the presence of the judge. Weights and ages are as follows:
 - a. Market broilers, less than 70 days, 3 to 5 pounds
 - b. Market ducks, less than 90 days, 3 to 5 pounds
 - c. Market Turkey, approximately 16 to 20 weeks, 20 to 25 pounds
8. A laying hen trio class will be judged solely on production properties, uniformity, capacity and being a trio.

Poultry Health Regulations

9. Intrastate (Poultry and waterfowl in Missouri moving for exhibition only)
 - a. All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
 - b. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
 - c. Pullorum-Typhoid test – All poultry (except waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan or an equivalent program which has been tested within the past 12 months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.
10. A State Veterinarian may be present to inspect the health of the bird and pull blood for testing.
11. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Jacob Blank, Chairperson

1. Exhibitors may weigh in a maximum of two (2) market lambs or one (1) market lamb per exhibitor in a family with one (1) reserve lamb per family (household). Exhibitors may show both market lambs, providing they are not in the same weight class, but sell only one (1). If market animals are in the same weight class, another market exhibitor may show one of the market animals.
2. Market animals must be sheared and **dry** at weigh-in and weigh-off. No sweats allowed on animals when weighing.
3. There will be a separate show for haired sheep and wool sheep.
4. Weight limited on the market lamb class will be a minimum of 90 lbs. for wool sheep and 60 lbs. for haired sheep. Class weight breaks will be determined at the discretion of the chairman, after the weigh-in to create equal classes. The top animal from each class will compete for grand and reserve market lamb.
5. Market wool lambs weighing less than 90 lbs. and market hair lambs weighing less than 60 lbs. will be eligible to show in the premarket lamb class, instead of the market lamb classes, for ribbons only. The lamb may sell for premium only. Both pre and post market are allowed in the championship drive.
6. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Junior Goat Department

1. Exhibitors may weigh in a maximum of two (2) market goats or one (1) goat per exhibitor in a family with one (1) reserve goat per family (household). Exhibitors may show both market goats, providing they are not in the same weight class, but sell only one (1). If market animals are in the same weight class, another market exhibitor may show one of the market animals.
2. Market animals must be dry at weigh-in and weigh-off. No sweats allowed on animals when weighing.
3. Weigh limit on the market goat class will be a minimum of 40 lbs. Class weight breaks will be determined at the discretion of the chairman, after the weigh-in to create equal classes. The top animal from each class will compete for grand and reserve market goat.
4. Market goats weighing less than 40 lbs. will be eligible to show in the premarket goat class, instead of the market goat class, for ribbons only. The goat may sell for premium only. Both pre and post market are allowed in the championship drive.
5. It will be at the digression of the judge if bracing of market goats is allowed.
6. The general rules section applies to all entries.

Junior Swine Department

Bonnie Ahart, Chairperson

1. All entries must be farrowed in the month they are exhibited.
2. At least two exhibitors with animals in a specific breed will establish a breed show.
3. Breeding stock must be in place on the fairgrounds by 1p.m. on the day of weigh off.
4. All exhibitors will be required to keep the wash rack doors closed when washing hogs.
5. No hogs will be loaded before the end of the show.
6. Market hogs can be purebred or crossbred.
7. Exhibitors are allowed to show 2 market hogs. If both animals are in the same weight class, another swine exhibitor may show one of the animals.
8. Exhibitors will be responsible for getting their market hogs to the scales for weighing and class placings.
9. Pig must be washed and clean in order to be numbered at the scale. Do not wash number off the pig after they have been numbered. The exhibitor will be responsible to see that the number is legible at show time.
10. The market hog must weigh between 230 and 310 lbs. to be eligible for the market hog show and sale. Any hog weighing 229 lbs. or below may show in the pre-market class for ribbon only and sell for premium only. Hogs weighing over 310 lbs. may show in the post-market class for ribbon only and sell with a maximum pay weight of 310 lbs. All pre/ post market will compete to choose one overall division winner. Those division winners will compete in the overall market championship drive.
11. The top two market hogs from each class will show for champion and reserve market hog.
12. Exhibitors may weigh in a maximum of four (4) market hogs at the spring weigh-in. Ownership can be declared as "FAMILY" until weigh-off. At the fair weigh-off, ONLY 2 market hogs may be weighed back in per exhibitor at which time they will declare which exhibitor will show the animal.
13. Gilts may be shown in a market hog class or a breeding stock class, but not both.
14. The general rules section applies to all entries.

1. A "Commercial" heifer class has been designated for beef heifers of mixed percentage, or that are in an upgrading program.
2. All animals of any recognized breed will be judged separately in each breed class.
3. All steers/market heifers must be weighed at the spring weigh-in to be eligible to enter the Market Beef Class. At weigh-in, exhibitors will designate whether they are homegrown or purchased animals.
4. Exhibitors may weigh in a maximum of three (3) market beef. Ownership can be declared as "FAMILY" until weigh-off. At the fair weigh-off, the exhibitor must declare which two (2) market animals they will show.
5. Class weigh breaks will be determined after the weigh-off to create equal classes as determined by the chairman for a homegrown and purchased show. The top two animals from each class will compete for Grand and Reserve Homegrown & Purchased Champions and then for overall champions. In the event, that the grand and reserve purchased are out of county then an in county purchased grand and reserve will be chosen.
6. All beef cattle must be haltered and tied, as well as have a necktie. Nothing sharp is allowed on the halter.
7. The weight for a market beef to be eligible to sell is 950 to 1500lbs. Animals weighing 949 lbs. or below may sell for premium only. Animals weighing over 1500lbs may sell with the maximum pay weight of 1500 lbs.
8. Any market steer/heifer weighing 949lbs or less at the time of weigh-off will be eligible to show in the Prospect Market Class for ribbons only. Any market steer/heifer weighing 1501lbs or more will be eligible to show in the Post Market Class for ribbons only. All pre/ post market will compete to choose one overall division winner. Those division winners will compete in the overall market championship drive.
9. Animals must be steered and dehorned prior to spring weigh-in. Scur regrowth will be limited to 1 inch at weigh-off.
10. All market animals must have a permanent ear tag at weigh-in and the same tag must be in at weigh-off. The tag must remain in the calves' ear until the conclusion of the fair. Any lost tag must be reported to the beef chairman immediately.
11. Homegrown beef show will show first followed by purchased beef show.
12. The general rules section applies to all entries.

- 4. All 4-H members, in or out of county, participating in the bucket calf show must present their Missouri Show-Me Quality Assurance Certificate at time of check in.**
5. The calf must be halter broke.
6. Exhibitors may show one heifer and one bull calf.
7. Exhibitor must be between 8 and 12 years old from Miller County or an adjoining county.
8. Exhibitors must have cared for the calf. Care includes: feeding, grooming, breaking the calf to lead, and looking after the calf's overall health.
9. Exhibitor may show any breed, any sex.
10. Calf must be born between February 1 and June 1 of the current show year.
11. Calf must have been raised on a bottle and not allowed to nurse a cow after two (2) weeks of age.
12. The criteria for judging will be based on 20% showmanship, 40% overall condition and health of the animal, and 40% knowledge about the animal. Participants will be interviewed by the judge while in the show ring.
13. Classes of bucket calves will be divided by age of the exhibitor, NOT by the breeds, size, weight, etc., of the calves. Classes will be left to the discretion of the bucket calve superintendent.
14. Grooming and fitting of bucket calves may only be done by exhibitor, with help from exhibitor's parents or siblings.
15. Exhibitors must keep pens and alleys clean at all times. No straw or hay bedding. Exhibitors are responsible for removing all trash and manure, making the barn ready for the other beef animals.
16. A \$10 Premium will be awarded.
17. Class breaks will be at the discretion of the chairman.

Miller County Fair Sale Rules

1. All sales are limited to members of Miller County 4-H and FFA clubs.
2. Market beef, market hogs, market lambs, market goats, market rabbits, market chickens, cured hams and cured bacons will be limited to selling two (2) items in the sale. Pen of meat rabbits and meat chickens are considered (1) sale animal. A ham or bacon slab will also be considered (1) one sale item. Exhibitors may not sell two (2) items in any one category.
3. Sale order will be determined by official placings in each individual show. At the sale, the order will be as follows: rabbits, poultry, bacon, hams, market goats, market lambs, market hogs, market beef with animals being sold out right to sell first and premium only to follow.
4. Exhibitors will be responsible for the delivery of their animals to location of the buyer's choice.
5. No animals at the sale are to be removed until released by the committee member assigned to the market beef, market hog, market goats or market lamb sections. Exhibitors will be told who these people are before the sale.
6. Checks from the sale of animals will not be issued on sale day but WILL BE MAILED to each exhibitor.
7. A 3% sales fee will be deducted for sale committee use.
8. No animal will be sold without release forms signed by owners. Release forms will be available at least two (2) hours prior to sale by sale chairman or committee.
9. The exhibitor will be present and will lead or drive and show their animals in the sale ring. In emergency situations, at the discretion of the sale committee, another exhibitor may show to sell for another exhibitor.
10. No drug use of any kind will be allowed on any market animal during the Miller County Youth Fair. Drug use will cause disqualifications of the animal. If an animal is condemned due to drug residues, exhibitor will refund purchase price of animal and forfeit all prize money.
11. The buyer is responsible to pay the full price for the animal. If they resale to the floor they will be responsible for the difference between the floor and sale price. If the exhibitor retains ownership of their animal (selling as premium only) the buyer will pay the amount of the premium only.
12. Retained ownership is when an animal is sold only for the premium. Retained ownership must be known by the show chairman by the end of the show in order for the animal to be labeled in the sale booklet.
13. Miller County Fair does accept tack on premiums under the following conditions.
 - a. Buyer must attend the sale and obtain a buyer number. Buyers do not have to buy to do a tack on premium, but they do have to at least attend the sale.
 - b. Tack on premiums can only be accepted on the day of the sale.
 - c. Miller County Fair does not announce tack on premiums in anyway during the sale. Exhibitors will be informed with their check that you gave them a tack on premium and the amount.

- d. Miller County Fair does not retain any commission from funds provided for tack on premiums.
- 14. Hams, bacons, sheep, goats, pen of rabbits and pen of chickens will be sold by the unit (one lot) with a starting bid of \$100. Swine and beef that are not premium only will be sold by the pound.
- 15. After the floor is sold, the items sold outright will sell followed by the premium only animals.
- 16. No banners of sponsorship may be placed in and around the livestock barn.
