<u>Ways and Means</u>: I could never understand why Mama preferred staying home all the time. She never wanted to go anywhere. 2020 has given me a new appreciation and understanding of HOME. The more time I'm here, the more I like it. I do miss seeing my family and friends, though. But let's be optimistic about 2021 and use this extra time to make items for our next Quilt Show Boutique! My suggestion for January is Fabric Lanyards. You can find many YouTube videos on how to make these. I liked the Crafty Crafts by Deanna. JoAnn Fabric and Crafts also has a good one.

## Fabric Lanyards:

Pick out some pretty fabric and thread to match. Cut a 3" strip x width of fabric. Fold in half and press. Open and fold each side to middle, press. Fold and press again so fabric measures 1"xWOF Top stitch open side 1/8" to 1/4". Repeat on other side.Insert D ring and fold up 1" from bottom on each side and sew securely. (I have ordered some of the D Rings from Amazon, if you need them.). You can zig zag over raw edges. Also sew close to D Ring to keep it in place. Have fun making these. Kathy Hamby
