Member Bio's: And Here's..... Sharon Cellemme!!

I was born in Providence, Rhode Island and our family moved to my mother's home town of Burrillville, RI when I was in first grade. I'm the oldest of 3 girls. My mom hasn't left her hometown since she moved back. She's now in a nursing home and just turned 98!

My mother didn't sew, so I didn't learn to sew at home, as many of you did. I learned to sew in a home economics class when I was in high school. I got a pretty bad grade on my first project and, when my mother went to parent's night at the school, the teacher told my mom that it was because I wouldn't ask for help! Believe it or not, I was really shy in high school! How things have changed!! The really good thing that happened in that home ec class was that it helped me realize that I liked all things home ec related.... like cooking, nutrition, sewing, child development, consumer economics, etc. So, when it was time to head to college, I chose to major in home economics education. I taught high school home economics for 3 years. I taught in North Haven, CT for 2 years and spent my 3rd year at Burrillville high school –my alma mater!

I spent 6 years working for the Providence Gas Company. My official title was consumer affairs specialist, which was a fancy way of saying I was a jack of all trades. I was a guest speaker at schools and group meetings, I helped write the company newsletter, I tested recipes for a monthly recipe sheet that we sent to customers and, best of all, we had a call center that customers could call into with questions about cooking, nutrition and anything else food related. We were allrecipes.com before there was internet!!

While I was working for the gas company, I decided to enroll in an MBA program. I didn't finish my MBA but I did find my husband, Ray. Once we had our first daughter, I became a stay-at-home mom. When our daughters were 4 and 2, we moved to Statesboro, GA. (Within 2 or 3 months of living there, I was told I was nice ...for a Yankee!)

I have two favorite things about being a guild member. Since I'm not particularly creative, I love seeing how creative other people are. It amazes me. I guess I'm hoping it rubs off! Also, I am so impressed with how helpful and encouraging the guild members are. Thank you so much for that.
