"Do you see the blue lights?"

"Do you see the blue lights?"
"What blue lights?"
"Whatever you do don't turn left!" This was the conversation I overheard years ago as I was flying into Chicago O'Hare, listening on the channel that broadcast the airport-to-plane communications.

Normal air traffic conversations continued. Suddenly, again I could hear the voice of a concerned traffic controller, "Do you see the blue lights?" Then a spaced-out response, "What blue lights?" Again, the frantic warning, "Don't turn left!" The normal traffic responses once more filled the air. After a few minutes, again almost hysterical request, "Now, do you see the blue lights?" Still with no emotion came the words, "What blue lights?" Almost screaming, the first voice came back, "Don't move!" Again all was normal. After a time the voice spoke again. This time with a tone of hope, "Do you see the blue lights?" But the other voice remained the same "What blue lights?" One could only imagine the frustrated scene in the control tower.

With a new sense of resolve the controller firmly said, "Just stay where you are, and we will come find you." Somewhere out on the massive Chicago airport that night a small plane was lost and

clueless. Disaster was imminent. Since the pilot was unable to find his way, the traffic controller finally did what had to be done. He sent someone to find that plane and lead it safely back to the terminal.

That night as I listened to this conversation, I rolled in laughter. It seemed so bizarre. Yet, as I reflect on it, there is nothing here that is very amusing. That pilot was in real trouble, even though he never seemed to understand the gravity of the situation. A wrong move and he would have had a disaster on his hands. He needed someone to lead him out of the maze. Yelling at him didn't do it. Reasoning didn't do it. He needed someone actually to come personally to help him and to lead him safely to the terminal.

And so it is with us. We so often are oblivious to our dilemma. Those around us are issuing warnings. But we have no clue. And we might be facing radical danger. What we need is for someone to do more than yell at us. We need someone to come to our aid. To come alongside. To help us by leading us to safety.

That is exactly what Jesus did for us. He came from heaven to find us and lead us home. He became a man so that He could communicate with us. He died on the cross for us so that He could pay the penalty for our sin, and thus pro-

vide the only pathway back to the terminal. He calls out to us and seeks us in the midst of our darkness, when we can't even see the "blue lights." He is willing to come and get us and take us home.

And if you are one who sits safely in the 'control tower', that knows the way home. Are you willing to help others find safety? To call out. To reason. And most importantly, to come alongside and help the clueless to find home. To find the Christ that will save them from disaster. This is what He has commissioned us to do.
