## Needing more than Oxygen

Without enough oxygen you die. And before you die you get a really bad headache. Well, I have never actually experienced the first, but I have experienced the latter. A few years ago, we travelled to Colorado, and for the first time I experienced a really bad case of altitude sickness.

After spending the night with some friends in Longmont, we made our trek toward Frisco, CO, the most direct way – over the mountains of Rocky Mountain National Park. We made the decision to travel up the one-way dirt road, Old Falls Creek Road, instead of going up the more well-traveled Old Thompson Canyon (actually, I made the decision, Janice had great misgivings about it). But it was a good choice (or so I thought), as we crept up the narrow way in the midst of gorgeous aspens in full color, with great views from the sheer cliffs off the road, and many scenic places to stop. We got out and walked and enjoyed every inch of the way up the mountain to its summit at close to 12,000 feet.

But by the time we reached the summit I knew something was amiss. There was something not right. I felt wrong. Not totally dizzy, but not right. My head began to throb. I was not quite sick, but queasy. Instead of the joy of being outside, I just really did not care much about what was going on. A gurgle developed in my chest, and I had a hard time breathing. We continued our journey over the mountains, arriving in Frisco late that day. My symptoms continued as I had a hard time breathing, sleeping, and eating. Still at over 9,000 feet, I did not get any relief.

For three days, I was miserable, but I did not even consider cutting the trip short. I was man enough to weather this out (yeah! I did spend a couple of days in bed). I am not that old, I thought. I was not going to be hampered by something as silly as not enough oxygen. And in fact, I did not die. My body did finally create enough red blood cells to adapt. We finished the week traveling to Independence Pass (over 12,000 feet) and lived to tell about it. But the truth is perhaps I should not have been so cavalier.

People do die from altitude sickness (true, not generally in the Rockies, but at even higher elevations in the Himalayas). The body needs oxygen – if you don't have enough, things go really bad. My experience was a bit silly, but ask someone with COPD how serious it can be. When the body does not get enough oxygen, the body suffers. The body must have oxygen. Regularly. Continuously.

So it is spiritually. A human life without a constant relationship with God suffers. We were made for Him. Without Him, life just is not right. Often the first symptoms that we do not have Him are subtle - discomfort, uneasiness, a sense of nonwellbeing. But if the symptoms are not addressed, the problems worsen, as life seems of no value, and/or normal routines begin to breakdown. We may try to man up (or woman up as the case may be) and deny it. We may pretend we can make it anyway. We can refuse to realize what is happening. But ultimately, without Him we suffer.

This God has reached out to us. As maker and designer, he has made us with a need for Him. Like a physical body must have oxygen, spiritually we must have God. All sinned and separated themselves from Him. Without Him we are literally in various stages of death. But God sent His Son to die for our sin, so that now we can choose to return to Him. As a Christian, we can again breathe in that life that He offers. But as Christians we still need a constant relationship with Him. Every day. Every moment. He is our life. He is our breath. Living life without Him we wither away.

There is no substitute. We need Him. Let us allow His Word to feed our souls. Let us communicate with Him regularly. Let us allow His life to fill our life. Let us respond as He guides. Let us find Him in His community, the church, among His people. He desires to fill our lives, but we must choose to do the things that allow Him to fill our spiritual lungs.
