Are you sick of winter!!! If so, then maybe the Ground Hog will predict an early ending to it on Groundhog Day; next week, February 2nd. Have you ever wondered how this event originated? If so, read the article below to find out.

First Groundhog Day: 1887 on February 2nd

On February 2, 1887, <u>Groundhog Day</u>, featuring a rodent meteorologist, is celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in

Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania.

According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.



Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal–the hedgehog–as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State.

Groundhogs, also called woodchucks and whose scientific name is *Marmota monax*, typically weigh 12 to 15 pounds and live six to eight years. They eat vegetables and fruits, whistle when they're frightened or looking for a mate (they're sometimes called whistle pigs) and can climb trees and swim.

They go into hibernation in the late fall; during this time, their body temperatures drop significantly, their heartbeats slow from 80 to five beats per minute and they can lose 30 percent of their body fat. In February, male groundhogs emerge from their burrows to look for a mate (not to predict the weather) before going underground again. They come out of hibernation for good in March.

In 1887, a newspaper editor belonging to a group of groundhog hunters from Punxsutawney called the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club declared that Phil, the Punxsutawney groundhog, was America's only true weather-forecasting groundhog. The line of groundhogs that have since been known as Phil might be America's most famous groundhogs, but other towns across North America now have their own weather-predicting rodents, from Birmingham Bill to Staten Island Chuck to Shubenacadie Sam in Canada.

In 1993, the movie *Groundhog Day* starring Bill Murray popularized the usage of "groundhog day" to mean something that is repeated over and over. Today, tens of thousands of people converge on Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney each February 2 to witness Phil's prediction. The Punxsutawney Groundhog Club hosts a three-day celebration featuring entertainment and activities.


The Senior Corner

- On Thursday, January 6th, seniors met with Ms. Okwabi (Senior Activities Advisor) to discuss senior activities, the senior trip, prom, etc. Below is a synopsis of the meeting:
 - 1. Seniors were given a link to a survey to vote on the design of the Senior hoodies. Three designs were selected as finalists. The chosen design can be found below.
 - 2. Given that the group is small in numbers the school would try to raise the money needed for the senior activities via its partners and any funds earmarked for seniors from previous years cut short due to the pandemic. The budget for the activities is set at \$13,000.00 which would include the senior trip and prom. We would try to keep cost down by using supplies that we already have; cap and gown, diploma cases, etc.
 - 3. Seniors will be given a contract that details expectations for the trip and prom.
 - 4. Senior activities committees were created which would meet every week, as needed; Prom, Trip, and General Activities.
 - 5. Students who paid for the senior pictures will be given a refund on the week of January 24th as a result of the lack in picture quality by the company.
 - 6. Senior trip will be in the form of a "Staycation" with two days full of fun local activities given that no overnight trips are currently allowed by the DOE.
- A new company was selected to retake senior pictures for the yearbook. There will be
 no charge to students. The date for the new senior pictures to be taken will be on
 February 14 at 9:30am; a schedule will be shared with seniors the week prior to the
 event. Parents will be given the option of purchasing prints in a pre-determined
 package choice. The name of the company is Picture This Photography;

- The senior committees are narrowing down the locations of prom and the details for the senior trip.
- During a meeting with the Parent Association (PA) recently, it was unanimously voted for the PA to provide the initial deposit funds for prom to secure a location. The funds would be returned to the PA by the end of the year. Thank you PA!!!
- At the same meeting, parent volunteers for these events were discussed. The
 attending parents asked to be notified should there be any need for volunteers,
 especially in the event that the prom location doesn't provide the decorations based
 on the theme seniors choose.
- Graduation this year will take place at our school on Friday, June 24th, late in the day.
- Senior activities updates will be made in this section of the Parent Newsletter in addition to the regular emails to parents from Ms. Okwabi. Ms. Okwabi also will appeal to parents directly via email in the event there is a need to meet specific deadlines by students; e.g. baby pictures for yearbook.









