

March marks *Women's History Month*. Do you know how this celebration of women came into existence??? If not, read below: Women's History Month 2024

Women's History Month is a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture and society and has been observed annually in the month of March in the United States since 1987. Women's History Month 2022 will take place from Tuesday, March 1-Thursday, March 31, 2022.

Why Do We Celebrate Women's History Month?

Women's History Month is a dedicated month to reflect on the often-overlooked contributions of women to United States history. From Abigail Adams to Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth to



Rosa Parks, the timeline of women's history milestones stretches back to the founding of the United States.

The actual celebration of Women's History Month grew out of a weeklong celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, California, in 1978. Presentations were given at dozens of schools, hundreds of students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa.

A few years later, the idea had caught on within communities, school districts and organizations across the country. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. The U.S. Congress followed suit the next year, passing a resolution establishing a national celebration. Six years later, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March.

Women's History Month Theme 2022

The National Women's History Alliance designates a yearly theme for Women's History Month. The 2022 theme is "Women Providing Healing, Promoting Hope." This theme is "both a tribute to the ceaseless work of caregivers and frontline workers during this ongoing pandemic and also a recognition of the thousands of ways that women of all cultures have provided both healing and hope throughout history."



Please join me in creating awareness for Anti-Bullying / Cyberbullying as part of our Respect For All Week.

Definition: Bullying has been described by the U.S. Department of Education as, "Unwanted, aggressive behavior that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time."

Bullying generally involves the following characteristics:

An Imbalance of Power: Individuals who bully use their power, such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.

Intent to Cause Harm: The person bullying has a goal to cause harm. Bullying is not accidental.

Repetition: Bullying behaviors generally happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.

 \leftarrow Please see the figure to left to understand the 4 different types of bullying.

Why do People Bully Others? There are different reasons why people bully, including wanting to dominate others and improve their social status, having low self-esteem and wanting to feel better about themselves, having a lack of remorse or failing to recognise their behavior as a problem, feeling angry, frustrated or jealous, struggling socially or even being the victim of bullying themselves.

What are the Effects of Being Bullied? People who are bullied can experience depression and anxiety. Being bullied can also cause trust issues and problems communicating with other people. All these problems can negatively impact academic performance and concentration. Grades may go down suddenly. Bullying can even cause a loss of appetite and difficulty with sleep. In extreme cases, victims of bullying may become suicidal or retaliate with violence.



WHAT IF I SEE SOMEONE ELSE BEING BULLIED?

- Talk with the person being bullied. Ask what you can do to help.
 - Listen without making judgments. The person being bullied could feel sensitive about what's going on and scared to talk about it.
 - Let them know you care. Show that you're a friend. Invite them into your group or to do things together.
 - Tell an adult you trust. If the bullying is happening at school, tell a teacher, principal, administrator, or counselor. But no matter where it's happening, tell an adult you trust.
 - Take a stand as a group. Talk with your friends about how you can all stand up to bullying.
 - > Don't repeat rumors.
 - Confront bullying. It takes courage, but talking to someone who's bullying lets them know that their actions aren't cool. If you're worried about safety, make sure you tell someone your plan or bring someone with you.
 - Educate! Some types of bullying like bullying someone for their race, religion, or being gay or trans – is based on fear and ignorance. If you teach someone what you know about these things, you might be able to change the way they treat people.




