PUBLIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

South Carolina State University is officially a Research 2 (R2) institution. It is now South Carolina's only research two institution. Governor Henry McMaster congratulated President Alexander Conyers on February 25, 2025. The designation places South Carolina State among the nation's top-tiered research institutions.

The SCSU Board of Trustees has voted to borrow \$95 million to build a 500-plus student dormitory and a health and wellness center. These funds are being borrowed because the state of South Carolina does not provide funds for these structures.

Currently, the SCSU endowment is now over \$20 million. The goal for the capital campaign (is to raise \$78 million in the next five years.

The university held its second Passport Fair on campus to work toward its goal of having all seniors have one by the time they graduate. The last fair had 75 slots available.

A 60 for 60 fund-raiser is planned to raise \$60,000 to honor President Conyers for his 60th birthday. The plan is to have 60 people pay \$1,000 for this event.

President Conyers reported that the athletic director and band director positions have not been posted at this time because there is a process. When the process is in place, these positions will be posted.

SCSU hired another construction manager to expedite the new Turner Hall and Library construction.

Per the president, the university should have the delivery of a new MCI bus shortly. Initially, it was going to be another used bus.


