

The narrow gable end faces Oak Road, while its long sides look essentially south and north in good regional siting fashion. The house is the classic Georgian portico, with a central pedimented block, framed by brick quoins and accented by a generous Palladian window on a stucco field. It is, of course, based on Mount Pleasant, but is extended at each end by sleeping porches that continue the roofline, and create a modern long, low house instead of the compact form of Mt. Pleasant.
