DOMINICK DONATO RELEASED AFTER 14 YEARS IN PRISON

Had Served More Than Minimum Term Imposed by Court in 1930

Dominnick Donato, who in 1929 participated in the hoodlum and robbery of an alleged "horse" room in Franklin Square, during which a Troy man was wounded in the foot by a revolver bullet, has been released from state custody on the order of County Judge Henry B. Clinton.

While Donato's release from prison actually comes due to his having obtained a writ of habeas corpus from Judge William B. Bascom of Washington County based on an error made in County Court here in 1931 when Donato was re-sentenced, the prisoner had served more than the minimum term.

On March 7, 1930, the records show Donato pleaded guilty in Rensselaer County Court to an indictment charging him with robbery, second degree. He was sentenced to serve from 12 to 15 years in state's prison. This sentence was imposed on him on the claim that he had been armed with a revolver at the time of the crime.

Later the man who had been wounded in the foot during the holdup said he could not identify Donato as the person who had fired the revolver. Donato was then returned to County Court here and the sentence was changed to be from 7 to 15 years.

Several weeks ago Donato obtained a writ from County Judge Bascom claiming that when the second sentence was imposed upon him he did not take into consideration 15 days that he had served in jail here. Judge Bascom submitted the case to Rensselaer County Court for determination.

Edward J. Poland represented Donato. After reviewing the case as outlined by Dist. Atty. Earl J. Wiley and ascertaining that Donato had already served 14 years, six months and 22 days in state's prison and at the county jail here, Judge Clinton ordered that the sentence as imposed on Donato in 1931 be changed to 15 years. Judge Donato had already served and that he be discharged.
