

Elton John





On August 12th, 1988, Jean-Michel Basquiat sadly passed away at the young age of 27. Even though this was over 30 years ago, his influence in both fashion and art is still felt today. 
CHAOS IN FASHION AND DESIGN







and the evolution of streetwear




