Carol retired from the Calvert County Public Schools in 2004 and has been very active with the One-Room School Committee as well as the Friends. Congratulations, Carol!


Joe Showalter Steps Down From Friends' Board

Roundtable discussions were engaging as everyone enjoyed listening to the ideas and concerns voiced by the other members of small museums from the six states of Delaware, New York, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Virginia.

Each evening, Carol and I would share and discuss all we had learned – which would generate more ideas and possibilities in our minds for our one-room schoolhouse. We were definitely excited to come back and share! At the banquet we found we were the top bidders for four hours of consultation service from Paris Design in Takoma Park. 
Outdoor Display Discussed

From the Podium

With the arrival of summer, one often associates this period with a general level of inactivity in schools. While this may have

been the case back when Port Republic School #7 was in operation; the Friends have used this period to focus on program planning, a social activity, as well as some repairs in preparation for the start of our fall program. In short, we've not been idle. As you read the summer issue of the Slate, I think you'll feel that your involvement with the One-Room Schoolhouse is not only appreciated but managed well. Before you move on, however, I'd like to touch on the "why" of the value of the Port Republic School #7 that sits on the side of Broomes Island Road.

During our recent Volunteer Luncheon, Jack Smith, Calvert County's Superintendent of Public Schools, offered some comments at the end of the program. To paraphrase, Jack was touched by the sense of community and place that the schoolhouse programs bring to the county schools as well as the community at large. Later in the week I was given a book review in the Wall Street Journal of a new book entitled *Small Wonder* by Jonathan Zimmerman. Mr. Zimmerman reviews the role of the one room schoolhouse in the fabric of the 19th and early 20th century's communities and what has happened

since these buildings and their programs were consolidated into larger schools in the name of "progress." One of his major conclusions involves the type and level of instruction provided in these early settings and how our modern classrooms are now trying to replicate the individualized, self-paced instruction that was the foundation of this early educational model. I firmly believe that our classroom program appeals to both teacher and student alike because of the very personal nature of the experience.

Mr. Zimmerman also reviews the history of school consolidation throughout the United States, an activity that ultimately led to the closing of the one-room schoolhouses in Calvert County. Many parents argued at the time against the loss of community control over their schoolhouses but "progress" carried the day and education moved to larger facilities. Mr. Zimmerman speculates after a thorough discussion of the evolution of American Education in the 20th century, that Americans "gained the whole world of technological conveniences and lost the soul of their communities." It is not by accident that one of the most popular social networks on the "web" is My Space® where people build their own communities of "friends" of like interests. So, as you ponder the greater community of Port Republic, please mark August 6 on your calendar and come join us for an evening of ice cream and music.

In closing, I think you'll see that a lot is going on during the summer of 2009. Thanks for your continued support.
