Year after year, the west-facing wall of the One-Room Schoolhouse, nearest to the Church, bakes in the hot afternoon sun. As a result, the German lap wooden siding had buckled and deteriorated. This also created a serious chance of water working its way under the siding and causing even more damage.

A year ago, the Friends of the One-Room Schoolhouse contracted for the old siding to be removed and replaced. The workmen also repaired all of the corners of the schoolhouse with the goal of enabling the other sides of the building to last for many more years.

We plan on replacing the rest of the siding as time and funding permit.





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An Unexpected Treasure from Elaine!







Elaine Cochran Dunkle kept a large scrapbook that began in 1976 with the first efforts to restore the abandoned and deteriorating school building that sat adjacent to Christ Church Parish Hall. She collected photos and newspaper articles documenting the progress that culminated in the Dedication of Port Republic School #7 on July 24, 1977. This book has been on display numerous times giving opportunity to scan pictures for familiar faces and to enjoy proof of the successful efforts of the Calvert Retired Teachers Association and community members in bringing the old schoolhouse to its present splendid condition and usefulness.

A second scrapbook existed but was unknown to today's stewards and friends of the schoolhouse. Peter Cochran alerted us to his finding this green treasure among his mother's papers as he sorted through them after her death. There are no photos in this scrapbook, composed of sheets of construction paper that have become brittle and browned from oxidation. Instead this scrapbook documents two occasions in the lead-up to opening the schoolhouse for visitors.

The first was a "Silver Tea" held on August 15, 1976, for former students and teachers of one-room schools in Calvert County. On eight pages there are rows and columns for these visitors to record their name, the schoolhouse they attended, the names of teachers they remembered having, and a space for comments.

Though the construction paper is fading, the handwriting remains, strong and beautiful, with names and comments of those who attended one-room schools in Calvert County. Among the last names with historic relevance in Calvert County: Wood, Hall, Mackall, Leitch, Hance, Gott, and Trott. The men and women who attended had been students at these Calvert County schools: Cheneyville/Chaneyville, Wallville, Huntingtown, Barstow, Mt. Harmony, Port Republic, Stoakley, Smithville, Hallowing Point, and Bowensville.

Comments often included "Wonderful memories" and Mildred Skinner McGuire said "Small place but we learned a great deal." A more pointed comment, from Sarah Hance Lines stated they had received "Better education than students receive now in the lower grades. Our teachers meant business." Fondly remembered teachers included: Virginia D. Sollers, Evelyn Bowen, Elvin Bowen, Mary Wright, Marie Condiff, and Vivian Ireland Gray.

July 24, 1977, was date of the Dedication of the restored Port Republic School #7. Again the green scrapbook was available for former students and teachers to sign. This time there were fond memories, "going to the spring for drinking water" by Sarah Catherine Hance Lines, and a particularly telling vignette by John Alvin Yoe who wrote "I put a frog in the water bucket and it hopped out on the floor." Preservation in digital format has been done for both of these scrapbooks. Plans are for a DVD slide show to be created so that everyone can enjoy the photos, clippings, handwriting, and memories. We look forward to sharing these treasures at a future gathering.

On the Trail Again

"Walk this way . . . single file . . . and please keep your hands to your side. We will use our five senses as we walk along the 7 Bridges Trail."

Students will see, hear, and maybe smell a scent along the way, but they will not taste or touch. On occasion the youngsters may feel the sensation of a breeze that catches them as they march along the Barreda railroad bed or smell the crisp, fresh air of autumn while rolling down the road where hogsheads of tobacco once tumbled and rumbled to the wharf at Governor's Run. They might hear the stream, bubbling along under one of the 7 bridges as it meanders along the bottom or the squeak of Bess beetles as pointed out by Bob Platt. But taste will be limited to the savory anticipation of lunch once the walk is completed.

During a trail walk, the group will pass several dilapidated tree stands which date to times before Christ Church had purchased the property...before the scouts became trail "builders." Although hunting is no longer allowed, Mr. Platt reports that these stands arouse much student interest as "tree houses."

On one occasion, Bob was surprised when three girls in the same class informed him that with their fathers, they had taken summer archery classes. Ultimately, they had actually shot deer with bows and arrows while hunting with their fathers! (Exaggeration? Maybe . . . maybe not.) All of the girls were very excited about walking in the woods.

Another visual is the "missile" that all but took out one of the 7 bridges during Hurricane Irene in 2011. (*Photo above, at right.*) This trunk-like obstacle remains in place. Delightful to see here and in other locations might be orange monarch butterflies or iridescent green sixspotted tiger beetles.

Like good scouts, the walkers will leave the trail just as it was found grateful for the construction by the Boy Scouts and the wooden
