Since the last Kibitzer, "Ziva" (River Rock Reach Any Higher) earned her UKC Superior Interior Nosework title and a 2nd place ribbon. She moved up to the Master Interior trial and Qed again in 2nd place. This Master level search involved finding 3 different odors in 2 different rooms with a distraction present. She did this in under 2 minutes. Our unexpected reward was receiving a Judge's Team Medallion in both trials from 2 different judges.

Ziva started running in the AKC Coursing Ability Test (CAT) sport in May 2015. This is an endurance sport as opposed to the FAST CAT speed sport. Ziva earned her CAX3 title in early April when she completed her 75th qualifying run. Overall, she ran a minimum of 45,000 yards (25+ miles) in CATs. It's been 7 years of great fun, joy, and excitement. It's a thing of beauty to watch a Canaan Dog stretch out and run, turn on a dime, stay with and then catch their "prey bags." We made great memories and videos.

Thank you to our CDCA BOD for participating in the AKC Parent Club Title Recognition Program which recognizes Temperament Test titles issued by the American Temperament Test Society. Ziva was the 6th Canaan Dog to pass the rigorous ATTS temperament test. In 2019 Ziva became the first Canaan Dog to earn both the AKC (ATT) and ATTS (TT) temperament titles.









Shlomo, the Exuberant, becomes First Titled Canaan Dog in Distanced Dock Diving by Tom Cassel

On June 11-12, Celev Klavlev's Curly Shlomo Hasameach "Shlomo" became the first Canaan Dog to complete a splash in a North American Diving Dogs (NADD) Event and the first Canaan Dog to obtain a

title. The AKC recognizes titles from the NADD getting his DN Dockdiving Novice Title. Shlomo is owned by Tom Cassel and Tim Wenz of Haddon Township, NJ. During his first event he completed 7 splashes, 5 to obtain the title, and 2 towards his Junior title. They are attending another event to complete 8 more splashes in the next week. You must complete 15 splashes to qualify for the overall rankings for the season which ends on September 15th.

Tom and Tim are new to the breed having rescued 2 dogs last year from the Texas '56. Shlomo was a puppy less than 3 months old and a Roscoe a 2 year old. Tom is now the treasurer of the Canaan Dog Rescue. "I didn't rescue 2 dogs, I joined a community. The overall community has been great in helping us through the challenges associated with the situation." Tom grew up with Giant Schnauzers that jumped into the water and swam so when he found out about Dock Diving and saw no Canaans, he didn't know any better and with the encouragement of David Golden and others literally took the plunge. Tom is available to talk to anyone interested in learning more about this. Tom also plans to show Shlomo in conformation as well as participate in other events like Fast Cat, and Agility to improve his athleticism for dock diving.

Shlomo's version:

How I got my first title in Dock Diving

My name is Shlomo and I live in New Jersey just outside Philadelphia with another Canaan Dog, Roscoe and my Dad, Tom and Pop, Tim. We are both rescues from the Texas '56 although I was so little when it happened I don't remember it. I am now over a year old. I love my "brother" Roscoe and how much he has taught me how to be a Canaan Dog! I even caught my first rabbit a few weeks ago. When I proudly brought it to the back deck to show Pop, he said "Leave it". I dropped the rear third of it that remained. Of course Roscoe, the funny one, picked it up and took it in the house. Pop didn't think it was so funny.

Last summer my dad took me swimming a few times when I was really little and I loved it! One of my pup neighbors, Rugger, loved to chase his favorite ball into his pool. I was too afraid to jump in so Dad took me into the middle of the pool and let me go. I just started paddling and I figured out how to swim to the steps and get out all by myself. It was so much fun swimming



and running around the pool last summer. Then came the winter and it got really cold and snowed a few times. Roscoe and I did our zoomies in the snow and we had so much fun, but I just kept thinking about how much fun I had in the pool last summer.

So when it started to get warmer out, Dad took me on an hour drive past farm after farm to a 2 big pools with forty foot docks and numbers down the side that measure the feet from the dock. We had arrived at Sunshine Diving Dogs, my happy place (except for the dogs they board who barked

and howled continuously that I ignored.)

First he and Jarrett, my fun trainer, strapped me into an orange life jacket with a 2 handles on the back. You

can compete with or without the life jacket. Then they pointed me to the ramp and threw out my favorite toy. I wanted that toy. I knew if I wanted it I had to go out to get it. Without even thinking my body went down the ramp until it ended. Then I looked back and they said "Shlomo... Go! Go! Go! Go! Go! "But Dad, I can't walk out to it," I thought. "I'm too. scared" They said "Go! Go! Go! Go! Go! Go! Go! Go!"


I just stood there. Then Jarrett came down the ramp, grabbed the handles on



the back of orange wrap, lifted my feet off the ramp bottom, gently tossed me just far enough off the ramp that I couldn't stand, and I magically floated. "Awesome!" I thought as my paddling instincts kicked in and I paddled over and grabbed the toy in my mouth. Dad called me to come back to the ramp and I easily paddled my way back and gave him my toy. Then they repeated it again and again until I walked off the ramp and started swimming all by myself. This was so fun. I retrieved the toy every single time and Dad was so proud of me for that.

Then it got scary. They walked me up to the big dock and called me to come to the edge of the dock.

"If they think that I am going to jump into the water below me they must think I'm nuts!" I thought. I
ran all the way to the other end of the dock. 40 feet back. Dad squeaked my toy. I turned around I ran to 5 feet from the end





my claws into the dock. I wasn't going anywhere... until all of a sudden Jarrett picked me up and tossed me into the pool. I was swimming! I grab the toy but I don't care that Dad is calling me to come back. I swim to the other end of the pool with my toy. Dad is calling me so I come back to him on the end of the ramp which I had mastered last lesson. I got a treat. And we repeated the last fun. I played hard to get. That was fun to see Dad's expressions when I did. Running the full length of the dock. So much fun. But not as much fun as swimming. I did this a few more times. And our first lesson was over. I sure hoped it wasn't the last lesson I had so much fun but I was challenged and that made me so happy.

Over the next several weeks we had more 4 more training sessions. At our last session Jarrett asked Dad to go into the water. I really wanted to go to him. He called me. "Shlomo. Go. Go. Go. Go. Go." And finally I jumped in all by myself from the end of the dock and swam right to my toy and then to Dad who was so happy. Then I returned to the ramp and we did it over and over. I hesitated but in the end, I wanted to come to Dad in the water. Then Dad got out of the water and went to the side of the dock. Jarrett threw in my toy. Dad called me. "Shlomo. Go. Go. Go. Go. Go." In I went after my toy and swam to Dad who pointed me back to the ramp. And we repeated it over and over. Until the lesson was over. Jarrett and Dad talked for a couple of minutes. Then Dad said "See you tomorrow. I think he is ready." Huh? Tomor-

row? We came every week or two but we are coming back tomorrow?

Dad woke me up extra early and we were out of the house by 6:45. Of we went to our happy place. I wish my name wasn't so far down the alphabet since that is our splash order. Soon dogs were jumping until it was my turn to splash. Jarrett grabbed me and Dad went to the side. He walked me to the front. Threw out my toy. I ran to the dock and Dad called "Shlomo Go. Go. Go." I hesitated. The crouched down, and I launched myself off the dock after Jarrett tossed the toy. That was easy. And we did it again. For every splash, you get a practice jump, and 2 jumps and the longer one counts. 4 splashes that day, and all my jumps were from 9' to 9'9", Novice level, and Dad told Jarrett he would see him tomorrow.

We woke up the same time the next Day. Got there. First splash. 10'9", Yeah. I broke 10 feet. That's a Junior not a Novice splash. Dad wasn't happy. He wanted my Novice Title but I jumped too far. Second Splash 10"3" Awesome. Again a Junior

splash. Third splash -9'9". Dang. I missed 10 feet. Dad... why are you so happy that I had my worst splash of the day. Then we went up to the event counter and they gave me a really cool ribbon.

The good news is the next 2 splashes count towards the Junior Title. So we go back this weekend for 8 more splashes. I really hope to get that Junior Title. And I am doing this from a standing jump. Dad keeps trying to get me to run and jump but right now I stop and then jump. I am going to try to. I promise. I am having so much fun and can't wait to see my other Canaan Dog friends in the rankings. But for now, I am the first and only Titled Canaan Dog in Dock Diving. Come splash with me.

And last, even though I am a rescue, somehow they didn't get me where it counts, so I got registered after the fact by my breeder Roy. I plan to compete in dog shows too. Since I live near Philadelphia, I plan to go to the National Dog Show every year so you can look for me there, or of course at Sunshine Dog Park and Dock Diving Dogs.



The 2022 Canaan Dog Census

On 11 January 2022, I initiated a Canaan Dog Census Project announced on several Canaan Dog Facebook pages. It had occurred to me that Facebook might be a good way to do a project that would gain some interesting information and potentially benefit the breed. I'd noticed that many people from quite a few countries enjoyed posting about their dogs on one or more Facebook Groups pertaining to Canaan Dogs. Some of these owners were not members of any of the Canaan Dog clubs and so were unknown to me except through Facebook. What I hoped to do was create a census for the breed. Many of us have speculated about how many domesticated Canaan Dogs exist at present. This would be a way to obtain an estimate.

In my initial posting on two of the most-visited Facebook pages, I explained my aim and suggested that owners use the following format to leave their data in the comments section under the post:

Country: Owner's name, total number of Canaan Dogs owned, number of those dogs that are intact and can be used for breeding.

Respondents were asked to include only known (registered) Canaan Dogs that were currently alive.

The results were to be compiled anonymously, but asking for the owner's name helped me avoid duplication. And there were some duplicates; in spite of being asked not to, several people replied on both sites. And in a couple of cases both the breeder of a recent litter and the current puppy owner sent in data.

On February 16th, I posted some preliminary results and a reminder to submit data, and included a third Facebook Group where a few people that I hadn't seen on the other two sites were posting.

It occurred to me that I knew multiple Canan Dog owners who do not use Facebook. So I contacted the boards of both the Israel Canaan Dog Club of America and the Canaan Dog Club of America and received permission to contact members via email who had not supplied information via Facebook. If you are a member and did not hear from

me, it is probably because you had already responded via Facebook, or you have a young dog and the breeder of that dog supplied the information.

The deadline established for the census was 20 March 2022. Here are the results:

134 Canaan Dog owners from 15 countries responded.

A total of 347 Canaan Dogs were listed, and 198 of these dogs were intact. Several owners mentioned dogs that were intact but young pups, or retired seniors, or otherwise unavailable for breeding - and these are not included in the total of intact dogs. However, semen from two of the retired males is available.

Here is a list, by country, of the

Of course, these data are just a snapshot from across two months, and the tallies would always be changing because of births and deaths. Most of the numbers are underestimates, as many owners were missed, or did not reply. To wit, I have

seen Facebook posts by people who clearly have registered Canaan Dogs but did not respond to the survey.

I think it would be good to try another census in a few years to see what is happening with the Canaan Dog population. One change in the methodology that I would recommend is to inquire about the gender of the intact dogs to see if the sex ratio is balanced.

Finally, I am going to comment on the implication of the results, and here is the major one: we have too few Canaan Dogs. Let's

assume this census turned up only half of the true total population of purebred registered Canaan Dogs. That would mean there are just under 700 registered Canaan Dogs worldwide. The number of dogs that are intact is probably somewhat more accurate, assuming breeders are more invested in Canaan Dogs and more likely to reply. But for argument's sake, assume the true number of intact dogs is about 400.



A couple of decades ago when I was working in Conservation Biology, the rule of thumb was that to preserve genetic diversity and keep a breed genetically healthy, at least 500 breeding individuals were required. The 500 number is now known to be just a ballpark figure, affected by variables such as how much genetic variability was present in the founders of the breed, sex ratio balance, and whether any of the intact animals are geographically isolated from the rest of the population. Still, the population of Canaan Dogs is well below that minimal requirement.

So what's to be done? My thoughts haven't changed since the article I wrote for Desert Tracks in Spring 2002 and which appears online at http://www.icdca.org/History/GenePool.html

We need to use more Canaan Dogs for breeding, as long as they are reasonable specimens of the breed and of sound body and temperament. A parent passes half of their genes to each of their offspring, so at least two offspring are needed to preserve the genes found in that parent. That's two offspring who will survive long enough to be bred and pass along those genes to future generations. Ideally, more than just two offspring are desirable, because accidents can happen that prevent a dog from being bred. Throughout the history of the breed there have been kennels whose bloodlines seem assured of continuing as they produced large numbers of dogs, only to have the descendants reduced to one or two after the death of the breeder.

One hedge against misfortune is to store semen from males whenever possible. We might think about whether there is an advantage to doing this cooperatively in repositories at several locations, or whether continuing to collect and store independently of one another is preferable. Regardless, it is important to stipulate in your will what should happen to the stored semen after your death (one of the advantages of a shared repository is that it would be easier for other breeders to obtain the semen in the event of your demise).

There are already online aids to help breeders locate diverse dogs. On the Israel Canaan Dog Club of America's website we maintain a stud dog list (www.icdca.org/Breeders/Stud Dog/TheStudDogProjectList.htm). You don't have to belong to the ICDCA to have your intact male dog listed. The purpose of the list is to jog breeders' memory about what males are available to breed to their bitch. The list is purposely kept simple, with just the dog's name, age, sire, dam, number of intact offspring, and owner contact information. More recently, two breeders from the Czech Republic, Michaela Junkova and Blanka Les, are developing a Canaan Dog Database that will have dogs around the world in it. The database is free, but private, so you need access information. Contact canaandogsdatabase@email.cz

Not everyone is cut out to be a breeder and we should be careful about encouraging people to breed who maybe should not. It is easy for people to get in over their heads and end up

with too many dogs. With careful mentoring and support we can help new breeders set realistic expectations and help them place puppies; always the most daunting of tasks.

While the possibility still exists, we should try to increase the number of founders. In this we are completely dependent on the Israelis, as they are the only ones who can bring in feral and Bedouin-owned dogs to add to the gene pool. AND we are dependent on them to

do the miun until a 3-generation pedigree is obtained. The United Kennel Club is willing to work with us on dogs with less than a 3-generation pedigree, but to the best of my knowledge, AKC is still not. It does nothing to help the breed if you import and breed dogs who can't be registered with both organizations, and one could argue that it actually harms the breed by eliminating dogs whose descendants could have been registered had their importers just waited for the next generation.

We should also move toward equalizing the representation of the founding dogs in the current population, in order to conserve diversity and minimize inbreeding caused by the popular sire effect. Dogs with a rare founder in their pedigree are particularly desirable for breeding.

It is up to all of us to do our utmost to preserve the Canaan Dog breed. Activities such as this census are a tool to help us understand where we are and where we need to head in the future.
