## Redeeming the Time Practical Suggestions

Being "down to business" in the Christian life is all about one's use of time. In fact, discipleship is *time*—whether you are seeking the Lord through prayer, or memorizing a verse. Ministry, too, is *time* invested in other people's lives. But time has a way of slipping through our fingers—and the Christian must learn to snatch it back. Want to be more consistent in your discipleship? More fruitful in ministry? Learn to harness your time. Get down to business! The paragraphs ahead will help.

### **Time Management**

While many systems exist for managing your time, all involve planning. To make the best use of your time, you too, must plan. Begin by purchasing a small weekly planner. Then, at the beginning of each day, as a part of your Morning Watch while your mind is still in a spirit of prayer, and fresh from meditation on the Word—take a few moments for planning. What projects would you like to accomplish that day? that week? Review your calendar, and/or schedules for upcoming activities and events. Are there things you should be preparing for now? What about the various people in your life—is there something important you should do for some friend or family member? Are there goals you have been working toward? Break big projects into smaller tasks and take steps every day. Perhaps the Lord spoke to you while in prayer, or Bible study impressing you to carry out some special task? As you think through these things, ask God for wisdom to know His agenda for your day.

Next, begin entering items into your planner. Schedule them in as soon as there are openings—giving precedence to items that are especially important or urgent. As you examine your schedule, you may feel impressed to mark off some items, as unimportant, or out of harmony with God's will for your life right now. Others you may feel impressed to postpone until

another day. But some will stand out as tasks God wants you to tackle immediately. Put them in your planner. Now examine your list. Is it too short or too long? What is the best time and way to accomplish each item? Plan your day—then commit your plans to God.

As you go through the day, consult your planner frequently. Make an effort to try and check off each item at the time intended. Push yourself to squeeze a little more into each 24 hour period. Items not checked off will be back to face you tomorrow. Time management, however, is not about busyness—it is about getting the *right* things done. Some days you may be able to accomplish every item, others you may not. What is essential is that you commit your plan to God, and give it your best. God will honor your efforts. By the time using your planner has become habitual—you will find yourself getting far more done than you would have thought possible. To win the war on time, you must have a plan! Here's a few other useful tips:

- Don't trust your memory—use your planner.
- Develop a daily schedule—and stick to it.
- Recognize the sin of procrastination—and conquer it.
- Be a finisher—avoid new tasks until old ones are done.
- Learn to say no—so you can say yes to God.

Scripture Memory Tip: Memorizing verses that focus on diligence and related topics, allows the Holy Spirit to flash those verses into our mind whenever we are not using our time wisely. Eventually, God's Word can transform our whole sense of the value of time.

#### The Importance of Commitment

As with every area of discipleship, obedience requires a morning by morning commitment—to discerning God's plan for your day, and acting on it. Obedience is a *mindset* that must be cultivated. Ultimately, it boils down to surrender at the moment of choice. Will you do what God has asked, or not? The choice is yours.
