The ladies were fascinated by her anecdotes and warmed to her passion, bubbly personality



and engaging sense of fun. On a serious note, Kila heads the Blue Skies Hospital Charity in Blackpool and combines this with being a devoted mum of four. One exciting adventure for her was an appearance on the BBC's "The Repair Shop" where her beautiful old bell was given a magical makeover. Keep an ear out for Kila!

BALDERSTONE & DISTRICT WI recently celebrated their 105 year anniversary. They believe they are the second oldest WI in Lancashire. They have over 50 members, most of whom regularly attend their monthly meeting. This year has already seen some very interesting speakers. In April Jack Spees from the River Ribble's Trust explained just how difficult it was to rectify hundreds of years of misuse for the waterways. April also saw their Strollers visiting Whalley Abbey and the Catholic English Martyrs' Church followed by a delicious lunch at The Dog Inn. The more energetic walking group went to Gawthorpe Hall for an interesting historical tour and a good ramble afterwards. They are holding monthly craft meetings. Janet Wilkinson showed them how to create magical images in Zentangle



and they are encouraging their members to enter exhibits for the July Clitheroe WI show.

The speaker at **BANKS WI** in April was Dawn Bond, who demonstrated ways of planting hanging baskets. The plants were only small but will soon fill the baskets for stunning summer displays. Dawn took the baskets away with her but will bring them back in a few weeks to be raffled off. In May Michelle Caldwell will be talking about some of the famous Victorian visitors to Southport.

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At the April meeting of **BARTON WI** speaker Dermon Gethings entertained members with his fascinating talk about his trip to the U.S.A in 1972. He was a student at Preston Catholic College when he was invited to be the UK's representative for the NASA International Youth Science Tour to witness the launch of Apollo 17, the last time man walked on the moon. On his return he presented Prime Minister Ted Heath with "The Goodwill Moon Rock".

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ECCLESTON WI enjoyed a fascinating talk by Pauline Lowther from Medical Detection Dogs, trained to detect the odour of human disease in samples of urine, breath or sweat. This early, accurate, diagnosis of cancers, Parkinson's disease or bacterial infections can lead to better patient outcomes. It

costs £29,000 to train one dog. In April the meeting was opened to anyone interested in hearing about the vast munitions filling Royal Ordnance Factory, a major employer in the area between 1938 and 2007, with 35,000 staff working there in 1941. It was here that the famous bouncing bombs designed by Barnes Wallis and featured in the Dambusters raid were filled. Steve Williams was pleased to give an illustrated talk to the audience, including several men who had worked

at the factory. The site spanned 928 acres, had 1500 buildings, 25 miles of railway track and 50 miles of road!

FORMBY WI Luncheon Club had a talk from Sam Thompson representing the Waitrose store in Formby. Sam arrived bearing gifts of Fiona Laird cupcakes, two varieties of oatcakes with Stilton with strawberries and cheese on top plus ruby port. These were enjoyed after the talk. She explained the history of John Lewis and Waitrose and why they are two separate shops but share a heritage which dates back to the early 20th century. Steadman Lewis broke away from his father's approach to business to form a philanthropic approach to the workforce, making them partners who, if they worked hard, could share in the profits of the business. He then linked up with Mr Waite and Mr Rose who ran a grocery business in London and Waitrose was born. Steadman's father then realised the benefits of his son's approach and adopted it for John Lewis. Many years on the partners of both John Lewis and Waitrose enjoy very many benefits, including discounts and health and holiday benefits. Sam was passionate about her enthusiasm for the company. She answered questions after the talk and even promised to investigate the lighting delay in the café in the morning in Formby.

FRECKLETON WI celebrated their 102nd birthday with a Cheese and Wine party attended by members and guests from St Annes, Warton, Ribby with Wrea and Treals W.I's. The inviting table groaned with various cheeses, pate, crackers and pickles to enjoy along with a glass of wine. There was also a lovely Birthday Cake, baked by one of their members, Michaela Bass. Then each table of six was given an identical basket of what appeared to be random odds and ends and the object was to create an outfit to be worn by a selected model. The outcome was hilarious with seven outlandish 'haute couture' outfits being paraded around the hall. A team from St Annes was judged the winner, but lots of fun was had by all. A gentle quiz followed, the competition for a 'Birthday Card for Freckleton' was won by Barbara Bamber, and the raffle was drawn. Thanks to Donna Glover from Willow top Hedgehog Rescue, for her talk to **GREAT HARWOOD DISTRICT WI**. Members now know a lot more about hedgehogs and her enthusiasm and love for them was apparent during the talk. Over half the hedgehog population has been lost from our countryside since the millennium, mainly due to the lack of natural food (insects)

caused by the large-scale use of pesticides by farmers. They are nocturnal creatures - if you see one in the daytime, please do not pick it up unless it is in imminent danger as being handled is a stressful experience. If you are unsure, contact a specialist group such as The Wildlife Trust before trying to help. By gardening in a wildlife-friendly way, we can help hedgehogs to survive. As hedgehogs eat insects, try to leave an area where logs, twigs etc can be stored and insects thrive. Stop using slug pellets - the slugs eat the pellets and the hedgehog eats the slug! LONGTON WI thought they had to shout out 'Abracadabra' when their conjurer, speaker, Roger Woods asked members to say the Magic Words during one of his tricks. Wrong! It was 'Longton WI'! Roger began with a brief history of the art of conjuring and illusion – skills developed over many years.



As an accomplished magician himself, he went on to perform tricks of his own – even escapology. Although they were all seated relatively close by, with a clear vision, the sleight of hand was so good that they were all quite amazed at the performance, and thoroughly enjoyed a most entertaining evening.

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RIBCHESTER & DISTRICT WI celebrates their 80th Birthday this year. Over 80 members and friends marked the occasion in March. Commander Ellen Shephard RN was their guest speaker, sharing stories of the invaluable role that

women play & have played in the Royal Navy. Ellen told them of the young mathematicians working from a Liverpool bunker on the strategy to protect the Western Approaches in WW2. She spoke of her own career – from intercepting drug smugglers in the Caribbean to patrolling the undersea cables that carry 97% of the world's data, from humanitarian missions to her role on HMS Duncan managing logistics for 80 days at sea for a crew of 256. Pushing right through that glass ceiling, Ellen was the perfect guest for their birthday party. They enjoyed wonderful food – courtesy of members – and a glass of bubbly. Their cake, made by a member, is pictured.

A group of **SOUTHPORT SCARLETS WI** members completed the Queenscourt Star Trek night walk on Fri 3 May. They completed 10km around Southport, joining 1200 other walkers on a drizzly evening. Thanks to all

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who supported them. Southport Scarlets support many charities throughout the year and this is one of their annual events.

TATHAM FELLS WI members sailed with Steve Halliwell around the smaller Islands of the Hebrides in a small boat. Towering cliffs dwarfed the former lifeboat as Steve sailed beneath the magnificent basalt columns of Fingal's Cave on Staffa; he said that many of the islands have been formed by this rock with the cliffs providing safe nesting places for seabirds. Although many of the islands are uninhabited, Steve's slides showed the remains of former villages, and he said that farmers from the larger islands take sheep onto the uninhabited ones for summer. He also had beautiful pictures of rare flowers only found in these remote places, and little puffins that are not at all afraid of people. Sometimes they ran the boat up the beach to explore an island, sailed up a geo or anchored out at sea and went in by a small craft. Steve concluded with sunset over Iona,

The ladies of Newton Le Willows VIADUCT VIOLETS **WI** in Mersevside enjoyed a talk on the life of Edith Rigby who was Preston's most famous suffragette. Edith together with other suffragettes fought for a fairer society against poverty, poor educational opportunities and bad working conditions for working class women. Amongst other things Edith rented a property to educate girls beyond the age of 11 years and in January 1907 she established the Preston branch of the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU). Edith was passionate about her beliefs and committed arson twice! She was arrested and imprisoned for her opinions and actions on seven separate occasions spending time in Holloway Prison. Whilst incarcerated she took part in hunger strikes and was subjected to force feeding. Edith's marriage was deemed unconventional by the standards of the day however her husband Dr Charles Rigby was a great support to her. He wrote to the government and national newspapers expressing his pride and agreement with her actions.



WEETON WI had an uplifting and eventful evening which was enjoyed by members and guests. They were entertained by 'Just Jay' who had them all singing and dancing along to some memorable

favourites. Then a tasty hot supper was served followed by a break, raffle and WI business. The evening was rounded off with a heartwarming sketch based on WW2, aptly named 'Mum's Army'. Many original items I.e. clothing and appliances were on display not to mention a few very well preserved 1940's models. All in all a truly GREAT evening.

STANDING WITH GIANTS



Late last year I heard about 'Standing With Giants': a temporary artistic installation project established in Normandy to commemorate those brave souls who lost their lives on D Day on 6th June 1944.

In April this year I had the privilege to visit it at the permanent British Normandie Memorial in Ver-Sur-Mer, near to the landing beaches.

The installation, named 'For Your Tomorrow, The People's Tribute' is made up of 1475 giant silhouettes,

recycled from signage, designed and created by Dan Barton and assisted by numerous groups of volunteers.

There are also eighteen beautiful stillages which display letters, poems and messages and these are adorned with poppies, knitted and crocheted by WI members and which were co-ordinated by Toni Briggs from Apple Blossoms WI, Kingston Bagpuize.

Particularly moving to me were the silhouettes of the two nurses: the only two women to have died alongside their male compatriots. Also striking were the figures of the French Resistance and the local citizens: men, women and even a child who gave their all for our tomorrows.

Should you get the opportunity to visit this fantastic and moving memorial in northern France before the end of August 2024, please do so, or if not you could research it on Facebook or on the Internet as there are ways to support it from the UK.

MEMBERSHIP

"Getting The Books Done!"

After a very busy period of dashing all over Lancashire attending Annual Meetings, your team of wonderful advisers thought this wee checklist might be of support to Treasurers and Committees regarding the required preparation and presentation of the 'dreaded' Annual Financial Statement! The financial statement shows your members what their subscriptions have been used for.

1. Requesting a Lancashire Federation IFE (Independent Financial Examiner) is highly recommended. It costs around £30. The IFEs are independent from your group, know the WI constitution and workings of the WI spreadsheet!

2. WIs should ask their members to approve appointing an IFE for next year at their Annual Meeting. If the request form is sent as soon after that as possible, then it is all in hand and doesn't get forgotten. Remember the WI's income must be below £10K to use a Federation IFE and a form can be downloaded from the LFWI website.

3. Close books 6/8 weeks prior to Annual Meeting.

4. Produce Annual Financial Statement ensuring outstanding liabilities etc. are accounted for on front sheet to ensure balance in correct boxes.

5. Submit to allocated IFE in good time, allowing for any queries and remember that IFEs will have other WI's books to be dealing with.

6. Present a full copy of the examined accounts at your Annual Meeting and have a summary sheets available for members to read. Be prepared to explain the statement, giving an outline of the year and hopefully a budget for coming year. Be prepared to respond to questions from members. Once the meeting is over collect summary sheets, or if Members wish to take them away, you should tell them that they are confidential and should be disposed of as such. If you have an Adviser attending please present them with a copy too.

7. At the Annual Meeting the adoption of the presented financial statement should be proposed, seconded and voted on by members. This vote can be done by show of hands. Then ensure this procedure is minuted.

8. Send a copy of the full financial statement to the Federation office as soon as possible

As always, please get in touch with your Adviser with any queries. We have a wealth of knowledge and experience within the team and can answer most questions quickly and easily, but we also work together as a team sharing particular questions, problems and support.

Here's looking forward to a wonderful 2024 for all our WIs.

ALMOND AND CHERRY TRAY BAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 150g butter or Clover
- 150g caster sugar
- 3 eggs
- 75g SR flour
- 75g Ground almonds
- 100g glace cherries, halved
- Few drops almond essence
- 25g flaked almonds
- 25g icing sugar

FEDERATION CHAIRMAN/ NORDEN WI

- METHOD
- Line the base of a tin 19cm x 27cm x 3cm with baking parchment
- Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, add one egg at a time and 1 tbsp flour/ almond mix and beat well. Continue until all egg is beaten in.
- 3. Cut cherries in half and rinse in boiling water to remove syrup, dry on kitchen
 - paper and toss in remaining flour/ almond mix. Stir the almond essence and remaining flour into the creamed mixture.
- 4. Pour into the prepared tin and smooth evenly, sprinkle with flaked almonds.
- 5. Bake at 160C fan or gas 4 for 25 40 minutes until an even golden colour and springy to touch.
- 6. Cool in the tin. Make up glace icing and pipe over top of cake before cutting into squares or fingers.
- 7. Store in an airtight tin. Can be frozen before icing.
