Motorcycle Hand Wave Etiquette

Wave Meaning:

Wave Types:

Expression of Solidarity Embracing Tradition Show of Respect Saying Hello

Left Hand Down Low

Commonly Used: Cruisers, Harley Riders, Universal Rider Wave
The left hand extended nearly straight down towards the pavement with a straight arm and index and middle fingers

extended together or forming a peace sign.
Or all fingers extended for a low five.
Eye contact is not necessary.

Left Hand Straight Out Commonly Used: Personally have never seen it useed.

The arm extended straight out towards the opposing lane. Generally, all 5 digits will be extended.

The palm is facing towards the approaching rider like a "high five". NOT recommended, as this is also the Hand Signal for a Left Turn!!!!

Eye contact is not necessary.

Left Hand High Commonly Used: Overly Enthusiastic Riders

The left hand extended upwards with the palm facing towards the oncoming rider. Usually, all fingers will be extended

and closely spaced

NOT recommended, as this could be mistaken as the Hand Signal for a Right Turn!!!!

Eye contact is not necessary.

Right Hand Freestyle Commonly Used: Ultra Classic and Goldwing Riders

Becoming popular with riders possessing Cruis Control. Raise your right hand, with elbow bent with slight forward

angling of the forearms.

Cruise control is not available on all motorcycles and a sort of hate/envy attitude may be encountered by users of this

wave.

Eye contact is not necessary.

Two Finger Up Commonly Used: Crotch Rockets, Rice Burners, Speed Freaks or Traffic Safety Situations

Leave your left hand remaining on the grip, then raise up the index and middle fingers.

Four Finger Wiggle Commonly Used: All Riders in a Safety Situation

Keep your left hand on the grip, while raising all four fingers up and give a minimal wiggle with raised fingers side to side.

Mini Wave Commonly Used: All Riders Who Have Commitment Problems, But Want to be Nice About It

 $\label{eq:Raise} \textit{Raise your left hand up just a few inches of the grip and flash a wave before going back to the grip.}$

Head Nod Commonly Used: Universal

Nod your head down once on a slight angle, chin slightly pointed to one side, almost like a head wink and express a chill,

cool facial façade.

Self explanatory. Suitable alternative when waving is not an option.

Eye contact is not necessary.

When to Wave: When safe to do so, a wave is expected.

The Head Nod is a suitable alternative.

When NOT to Wave: At Night.

In Heavy Traffic. On the Highway. At higher Speeds. In a Curve or Corner.

When Using Your Hand Controls.
When Concentration is Necessary.
Major Intersections & Road Crossings.
At Motorcycle Rallies, Meetu ps or Rides.
You're a New Rider and Not comfortable doing so.

In the Rain, Snow or Icy (speaking from experience) Conditions.

Wave NOT Received Don't get Butt Hurt!!

They may have given an unnoticed Head Nod.
They may have been manipulating their hand controls.

They may not have seen you (looking in their rear view mirror, instruments, etc).
