

## **The Greatest Influencer**

#### An Interview with Mickey Jones



#### Tell us a bit about yourself.

Before moving to Jacksonville, I was a teacher at the NMSD and worked at NTID as an assistant coordinator of interpreting services. I began working at MacMurray College in 1976 after I finished my doctorate at the University of Illinois. I ran the Deaf Education program for 12 years. I changed jobs in 1988 and was director of the Evaluation Center at ISD.

#### How did you become involved with JCCD?

The two main social experiences in the Deaf community in 1979 were the Frat and the supper club. The National Fraternal Society of the Deaf was an insurance company founded by Deaf people. It sponsored community and social activities for Deaf people. NFSD rented a room in the Knights of Columbus building downtown on State Street for monthly meetings and social experiences. The members of the Supper Club were ISD staff. They had monthly potluck dinners at someone's home.

#### Can you tell us about the work with people and what committee or program you worked with?

Bob Anderson was very active in both groups, and he was the person who always talked about the Deaf community having its own building to support all community events. He wanted to raise money for a building. Bob and I had frequent meetings to make plans. I wrote the early grants, and Bob would identify and contact potential donors. We did not find anyone with the money to invest in a building until Dr. David Eades became interested in the project while building the Eades Center. Bob mentioned the benefit of having a Deaf activity center next to the Eades Center. Dr. Eades liked the idea of having the clients be able to participate in social activities and events with people in the larger Deaf community. Bob told him the clients would always be welcome.

I served on the early Board when it was first set up. However, I have always believed that Deaf people need to be in charge of their own destiny and future. Though I was often asked to be an officer, I declined nominations and supported Deaf nominees.

# How did JCCD resonate with the time when it was organized in 1985, does it still resonate with you today - after almost 40 years of operation? Or when the founding group, the group envisioned what they wanted to see how the organization was set up. If they are still alive today, did it come out what they wanted to see?

JCCD is a great organization. It is a safe, warm, and fuzzy home for all Deaf people. Everyone is welcome and valued. It became a reality in fulfilling the early dreams of its founders.

March Madness was a success at the Jacksonville Community Center for the Deaf on March 16th, 2024, with plenty of laughter.






Leadership Wisdom: Inspiring Quote of the Month:





## **April Flower Crossword Puzzle**




Find the correct answers to the clues and fill them into the crossword puzzle.
