District. In that capacity he has referred many of his students to join the Palatine Picklers, for the added benefit of our mentoring sessions. John is the kind of member EVERY organization would want in a leadership role in their group.

INTERMEDIATE INTRAMURALS OUR 2ND BIGGEST SUCCESS

It's hard to compete with a free mentoring program that has helped, more than 500 newer Palatine Picklers get started right in their new addiction. That's been going on outdoors and indoors for 9 years. Our intermediate intramural program is only three years old and has served only slightly fewer than 100, but it's been loved by (almost) all who have participated. It doesn't take long to see if a Pickler is a bit over, or a bit under, our intended 3.0 to 3.5 skill range. I, hopefully, explain they're either too good or not quite ready for this program. No harm done, and we probably had a fun lunch.

What is it? It's basically a fun, full morning of pickleball with seven different partners. This is NOT serious, win at all costs, kind of stuff. Every other week I invite 16 Picklers (8 of each gender) to play for either the Whippersnappers or the Wise Ones, depending on their date of birth. You'll start by partnering with your same gender teammates for three games. Then you'll play four mixed games. Results are recorded on the scoreboard after each game. The team that wins the most of the 28 games played wins the day. After three years, The Wise Ones have a 2 match lead. You can see this is a fun and close competition about which no one really cares. It's just for fun, but it's great that, despite blowouts in favor of each team, it's REALLY close overall.

So here are the upcoming intramural dates: 3/4, 3/18, 4/1, 4/15, 4/29, 5/13, 5/27. Email me at aokbarry@yaho.com those you anticipate being available to participate. Be sure to mark on your calendar "maybe intramurals" or something to remind you to email me, if a conflict arises. I send invitations to 16 Picklers on Sunday afternoons. If you fail to accept by 10:00 a.m. Monday, you earn a dreaded "strike." Email me by noon Saturday to take you off that week's ETBA (Expect To Be Available) list. Or you earn your first "strike." If you earn a second strike, you are benched from intramurals for six months. It's all about common courtesy. Those who have been benched say it seems like years. Bottom line: If you say you'll be available, be available, or let me know early you won't be. Easy peasy.



CALLING ALL NEWBIES, BEGINNERS, & THOSE WANTING TO LEARN OR PRACTICE MORE SKILLS

Our mentoring program has been LOVED by hundreds of Palatine Picklers. It started nine years ago and has served many hundreds of newer Picklers. Whether we have to tell you that spherical thing with holes is a pickleball or need to reinforce your reflex volleys at the kitchen line, email me the dates you would like to increase your knowledge and skills. Our indoor schedule runs every other Tuesday morning (9:00 to Noon) in Lake Barrington's Canlan Sportsplex. They charge \$10 a day. You, and three others of a perceived similar skill & experience level, will spend half an hour with each of six Mentors. And it's free. We routinely hear Picklers say they learned more in these three hours than in three weeks of costly lessons elsewhere. Our remaining, indoor sessions are 3/11, 3/25, 4/8, and 4/22. Please email me the dates on which you expect to be available to participate. I'll add you to those Expect To Be Available (ETBA) lists. Then just check your email on the Sunday afternoons before those dates. That's when I send invitations. It's a REALLY good idea to put "Maybe mentoring" on your calendar for dates you give me. Then you'll be reminded to email me to remove you from any ETBA list for which a conflict arises. FYI if you do not accept an invitation, you earn your first "strike." If you get a second, you're banned from mentoring for six months.







We keep hearing, "I was nervous about signing up, as I don't even know rules and am no good." Then those same individuals say, "That was awesome. I learned so much, and everyone was really friendly." Yeah, that sums us up. We are here on our own time, because we all WANT to help you enjoy your pickleball more, and the more you understand and grow in the sport, the more you enjoy it. 

WHEN WILL INDOOR MENTORING END & OUTDOOR BEGIN?

Apri 22nd will be our last Canlan mentoring session until November. Our "by invitation," Wednesday, Sycamore mentoring will begin May 7h. Sessions will be from 9:00 to 10:30 a nd 10:30 to Noon. Walk-on Hamilton sessions from 3 to 5 will begin Thursday, May 1st and , for those who cannot attend either Wednesday or Thursday due to babysitting, golf, work, etc., Saturday, May 3d.

WHEN DO INTRAMURAL MATCHES END?

Never. They will continue to be held every other Tuesday in Canlan, until the twelfth of never, except during the year-end holidays.

LET'S REVIEW FALCON POLICIES

Rec – Competitive racks ... When there are enough Picklers to justify, we specify the 2 left paddle racks are for rec players, and the two on the right are for competitive. There is an arrow located between the two pairs of paddle racks. It will indicate which group goes out next. Whoever takes out the next for paddles to go out should also switch that arrow AND move the winner-loser tinker toy thing to the other rack.

Glare court policy ... There is an obvious advantage to being near the lobby on the southwest (lobby) court. That's why you want to switch sides half way through your remaining game. If you migrate to that court. So, if you migrate there with a score of 7-4. There are 4 more points for the wining team to play. Half of 4 is 2. 2 plus 7 is 9 so you change at 9. If the score is 6-5 when you arrive on the glare court, there are 5 remaining points. Half the difference to 11 is 2.5 so you round up to 3 and swap sides at 9. It does require 4th grade arithmetic, but I think we can all handle it. Just announce "Switch at _____," when you arrive at the court.

MEET PICKLER JUDY (JEWEL) KRAKOWIAK

Judy was born March 11, 1945 in Chicago where she grew up. Her parents are in photo on the



left. She's first generation Irish, from a family of 7. She was the youngest, with a lot of older brothers so she naturally became a tomboy. She loved all sports and still does. When she was 12 she was in the finals of Chicago Silver Skates. Though she didn't win, she got her falling around the final turn managed to get

her photo in the Sun Times.

She attended St Mel's Grammar School and Providence High School, graduating

in 1963. Throughout she was involved in sportsw – track, basketball, volleyball, and baseball.

Judy loved her neighborhood, particularly her two great friends Kitty and Diana. The three have stayed close through the years. They are in the photo on the right.





She worked several office jobs and hung out in the neighborhood Irish bar. Then she married its owner, Michael McGuinn. One day Michael brought home a puppy. They decided to have a contest at the bar, to name him. Boozer was the winner. See photo on left.

Michael loved Ireland. They visited Judy's family several times. She had

two aunts who were Nuns. They loved spending time at their convent. "It was beyond anything you can imagine." They sang, danced, laughed, and ate. Each Sister was amazing and



helped to create some of Judy's best memories. Judy and Michael had three wonderful years, before he passed away. Judy and Michael fill the photo on the right.

Then Judy went to Wright Junior College, to become a physical education teacher. While there she won volleyball and baseball titles. In her second year, she and her sister-in-law Maureen took the US Postal Service test. She passed and took the job, as the salary, health benefits, vacation time, and pension were way better than she would have had as a PE teacher. So she



quit school and began her USPS career in 1975. It was there that she met her second husband Fred. They married in 1986 and bought a house in Schaumburg. He, too, was an athlete and taught her to golf, fish, play tennis, racketball, and downhill skiing. They raced a bit at the ski resorts they frequented. They traveled a lot. Fred and Judy's photo is on the left.

Judy spent her last 15 years at USPS in Consumer Affairs. She helped put together a program to give presentations at grammar schools about the4 history of the Post Office. Her group also handled the Santa letters. She gave presentations on stamp colleting and the many benefits for women working at the USPS. After 30 years with the postal service, she (and Fred) retired in 2005.

Fred had been married previously and had three daughters. That allowed Judy to become a Grandmother and a Great Grandmother. Fred gave her the family she always wanted. Their house was



always full. They took care of everyone in both families – parents, aunts, uncles, nieces, and nephews. After 21 years

of marriage, Fred died of cancer in 2007. See Granddaughter, grandson, & great grandchildren.









Judy has traveled to 40 countries. She's zip lined in many of them. She's paraglided in the Alps and in Africa. She's done two tandem parachute jumps. She joined Roosevelt ICL classes over 55. She attends classes and teaches an art class.

She was looking for more activity so tried pickleball. It wasn't a good experience for her and Nancy. They then went to Birchwood, met some Palatine Picklers, and they welcomed and helped them. Judy has nothing but great experiences with our club. She took advantage of our free mentoring, and found each Mentor had something new to add. She has made new friends through pickleball. She plays three times a week. She's been playing just short of two years.

Judy has checked off many of her bucket list items, but still wants to fly in a glider, visit Greece and France, and visit more national parks.
